FINDING OF EMERGENCY

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game finds that an emergency exists and that the attached regulations are necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare. The facts constituting the emergency include the following:

Per recommendations from the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, and Flyway Councils, and the proposed rule of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the regulatory framework for Canvasbacks, Light Geese, and Brant are changed for the 2016–2017 season.

1) Canvasbacks in all Game Management Units are changed as follows: daily bag and possession limits are increased from a daily bag limit of 1 bird, 3 in possession, to a daily bag limit of 2 birds, 6 in possession.

The population estimate of Canvasbacks in 2016 was 736,000 birds, which was 26% above the long-term average of the last 50 years. The Adaptive Harvest Management (AHM) harvest strategy for Canvasbacks has provided for a 2-bird daily bag limit when the population exceeds 725,000 birds. The Canvasback harvest in Alaska is <1% of the total Pacific Flyway harvest.

2) Light Geese (Snow and Ross') in all Game Management Units are changed as follows: daily bag and possession limits are increased from a daily bag limit of 4 birds, 12 in possession, to a daily bag limit of 6 birds, 18 in possession.

Breeding colony surveys of Light Geese in the western Arctic have indicated a dramatic population increase in recent years, greatly exceeding population objectives of the Arctic Goose Joint Venture, U.S. Flyway Councils, and the Canadian Wildlife Service. This is particularly evident on the Arctic Coastal Plain of Alaska. Increases to the daily bag limit in portions of the Pacific Flyway were prompted by concerns over a potential over-population of Light Geese that may damage breeding and staging habitat and sympatric species.

3) Brant in all Game Management Units are changed as follows: daily bag and possession limits are increased from a daily bag limit of 2 birds, 6 in possession, to a daily bag limit of 3 birds, 9 in possession.

The 2016 winter survey count of Brant was 140,000 birds, which was slightly higher than the 2015 index. The Brant population has surpassed a threshold index of 135,000 birds, above which a moderate harvest strategy of a 3-bird daily bag limit was prescribed by the Pacific Flyway Council. The sport harvest of Brant in Alaska accounts for a small percentage (6%) of the Pacific Flyway total harvest, but is an important subsistence food source to rural Alaskans and provides economic opportunity to rural communities.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Game is not scheduled until January 2017 and the board is unable to meet requirements for public notice and implementation of these changes prior to the opening of the 2016–2017 migratory bird seasons on September 1. Therefore, this emergency regulation amendment is necessary to provide for increased harvest of Canvasbacks following the provisions of the AHM harvest strategy, of Light Geese as part of a cooperative Flyway effort to prevent overpopulation that may result in environmental and species damage,

and of Brant following the recommended Pacific Flyway Council prescriptions, which benefit hunters and local communities in Alaska.

ADOPTION ORDER

Under the authority of AS 16.05.255, AS 16.05.258, and under a delegation of authority from the Board of Game under AS 16.05.270, the attached 5 pages of regulation changes are therefore adopted as emergency regulations to take effect August 31, 2016 as provided in AS 44.62.180(3).

This action is not expected to require an increased appropriation.

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ALASKA BOARD OF GAME

DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY TO ADOPT WATERFOWL REGULATIONS

The Board of Game ("board") makes the following findings:

- 1. The board normally holds only two regulatory meetings each year.
- 2. The board attempts to meet only in March and November thereby minimizing the difficulty in obtaining the attendance of all members and the interested public.
- 3. Proposed Federal framework regulations for migratory bird hunting are not published until July. Therefore, developments regarding waterfowl resources necessitating regulatory action often occur when the board is not in session.
- 4. The emergency powers of the Commissioner of Fish and Game set forth in AS 16.05.060 may not be sufficiently comprehensive or expeditious to permit necessary regulatory action before the September 1 opening of migratory bird seasons.
- 5. If the emergency powers of the commissioner are not sufficient, and the board itself cannot act, the State may be without any authority to adopt necessary regulatory measures required for compliance with Federal regulations.
- 6. The board has avoided this problem in the past by making standing delegations of authority to the commissioner to adopt emergency regulations. These delegations have existed since the 1960's.

THEREFORE THE BOARD RESOLVES that it hereby makes the following delegation of its rulemaking authority under AS 16.02.255 and AS 16.05.258 to the commissioner to be carried out under AS 16.05.270:

A. The commissioner may adopt, in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62), waterfowl regulations.

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- B. To the fullest extent practicable, any regulations adopted shall be consistent with all expressions of current board intent.
- C. To the extent it is possible within the time available to act, the commissioner shall attempt to obtain the views of the members of the board before adopting such regulations under this delegation if the matter involves a major policy decision.
- D. Waterfowl regulations adopted under this delegation may be made permanent in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62).
- E. This delegation shall remain in effect until revoked by the board.
