- (3) fishing with more than the legal amount of gear, which includes regulations that restrict the size or quantity of fishing gear that may be used in a salmon fishery;

 - (A) regulations that govern the gear type that may be used in a salmon fishery;

- (B) regulations that govern the physical characteristics of gear that may be used in a salmon fishery, including the type of mesh or filament that may be used in salmon fishing nets; and
- (C) regulations that prohibit or limit the use of fish traps, airplanes, lights, explosives, chemicals, drums, reels, or other instrumentalities in salmon fisheries.
- (5) fishing before expiration of transfer period, which includes regulations that prohibit the operation of gear before the approval and processing of a transfer request by the commission if the violation occurred while participating in a salmon fishery;
- (6) interfering with commercial fishing gear, which includes regulations that prohibit physical disturbance of or damage to the fishing gear of another salmon fisherman;
- (7) fishing with more than the legal amount of gear on vessel, which includes regulations that restrict the amount of fishing gear that is permitted to be aboard a vessel used in a salmon fishery;

 (8) improper operation of fishing gear which includes regulations that govern the
- (8) improper operation of fishing gear which includes regulations that govern the proper deployment, operation, use, or movement of salmon fishing gear in water, including the improper use of a vessel to drive or direct fish, but does not include regulations that govern possession of personal identification, marking of fishing gear, or vessel or gear registration except as it applies to area registration requirements;
- (9) permit holder not present when required, which includes regulations that require the physical presence of one or more limited entry permit holders to operate gear in a salmon fishery;
 - (10) fishing with underlength or overlength vessel, which includes regulations

that govern the minimum or maximum length of a vessel that may be used in a salmon fishery;

- (11) wanton waste of fishery resources, which includes regulations that require utilization of the majority of a salmon carcass.
- (b) The number of demerit points to be assessed for each conviction will be determined according to the point schedule in AS 16.43.850(b).

in AS 16.43.850(c), the number of demerit points to be assessed must be reduced by one-half. If a person receives two or more convictions on the same day and each conviction meets the requirements described in AS 16.43.850(c), each conviction is a first conviction and will be assessed at the one-half rate. A prior conviction that did not result in an assessment of demerit points against the person for whatever reason does not count as a first conviction for the purpose of this subsection.

(d) Demerit points are assessed as of the date of conviction, as determined by the date of entry of judgment, and apply against the person in the specific salmon fishery associated with the conviction that gave rise to the points. Demerit points remain assessed in the same amount for a continuous 36-month period following the date of the conviction that gave rise to the assessment, unless the conviction is vacated or reversed on appeal. However, suspension, modification, discharge, removal, or expiration of a sentence that arose from a conviction or the setting aside of a conviction under AS 12.55.085(e) does not remove or reduce demerit points assessed against a person under this section. At the end of a 36-month period following the date of conviction, the

demerit points automatically expire. However, an expiration of demerit points does not alter the duration of a suspension that was imposed under AS 16.43.850(d).

- (e) If a person permanently transfers a permit for a fishery in which the person has active demerit points or is suspended under AS 16.43.850(d), the points remain assessed against the transferor and do not pass on to the transferee. A person who has active demerit points but is not suspended may acquire a new permit in the fishery; points that are generated while holding the new permit will be added to the person's previously accumulated points in the fishery for calculations described in AS 16.43.850(d).
- (f) If a person emergency transfers a permit and the transferee's conduct during the period of the emergency transfer generates an assessment of demerit points, the transferee and transferor will be assessed the same number of demerit points. If the transferee qualifies for the one-half point reduction described in (c) of this section but the transferor does not, both the transferee and transferor's points will be reduced under that provision. However, if the transferor qualifies for the one-half point reduction described in (c) of this section but the transferee does not, the transferor's points will be reduced under that provision and the transferee's points will not be reduced.
- (g) The provisions of 20 AAC 05.1800 20 AAC 05.1865 apply to administrative hearings and adjudications following the assessment of demerit points. The commission may not review or adjudicate the validity of a conviction, sentence, or court order pertaining to a violation of a commercial fishing law. (Eff. 3/26/2021, Register 237)

The Department of Law has reviewed the attached regulations of the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission against the statutory standards of the Administrative Procedure Act. Based upon our review, we find no legal problems. This memorandum constitutes the written statement of approval under AS 44.62.060(b) and (c) that authorizes your office to file the attached regulations. The regulations were adopted by the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission after the close of the public comment period. The regulations make a technical correction to a cross-reference, clarify the definition of residency to address the identification of a person's domicile, clarify provisions regarding the refund of interim-use and limited entry permit fees, provide for additional emergency transfers to a person who acquired a permit by right of survivorship, designation, or inheritance under certain criteria, repeal a definition of "illness" that applied to permit transfers, and add provisions to implement, interpret, and make specific AS 16.43.850 - 16.43.895, the statutes that set up a demerit point system by which a limited entry permit is suspended for frequent violations of commercial fishing laws in a salmon fishery.

The November 5, 2020 public notice and the January 6, 2021 certification of adoption order both state that this action is not expected to require an increased appropriation. Therefore, a fiscal note under AS 44.62.195 is not required.

The Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission proposes to adopt regulation changes in Title 20, Chapter 05 of the Alaska Administrative Code, as follows:

The Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission Proposes to change regulations to correct a cross-reference in a regulation about fee adjustments, amend the definition of residency, repeal and readopt regulations regarding the refund of interim-use and limited entry permits; amend 20 AAC 55 to adopt a new section to implement the demerit point statute, AS 16.43.850 – 16.43.855, a statute that provides for the suspension of a limited entry permit for frequent violations of commercial fishing laws in a salmon fishery, amend the emergency transfer regulation that pertains to persons who acquired their permit by right of survivorship, designation, or inheritance, and repeal the definition of illness which applies to permit transfers.

The Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission proposes to adopt regulation changes in Title 20, Chapter 05 of the Alaska Administrative Code, as follows:

Transcript of Public Meeting

January 4, 2021

CHAIR FATE PUTMAN: My name is Fate Putman, I am the Chair of the Limited Entry Commission. It is 2pm on January 4, 2021. And this is the date and time for the public meeting regarding the proposed changes to Title 20, Chapter Five of the Alaska Administrative Code.

Specifically, the proposed changes apply to the following regulations: 20 AAC 05... and I won't repeat that so it's 20 AAC 05.245(a)(3), it's also .290, it's also 20 AAC 05.425(c), it's also 20 AAC 05.560(d), it's also 20 AAC 05.1750(f), it's also 20 AAC 05.1770(a)(9) and we're also adding... 20 AAC 05.1971 in the regulation package.

The proposed changes would correct a cross-reference in a regulation about fee adjustments; it would amend the definition of residency; repeal and readopt regulations regarding the refund of interim-use and limited entry permits; amend the emergency transfer regulations that pertain to persons who acquired their permits by right of survivorship, designation, or inheritance; repeal the definition of illness which applies to permit transfers; and amend 20 AAC 05 to adopt a new section to implement the demerit point statute, a statute that provides for the suspension of limited entry permits for frequent violations of commercial fishing salmon laws.

As Chair, I would like to present these proposals to the Commission and to Commissioner Kelley. Together, we constitute a quorum of the Commission. No comments will be heard today in person, but we are willing to welcome any interested party who wants to listen in on this meeting ... welcome today... and as we consider taking action on these regulations.

The Commission received seven public comments or questions on these proposed regulations prior to the comment deadline. I would like to briefly address each of these comments for your edification.

The first comment pertains to the proposed change to 20 AAC 05... (a)(3); essentially the concern was that the proposal would change the means by which annual base fees are calculated or modified. This is not the case; the current proposed change would correct a typo in the regulation, which incorrectly references section... subsection (e) of AS 16.43.160. Due to a subsequent legislative change of that statute, CFEC's regulations should have been changed to reference AS 16.43.160(c), and not (e). This proposed change is to correct that statutory reference.

The next comment we heard...from... pertains to the proposed changes to regulation 20 AAC 05.1750(f) involving emergency transfers. The question was whether the proposed change would allow an owner of a permit to indefinitely transfer a limited entry permit year-after-year to

someone else if the... limited... if the permit owner does not wish to fish the permit. This might be referred to as leasing. This type of leasing was specifically prohibited when the original CFEC statutes were adopted, so the short answer is no. The proposed change to this emergency transfer regulation is not intended to fundamentally change the emergency transfer system or alter the basic rules governing permit ownership.

The third comment we heard pertains to the proposed new regulations implementing the demerit point statute that was passed by the legislature. The commenter expressed concerns about the regulation that it would make certain types of fishing activities illegal. The draft regulations do not create a new category of criminal conduct. Neither the demerit point statute nor draft regulations actually criminalizes specific commercial fishing practices or conduct. Under the demerit point statute, a conviction of a commercial fishing law issued by the court is a necessary prerequisite for the assessment of demerit points. The proposal will not change this legal procedural process. Secondly, the commenter offered some suggestions about the wording of the proposed regulations to add clarity. I have reviewed these suggestions very carefully and I believe the current proposed wording provides adequate guidance with respect to how CFEC interprets the demerit point statute.

The fourth comment that we received pertains to the proposed repeal of the definition of illness under 1770(a)(9). The commenter expressed concern that repealing the definition would result in a significant change to emergency transfer rules and again would... result in permit leasing that would change the limited entry system. In reviewing this concern, it is my opinion that the proposed change would merely remove the outdated and obscure definition that no longer is necessary. The proposed change would not substantively change the emergency transfer rules. Illness...the term illness would remain a basis for an emergency transfer and an applicant who requested an emergency transfer on such a basis would still be required to prove that the illness was of such a severity that it prevented him or her from participating in the fishery. Also, in my opinion, the proposed change would not result in an increase in permit -quote unquote- leasing. The proposed change would not alter the basic rules governing permit ownership, including the statutory rule that prohibits the leasing of permits.

The fifth comment we received pertains to the proposed regulation... 20 AAC 05.1750(f). The commentator... expressly endorsed the regulatory proposal to increase the protections for families who depend upon commercial fishing for economic support.

The sixth comment we received pertains to the proposed regulation... changing... the implementation of the demerit point statute. The commenter raised concerns about the basic fairness of the demerit point system... the statute currently applies only to salmon fisheries. The demerit point statute was passed by the legislature in 1998 and expressly requires CFEC to adopt regulations to establish a uniform system for assigning demerit points for violations committed in salmon fisheries. Although I appreciate the comments, the Commission lacks the authority to expand the scope of the statute to include other fisheries. The commenter also expressed concern

about ... that the proposed regulation would streamline the process of suspending permits. In my opinion, the proposed regulation is not intended to streamline the process of suspending permits; it is intended to ensure that the demerit point system rules are uniform. This will ensure that all commercial salmon fishermen will be treated fairly under the current demerit point statutes and administrative regulations.

The seventh and final comment pertains to the proposed repeal and re-adoption of regulations governing refund of interim-use and limited entry permit fees. The commenter expressly supported...expressed support for these proposed changes. The commenter also expressed general support for the proposed changes to 20 AAC 05.1750(f). However, the commentator also expressed concern that the new language could make it more difficult for applicants to obtain an emergency transfer. In my opinion, the proposed changes would not impact the CFEC Emergency Transfer system. CFEC carefully reviews each emergency transfer request on a case-by-case basis to ensure that the request is legitimate and satisfies the statutory requirements of the emergency transfer process. The proposed changes are intended to preserve CFEC's basic oversight function regarding such requests. The other changes to 20 AAC 05.1750(f) are intended to add protection to spouses or heirs of commercial fishermen, so that they will not be forced to permanently transfer a limited entry permit in the event of the death of the commercial fisherman the family relied upon for economic support.

With this statement on the comments on the record... with these statements... on the comments for the public record... I would like to present the motion to adopt the proposed regulations to the Commission for consideration.

COMMISSIONER DALE KELLEY: Thank you Mr. Chairman. I have also carefully reviewed the proposed regulatory changes and the public comments the Commission received on these proposals. I agree with your summary of these comments and generally share the point of view you expressed on each of them.

I do notice that there are two minor errors in the draft regulations posted online at the State of Alaska public notice website and set out in the numbered pages one through eight of the document before us. Regarding the proposed changes to 20 AAC 05.1750(f), there is a typo in the citation to 20 AAC 05.1740(i)(1). The number 20 is missing from the citation. Also, draft regulation 05.1971 is out of numerical order; it should be the final regulation...the final regulation listed in this document.

I propose a corrected draft regulation document to fix these errors, which again you will find in the numbered pages one through eight. This revised document includes the text of the draft regulations that were posted online, as modified to correct the two minor errors I have discussed. I move that we adopt all changes described in this updated draft regulation document. CHAIR FATE PUTMAN: Thank you Commissioner Kelley. I second that motion. And vote in favor, and with that motion I am going to call a roll. Commissioner Kelley, what is your vote on the proposed regulatory changes?

COMMISSIONER DALE KELLEY: Yea.

CHAIR FATE PUTMAN: And as Chair, I also vote yes. So the motion is adopted and the proposed regulations are therefore also adopted. As there are no further matters to come before the Commission on these proposed regulations, I will adjourn this meeting at approximately 2:15 on January 4th. Thank you all for your participation and attendance at this important meeting.
