Answer Two:	Please see Sections 3.01 and 3.03.	
Question Three:	Section 3.03 – Deliverables lists eight tasks. Do we derive from these eight tasks a \$10M portion to allocate and price milestones, based on priorities outlined in the reference attachments?	
Answer Three:	No. On Attachment G – Cost Proposal Form, Offerors must develop, allocate, and price milestones based on priorities for a sample \$10M Aviation project related to the broad field of Advanced Air Mobility. This sample aviation project shall be used for evaluation purposes only.	
Question Four:	Section 3.05 "Contract Price Adjustments " Should the term <u>Overhead Rate</u> be interpreted as a management labor allocation, i.e. project management/material acquisition costs not associated with discrete labor tasking or material, or should this be considered contractor fee/profit for performance?	
Answer Four:	Yes, the Overhead Rate % is the total amount the contractor will be compensated for a Task Order. This Overhead Rate must include all of the contractors costs related to providing the services, to include, but not limited to; direct and indirect costs, overhead, labor, taxes, profit, utilities and any other cost the contractor may incur to provide the service requested.
