








Funding for SESA

Revenues by Source FY 2025 Budget



Since August 2024

SESA has provided technical assistance to over 13,274 Alaskans.

SESA programs have offered over 77 site-based, district, and state-wide trainings for Alaskans on evidence based or best practices related to the educational program of students with low incidence disabilities. Over 47% of these trainings were conducted via distance delivery (e.g., Zoom).

SESA Low Incidence Disability
Programs have offered and provided
support to 502 students and their school teams.

SESA has produced 322 customized student or patron focused reports offering recommendations and guidance.

SESA specialists have made **114 onsite consultations or trainings** for Alaskans.

Alaska Center of Accessible Materials has created and connected 19 accessible educational materials projects for school teams and their students with print disabilities.

Alaska Autism Resource Center has conducted 20 trainings and 15 community outreach activities.

The Anne Freitag Library has 1,290 patrons and continues to do outreach across the state during conferences, Facebook, and SESA Newsletter to share what is available at the statewide lending library.



















Celebrating Success

At SESA we believe in honoring the accomplishments of our students, no matter how big or small. We would like to tell you about a couple of students we have had the pleasure of working with.

The SESA tech department and the LID Multiple Disabilities team was able to help secure a VersaEye, a program giving access to all iPad features to users who can't use direct touch. Asked the question "Can you get the balloon?" this student was able to use it to accomplist the task.

The Alaska Deafblind Project

The AKDBP works with students and thier teams across Alaska. This student is using a tactile communication board to decide what to have for lunch.

At the Alaska Statewide Special Education Conference (ASSEC) this year, AKDBP was able to connect with educators in person and show off everything the program has to offer.

AKDBP is dedicated to helping Alaskan educators increase their knowledge bases. This is from a 3 day Webinar on Assistive Technology featuring nationally known speakers.
