Dear Commissioners:

Randy Ruedrich filed Compliant 25-22-CD against Speaker Louise Stutes on October 27, 2025. Ruedrich filed Expedited Compliant against Speaker Louise Stutes on June 25, 2026, to address the failure of APOC to act on Compliant 25-22-CD. Ruedrich now requests the Alaska Public Offices Commission review the June 26, 2026, APOC Staff refusal to grant expedited consideration due to these serious errors:

I) Non-Compliance by respondent as required by 2 AAC 50.880. Answer to complaint.

- (a) **A person alleged to be in violation may file an answer (1) to the complaint not later than 15 days after receiving notice that the complaint satisfies the requirements in 2 AAC 50.870(a); or**
- (b) **An answer to a complaint must**
 - (1) admit or deny the allegations in the complaint;**
 - (2) be signed by the respondent, under oath and upon penalty of perjury, before a notary public, municipal clerk, court clerk, postmaster, or other person authorized to administer oaths;**
 - (3) include the mailing address and telephone number of the respondent; and
 - (4) be accompanied by proof that a copy of the answer and supporting documentation was mailed or delivered to the complainant.**

Speaker Louise Stutes failed to comply with items (a)(1), (b)(1), (b)(2) and (b)(4) above. Her response was very late violating the submission deadline in (a)(1), not notarized violating (b)(2) and Speaker Stutes did not provide Randy Ruedrich a copy of her unnotarized extremely late reply violating (b)(4).

Speaker Louise Stutes was required to file a signed notarized response by November 11, 2025. 2025 was not an election year and the legislature was not in session. No excuse for failure to comply with **2 AAC 50.880.(a)(1)** has been offered for her late incomplete response without proof of delivery to the complainant.

Speaker Louise Stutes's email response was stamped as received on December 5, 2025. In Speaker Louise Stutes' admission of guilt, she committed to **"Once I have completed the needed amendments and have reconciled the account,"**

Speaker Louise Stutes violates b(1) by not disclosing these individual failures cited above. Alaskan voters have waited 218 days after complaint 25-22-CD was filed for these mandatory actions from Speaker Louise Stutes.

Since the respondent's document is neither complete nor notarized nor provided to complainant, Speaker Louise Stutes's response is still due and is now over 200 days late.

The remedy for this seven-month APOC delay is an immediate expedited consideration of Complaint 25-22-DC before the 2026 primary election.

II} Non-Compliance by APOC Staff as required by 2 AAC 50.875. Investigation.

(c) **When the staff completes an investigation, but no later than 30 days after accepting a complaint, staff shall prepare an investigation report**

No APOC Staff investigative report has been issued during 218 elapsed days since Complaint 25-22-DC against Speaker Stutes was filed. More than 30 days have elapsed without a required APOC Staff investigation report. Therefore, the APOC investigation report is 188 days late.

APOC has failed to investigate the serious violations of Campaign finance statutes as cited on October 27, 2025, Complaint 25-22-DC.

Stutes's blanket admission received on December 5, 2025. APOC accepted an unnotarized, unsigned submission and failed to investigate the multiple failures to comply with Alaska state laws whilst Speaker Stutes runs another campaign for election to a higher office.

Since the APOC staff has not moved this complaint, Randy Ruedrich filed a request for expedited complaint on June 25, 2026, after no action for over 200 days.

The Staff denied request for expedited complaint on June 26, 2026, citing the unnotarized, incomplete document which Speaker Louise Stutes has never sent to the complainant.

Over seven months have elapsed with no indication that the APOC staff has conducted any investigations into the facts presented in Complaint 25-22-DC. The continuing dismissal this complaint destroys public confidence and trust in Alaskan State Government and in Alaska Public Office Commission particularly.

Summary

Speaker Louise Stutes has never filed a regulatory compliant response to Complaint 25-22-DC. Hence the APOC position that a response terminates Randy Ruedrich right of an expedited consideration is mute.

The failure of APOC staff to investigate Complaint 25-22-DC allowed unreported transactions, reported unlawful expenditures and incorrect financial reporting to impact the APOC Website for over eight months since being identified in Complaint 25-22-DC.

Randy Ruedrich requests a reversal of this APOC Staff denial and an expediated investigation and hearing of Compliant 25-22-DC immediately.

What Do USPS Tracking Statuses Mean?

Speaker Stutes's Non-Compliant '20, '22 & '24 APOC Reports June 12, 2026

Speaker Stutes admitted her noncompliance in APOC Complaint 25-22-CD on 12.5.25: *I, therefore, take full responsibility for the inaccuracies and am anxious to correct the transactions at issue.*

More than 6 months have elapsed since Stutes admission and no correcting information has been provided to Alaska Public Offices Commission. Speaker Stutes is now an Alaska State Senate District C Candidate in Alaska Primary Election on August 18, 2026. Every Alaskan voter has an interest in Stutes's failure to properly disclose campaign income and expenditures. The Southern Kenai Peninsula voters have an increased interest in Stutes's nonresponsive behavior. These House District 6 voters are the northern half of Senate District C voters. Speaker Stutes is on their August 18 primary ballot for the first time. The Alaska Public Office Commission must handle this expedited complaint immediately to properly inform all the Senate District C voters and especially House District 6 voters of Speaker Stutes's admitted violations of Alaska State Law.

With this expedited complaint request, I request immediate investigation & hearing of items cited in the APOC Complaint 25-22-CD. For example, Stutes's unreported 2022 campaign donors must be disclosed NOW. In APOC Complaint 25-22-CD:

*Speaker Stutes's 2022 State General Thirty Day Report violates AS 15.13.040 income reporting by not disclosing real contributors. Stutes reports PAC contributions on 10.3.22 for **\$82.60** & 10.6.22 for **\$1,162.60** from Democracy Engine LLC as shown on the attached Stutes APOC filings. Since a PAC is only allowed to contribute \$1000/yr to a candidate, that limit has been exceeded by **\$245.20**. An even more significant problem is Democracy Engine LLC is not registered as a PAC with APOC in 2022. Online research reveals that Democracy Engine LLC is not a PAC. Democracy Engine LLC on its website advises that donor names and addresses are provided to recipients for regulatory compliance. **Stutes mislabeled this entity as a PAC twice to hide the pass through function of Democracy Engine LLC contributions.** Stutes failed to disclose her real donors.*

*Speaker Stutes's 2022 State General Seven Day Report violates AS 15.13.040 income reporting by not disclosing contributors to Democracy Engine LLC for **\$1,248.85** on 10.9.22, **\$ 1,162,60** on 10.12.22 and **\$902.92** on 10.20.22. By reporting Democracy Engine LLC, Stutes willfully mislead every Alaskan voter since October 2022 by improperly reporting these fake PAC contributions. Stutes failed to disclose real donors.*

In Speaker Stutes 12.5.25, letter, her statement is: *I, therefore, take full responsibility for the inaccuracies and am anxious to correct the transactions at issue.* APOC needs to promptly determine who these unreported donors are and how did these funds get to an Alaska House Campaign Account.

Speaker Stutes's **2024 Financial Summaries** require immediate APOC action to correct these incorrect and misleading documents. As an experienced filer, Speaker Stutes should not be allowed claim a new found lack of awareness of the law and reporting requirements. Since this information has not been provided in 6 months,

APOC must immediately investigate these supporting bank records and determine the reportable facts.

*Speaker Stutes's **2024 Financial Summaries** are extremely troubling and all but one are simply incorrect to mislead the Alaskan Voter. Speaker Stutes is a highly experienced legislator elected in 2014. The 2022 Stutes Campaign's six Financial Summaries were error free. The 2024 Year Start Summary is correct as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2). Stutes's 30-Day Primary Summary provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings does not show the \$3,300 raised in the prior reporting period in the Cash on Hand nor Previous Campaign Income. Clearly Stutes made no attempt to reconcile her Campaign Bank Account to the 30-Day Primary Report. Stutes's 30-Day Primary Summary could not have been certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2). (3 Violations)*

Stutes continued to fail to report true information on her 7-Day Primary Report provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings by importing the 30-Day Primary Report surplus as Cash on Hand and compounded the Previous Campaign Income error by again reporting \$0.00. Furthermore, Stutes reported Previous Campaign Expenses as \$0.00 after reporting \$1,604.50 on her 30-Day Primary Report. Stutes makes no attempt to reconcile her Campaign Bank Account to the 7 Day Primary Report. Stutes's 7-Day Primary Summary could not have be certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2). (4 Violations)

*Without regard to real information in her campaign checking account, Stutes filed an erroneous **30-Day General Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings by importing the incorrect surplus of \$12,129.50 as current Cash on Hand and compounded the Previous Campaign Income error for the third time by reporting \$0.00. Furthermore Stutes reported Previous Campaign Expenses again as \$0.00 after reporting \$1,604.50 on the 30-Day Report & \$2,816 on the 7 Day Primary Report. Stutes demonstrated complete disregard for reconciling the Campaign Bank Account to the 30-Day General Report. Stutes's 30-Day General Summary cannot be certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2). (4 Violations)*

Stutes's 7-Day General Report provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings does not import any data for Stutes's 30-Day General Summary. The Cash of Hand increases to \$19,006.45 from the 30-Day General Report's surplus of \$16,978.29 and the Previous Campaign Income jumped from \$7,197.01 to \$9,961.36 and Expense jumps from \$2,348.22 to an unexplained \$3,084.41. These fathom increases are most likely unreported contributions and expenses. Stutes's 7-Day General Summary cannot be certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2). (4+ Violations)

I request Alaska Public Office Commission immediately collect the true campaign financial records and replace this complete campaign cycle of unreconciled reports. The Alaskan voters and particularly the Senate District C voters should be able to inspect truthful and accurate campaign finance reports of current senate candidate Stutes.

The following items in APOC Complaint 25-22-CD are violation of Alaska Law to benefit Lousie Stutes personally. APOC must immediately investigate these apparent Stutes Violations to inform Alaskan Voters on this matter prior to the 2026 Election.

30-Day General Report has a disallowed expense to reimburse on 9.23.24 of \$736.19. 2 AAC 50.990.(7) Contribution. (C). Does not include (x) the use of personal money or credit by a candidate for an authorized campaign expenditure, if the amount is repaid no later than three days after the date of the expenditure; Since Stutes as shown on the attached Stutes APOC filings acknowledges the expenditure was incurred on 9.16.24, the reimbursement is more than 3 days after the deadline to reimburse the candidate. (1 violation and forfeiture of funds)

7-Day General Report has a partially disallowed expense to reimburse on 10.20.24 for \$453.12. 2 AAC 50.990.(7) Contribution. (C). Does not include (x) the use of personal money or credit by a candidate for an authorized campaign expenditure, if the amount is repaid no later than three days after the date of the expenditure. As required in 2 AAC 50.321.(d), Stutes cannot combine a disallowed expenditure for Cordova Meet & Greet with a Seward Meet & Greet. Since Stutes reports other Cordova expenditures incurred on 10.6.24, the disallowed reimbursement is more than 13 days after the deadline to reimburse the candidate. (1 violation and forfeiture of funds to be determined)

The **2024 Year End Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings properly loaded the erroneous information from the **7-Day General Report**. Whilst that is a valid data transfer, this data is definitely incorrect as presented in the above analysis. Hence the final entry to zero the 2024 Stutes Campaign account balance is simply a **plug** reimbursement for campaign expenses \$2,699.38. APOC must audit the Stutes Campaign financial records to determine the actual misused funds and unreported transactions. The Alaska voter has not provided trueful information in this disclosure report **which could not have been certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2)**. (1+ Violations and forfeiture of funds to be determined)

The **2024 Year End Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings has three expense disclosures highlighted in blue that are totally inadequate to convey any useful information to Alaskan voters. These three useless disclosures are an overt attempt to avoid any form of adequate sharing of information by a veteran legislator Speaker Lousie Stutes. She never had the right to file these improper trivial disclosures. Note color coded supporting documents attached to APOC Complaint 25-22-CD

Several items in APOC Complaint 25-22-CD are not repeated here. These items are still true and relevant to the best of my knowledge and should be investigated by APOC.

The Alaska Public Offices Commission must determine if this complaint is referred to the Department of Law NOW. Speaker Stutes must not be permitted to skate into the Senate without prompt and thorough Alaska Public Offices Commission review of this Expedited Complaint Request.

Alaska Statute Sec 15.13

Sec. 15.13.040. Contributions, expenditures, and supplying

(a) Except as provided in (g) and (l) of this section, each candidate shall make a full report, upon a form prescribed by the commission,

(1) listing

(A) the date and amount of all expenditures made by the candidate;

(B) the total amount of all contributions, including all funds contributed by the candidate;

(C) the name, address, date, and amount contributed by each contributor; and

(D) for contributions in excess of \$50 in the aggregate during a calendar year, the principal occupation and employer of the contributor; and

(2) filed in accordance with AS 15.13.110 and certified correct by the candidate or campaign treasurer.

Sec. 15.13.110. Filing of reports.

(a) Each candidate, group, and nongroup entity shall make a full report in accordance with AS 15.13.040 for the period ending three days before the due date of the report and beginning on the last day covered by the most recent previous report. If the report is a first report, it must cover the period from the beginning of the campaign to the date three days before the due date of the report. If the report is a report due February 15, it must cover the period beginning on the last day covered by the most recent previous report or on the day that the campaign started, whichever is later, and ending on February 1 of that year. The report shall be filed ...

(4) February 15 for expenditures made and contributions received that were not reported previously, including, if applicable, all amounts expended from a public office expense term account established under AS 15.13.116(a)(8) and all amounts expended from a municipal office account under AS 15.13.116(a)(9), or when expenditures were not made or contributions were not received during the previous year.

Sec. 15.13.112. Uses of campaign contributions held by candidate or group.

(a) Except as otherwise provided, campaign contributions held by a candidate or group may be used only to pay the expenses of the candidate or group, and the campaign expenses incurred by the candidate or group, that reasonably relate to election campaign activities, and in those cases only as authorized by this chapter.

(b) Campaign contributions held by a candidate or group may not be

(1) used to give a personal benefit to the candidate or to another person;

(2) converted to personal income of the candidate;

Sec. 15.13.116. Disbursement of campaign assets after election.

(a) A candidate who, after the date of the general, special, municipal, or municipal runoff election or after the date the candidate withdraws as a candidate, whichever comes first, holds unused campaign contributions shall distribute the amount held on February 1 for a general election or within 90 days after a special election. **The distribution may only be made to**

(1) pay bills incurred for expenditures reasonably related to the campaign and the winding up of the affairs of the campaign, including a victory or thank you party, thank you advertisements, and thank you gifts to campaign employees and volunteers, and to pay expenditures associated with post-election fund raising that may be needed to raise funds to pay off campaign debts;

(2) make donations, without condition, to

(A) a political party;

(B) the state's general fund;

(C) a municipality of the state; or

(D) the federal government;

(3) make donations, without condition, to organizations qualified as charitable organizations under 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3) if the organization is not controlled by the candidate or a member of the candidate's immediate family;

(4) repay loans from the candidate to the candidate's own campaign under AS 15.13.078(b);

(5) repay contributions to contributors, but only if repayment of the contribution is made pro rata in approximate proportion to the contributions made using one of the following, as the candidate determines:

(A) to all contributors;

(B) to contributors who have contributed most recently; or

(C) to contributors who have made larger contributions;

(7) transfer all or a portion of the unused campaign contributions to an account for a future election campaign; a transfer under this paragraph is limited to

(C) \$5,000, if transfer is made by a candidate for the state house of representatives;

(8) transfer all or a portion of the unused campaign contributions to a public office expense term account; a transfer under this paragraph is subject to the following:

(E) unused campaign contributions transferred under this paragraph must be disposed of as provided in (2), (3), or (5) of this subsection at the end of the term of office immediately following the campaign for which the contributions were received; and

(c) Property remaining after disbursements are made under (a) — (b) of this section is forfeited to the state. Within 30 days, the candidate shall deliver the property to the Department of Revenue. The Department of Revenue shall deposit any money received into the general fund and dispose of any other property in accordance with law.

2 AAC 50.320. Recordkeeping requirements. (a) A person required to report contributions or expenditures under AS 15.13 shall maintain detailed records of all contributions received and expenditures made for the length of time required under AS 15.13.111. The records must include (1) each contribution of any amount or value, including any loan, unless otherwise exempted by this chapter; and (2) a cumulative total of all contributions made by each contributor. (b) If an expenditure required to be reported under (a) of this section is made to an advertising agency or to an individual or business that provides campaign consultation or management services, the records must document all services rendered, including the name of each business from which campaign goods or services were purchased or subcontracted or media advertising placed, and the amount of the expenditure.

2 AAC 50.321. Reporting by a candidate, group, or nongroup entity. (a) A candidate shall file each report required under AS 15.13.110 containing the information required under AS 15.13.040(a) and the following information: (1) for any monetary contribution, the check number or the identifying transaction number if paid by other means; (2) for any nonmonetary contribution with a value greater than \$100, a description of the contribution and the estimated fair market value; (3) for each loan or loan guarantee, (A) the date received; (B) the name and address of the lender and any loan guarantor or cosigner; (C) the principal occupation and employer of the lender, loan guarantor, or cosigner; (D) the interest rate; and (E) the principal amount of the loan; (4) for each contribution from the candidate to the campaign, and for income earned from contributions, including bank interest and income from unused contributions invested in compliance with 2 AAC 50.348, (A) the date received; (B) a description of the income; (C) the name and address of the source of the income; and (D) the amount or estimated value of the contribution or income; (5) for each paid expenditure, (A) the date of payment; (B) the check number or the identifying transaction number if paid by other means; (C) the name and address of the payee; (D) the purpose of the expenditure; and (E) the amount of the expenditure; and (6) under the debt section of the report, for each expenditure incurred but not paid, (A) the date the expenditure was incurred; (B) the name and address of the person with whom the debt was incurred; (C) the purpose of the incurred expenditure; and (D) the amount of the incurred expenditure. (b) A group shall file each report required by AS 15.13.110 containing the information required in AS 15.13.040(b) and (c) and the following information: (1) for income earned from contributions, including bank interest and income from unused contributions invested in compliance with 2 AAC 50.348, the information required in (a)(4)(A) - (D) of this section; and (2) for each expenditure, the information required in (a)(5) and (6) of this section. (c) A nongroup entity shall file each report required by AS 15.13.110 containing the information required in AS 15.13.040(j), the treasurer's certification required

I, therefore, take full responsibility for the inaccuracies and am anxious to correct the transactions at issue.

This process has been tedious, requiring the review of data from multiple sources: bank statements, checkbooks, Stripe account, and copies of deposits, invoices and expenditures.

Though challenging, I am committed to the utmost transparency and view this as a learning experience that I will not repeat.

Once I have completed the needed amendments and have reconciled the account, I would like to enter into a Consent Agreement. Kindly advise what further steps need to be taken.



Speaker Stutes's '20, '22 & '24 APOC Non-Compliance Summary

Failure to File Accurate Reports or Disclose Real Campaign Expenditures & Funding Unlawful Personal Expenditures
as Required in AS 15.13.040, 112, 116 & 2 AAC 50.320, 321 & 990

Speaker Stutes's **2020 State Year End Report** on 2.15.2021 as shown on the attached Stutes APOC filing violates AA 15.13.116 by over funding her Future Campaign Account by \$3,744.50 on 2.1.2021. Speaker Stutes amended this incorrect YE Report on 2.22.2021 (**7 days late**) by reducing the Future Campaign Account to \$5000 on 1.31.2021. That change occurred an improbable day earlier than the overfunding. The amended report remained noncompliance with AS 15.13.112 since the account balance was greater than zero, specifically \$2,489.75. Finally on 2.28.2021 (**13 days late**) her 3rd 2020 State YE Report posted with a zero balance. These late reports demonstrated that Speaker Stutes did file a proper 2020 final report after amending it twice after the due date. The 2.22.2021 report & 2.28.2021 report draw timeliness violations as per **Sec. 15.13.110.(4)** (4+ violations if within statute of limitations)

Speaker Stutes's **2022 State General Thirty Day Report** violates AS 15.13.040 income reporting by not disclosing real contributors. Stutes reports PAC contributions on 10.3.22 for \$82.60 & 10.6.22 for \$1,162.60 from **Democracy Engine LLC** as shown on the attached Stutes APOC filings. Since a PAC is only allowed to contribute \$1000/yr to candidate, that limit has been exceeded by \$245.20. An even more significant problem is Democracy Engine LLC is not registered as a PAC with APOC in 2022. Online research reveals that Democracy Engine LLC is not a PAC. Democracy Engine LLC on its website advises that donor names and addresses are provided to recipients for regulatory compliance. **Stutes mislabeled this entity as a PAC twice to hide the pass through function of Democracy Engine LLC contributions. Stutes failed to disclose her real donors. The number of additional violations is the number of undisclosed donors.** (2+ violations)

Speaker Stutes's **2022 State General Seven Day Report** violates AS 15.13.040 income reporting by not disclosing contributors to **Democracy Engine LLC** for \$1,248.85 on 10.9.22, \$1,162,60 on 10.12.22 and \$902.92 on 10.20.22. **By reporting Democracy Engine LLC, Stutes willfully mislead every Alaskan voter since October 2022 by improperly reporting these fake PAC contributions. Stutes failed to disclose real donors. The number of additional violations is the number of undisclosed donors.** (3+ violations)

Speaker Stutes's **2022 State General Seven Day Report** violates A2 AAC 50.321(d) on 10.22.22 reporting \$7,750 paid to Hackney & Hackney for Flyers as shown on the table of Stutes APOC filings. Hackney has never been in the print business. **Stutes must report**

all contractors engaged in flyer design, flyer production and flyer mailing and payment to each entity. (3+ violations)

Speaker Stutes's 2022 State General Year End Report violates A2 AAC 50.321(d) on 11.04.22 reporting \$6,000 paid to Hackney & Hackney for Flyers as shown on attached he Stutes APOC filings. Hackney has never been in the print business. **Stutes must report all contractors engaged in flyer design, flyer production and flyer mailing and payment to each entity.** (3+ violations)

Speaker Stutes's **2024 Financial Summaries** are extremely troubling and all but one are simply incorrect to mislead the Alaskan Voter. Speaker Stutes is a highly experienced legislator elected in 2014. The 2022 Stutes Campaign's six Financial Summaries were error free. The **2024 Year Start Summary** is correct as required by **AS 15.13.040 (a)(2)**. **Stutes's 30-Day Primary Summary** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings does not show the \$3,300 raised in the prior reporting period in the Cash on Hand nor Previous Campaign Income. Clearly Stutes made no attempt to reconcile her Campaign Bank Account to the 30-Day Primary Report. **Stutes's 30-Day Primary Summary could not have been certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2).** (3 Violations)

Stutes continued to fail to report true information on her **7-Day Primary Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings by importing the 30-Day Primary Report surplus as Cash on Hand and compounded the Previous Campaign Income error by again reporting \$0.00. Furthermore, Stutes reported Previous Campaign Expenses as \$0.00 after reporting \$1,604.50 on her 30-Day Primary Report. Stutes makes no attempt to reconcile her Campaign Bank Account to the 7 Day Primary Report. **Stutes's 7-Day Primary Summary could not have be certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2).** (4 Violations)

Without regard to real information in her campaign checking account, Stutes filed an erroneous **30-Day General Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings by importing the incorrect surplus of \$12,129.50 as current Cash on Hand and compounded the Previous Campaign Income error for the third time by reporting \$0.00. Furthermore Stutes reported Previous Campaign Expenses again as \$0.00 after reporting \$1,604.50 on the 30-Day Report & \$2,816 on the 7 Day Primary Report. Stutes demonstrated complete disregard for reconciling the Campaign Bank Account to the 30-Day General Report. **Stutes's 30-Day General Summary cannot be certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2).** (4 Violations)

30-Day General Report has a disallowed expense to reimburse on 9.23.24 of \$736.19. **2 AAC 50.990.(7) Contribution.(C).** *Does not include (x) the use of personal money or credit*

by a candidate for an authorized campaign expenditure, if the amount is repaid no later than three days after the date of the expenditure;

Since Stutes as shown on the attached Stutes APOC filings acknowledges the expenditure was incurred on 9.16.24, the reimbursement is more than 3 days after the deadline to reimburse the candidate. (1 violation and forfeiture of funds)

Stutes's **7-Day General Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings does not import any data for Stutes's 30-Day General Summary. The Cash of Hand increases to \$19,006.45 from the 30-Day General Report's surplus of \$16,978.29 and the Previous Campaign Income jumped from \$7,197.01 to \$9,961.36 and Expense jumps from \$2,348.22 to an unexplained \$3,084.41. These fathom increases are most likely *unreported contributions and expenses*. **Stutes's 7-Day General Summary cannot be certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2). (4+ Violations)**

7-Day General Report has a partially disallowed expense to reimburse on 10.20.24 for \$453.12. **2 AAC 50.990.(7) Contribution. (C)**. Does not include (x) the use of personal money or credit by a candidate for an authorized campaign expenditure, if the amount is repaid no later than three days after the date of the expenditure. As required in **2 AAC 50.321.(d)**., Stutes cannot combine a disallowed expenditure for Cordova Meet & Greet with a Seward Meet & Greet. Since Stutes reports other Cordova expenditures incurred on 10.6.24, the disallowed reimbursement is more than 13 days after the deadline to reimburse the candidate. (1 violation and forfeiture of funds to be determined)

The **2024 Year End Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings properly loaded the erroneous information from the **7-Day General Report**. Whilst that is a valid data transfer, this data is definitely incorrect as presented in the above analysis. Hence the final entry to zero the 2024 Stutes Campaign account balance is simply a **plug reimbursement for campaign expenses \$2,699.38**. APOC must audit the Stutes Campaign financial records to determine the actual misused funds and unreported transactions. The Alaska voter has not provided truthful information in this disclosure report **which could not have been certified correct by the candidate as required by AS 15.13.040 (a)(2)**. (1+ Violations and forfeiture of funds to be determined)

The **2024 Year End Report** provided in the attached Stutes APOC filings has three expense disclosures highlighted in blue that are totally inadequate to convey any useful information to Alaskan voters. These three useless disclosures are an overt attempt to avoid any form of adequate sharing of information by a veteran legislator. She never had the right to file these improper trivial disclosures.

On 11.9.24 Stutes reports Campaign Lit \$1500 paid to Hackney Communications @ 2503 La Honda Drive, Anchorage, Alaska 99517. Hackney has never been a printer creating Literature. Hackney has not lived @ 2503 La Honda Drive for years. Hence this check definitely was not received at that address. **2 AAC 50.320.(b) Recordkeeping requirements** require the maintaining records of services rendered, including the name of each business from which campaign goods or services were purchased or subcontracted or media advertising placed, and the amount of the expenditure. Since this transaction is reported after election day, APOC must confirm the transaction and payment. **2 AAC 50.321 requires reporting these contractors and subcontractors and respective payments.** (2+ violations)

On 10.30.24 Stutes reports reimbursement for Campaign expenses \$1,118,95 as showed on the Stutes APOC filings. **2 AAC 50.320.(b) Recordkeeping requirements** require Stutes to gather business name and how much was charged whilst **2 AAC 50.321 requires reporting those purchases and vendor names. Furthermore, this reimbursement is not allowed if these expenses were incurred prior to 10.27.24.** (2+ violations + potential forfeiture of funds)

On 02/01/2025 Stutes posted a final reimbursement for Campaign Expenses \$2699.38. **2 AAC 50.320.(b) Recordkeeping requirements** require Stutes to gather business names and how much was paid whilst **2 AAC 50.321 requires reporting those purchases and vendor names. Furthermore, this reimbursement is not allowed as noted above if these expenses occurred prior to 1/28/25 which is almost certain.** (2+ violations)

The remaining 15 yellow highlighted expenditures on the 2024 Year End Report are not authorized in **Sec. 15.13.116. Disbursement of campaign assets after election categories** shown in the summary of applicable Sec 15.13 statues. **Sec. 15.13.112. Uses of campaign contributions held by candidate**

(b) Campaign contributions held by a candidate may NOT be

(1) used to give a personal benefit to the candidate or to another person;

(2) converted to personal income of the candidate

These 15 expenditures are not allowable. (15 violations & funds forfeited)

Civil violations are abundant here and should grow specifically as the APOC investigates. A minimum of 11 Civil Violations occurred before Feb 1, 2023. More than 1040 days have lapses since the most recent failures to comply with state law. At \$50/day for 1040 days for 11 violations, the projected civil penalty is at least \$572,000.

An additional minimum 39 Civil Violations occurred before Feb 1, 2025. More than 230 days have lapses since the most recent failures to comply with state law. At \$50/day for 230 days for 39 violations, the projected civil penalty is \$448,500.

The combined projected fine exceeds \$1,020,000 for flagrant disregard of the APOC Campaign Finance Statutes and Regulations. Speaker Stutes's House elections were not highly contested in 2022 and 2024. Hence the Alaskan Voters were not adversely impacted by Speaker Stutes unlawful actions. In 2026, Candidate Stutes is running for the Alaska State Senate. The larger senate district population must have a clear understanding of the integrity of all senate candidates including one who totally disregarding Alaska Campaign finance law and submitted these erroneous reports discussed above.

Request for Relief

I request that APOC:

1. Open a formal investigation into this income & expenditure data under AS 15.13.380.
2. Compel production of detailed receipts, invoices, and itineraries for each transaction, including the names of individuals whose travel or lodging was paid from campaign funds and whose contributions were not reported.
3. Investigate potential AS 15.13.112(b)(7) violations regarding travel provided to other legislators.
4. Impose maximum statutory penalties and require forfeiture of misused funds if violations are confirmed.
5. Refer the matter to the Attorney General if willful violations are found.

Alaska Statute Sec 15.13

Sec. 15.13.040. Contributions, expenditures, and supplying ...

(a) Except as provided in (g) and (l) of this section, each candidate shall make a full report, upon a form prescribed by the commission,

(1) listing

(A) the date and amount of all expenditures made by the candidate;

(B) the total amount of all contributions, including all funds contributed by the candidate;

(C) the name, address, date, and amount contributed by each contributor; and

(D) for contributions in excess of \$50 in the aggregate during a calendar year, the principal occupation and employer of the contributor; and

(2) filed in accordance with [AS 15.13.110](#) and certified correct by the candidate or campaign treasurer.

Sec. 15.13.110. Filing of reports.

(a) Each candidate, group, and nongroup entity shall make a full report in accordance with [AS 15.13.040](#) for the period ending three days before the due date of the report and beginning on the last day covered by the most recent previous report. If the report is a first report, it must cover the period from the beginning of the campaign to the date three days before the due date of the report. If the report is a report due February 15, it must cover the period beginning on the last day covered by the most recent previous report or on the day that the campaign started, whichever is later, and ending on February 1 of that year. The report shall be filed ...

(4) February 15 for expenditures made and contributions received that were not reported previously, including, if applicable, all amounts expended from a public office expense term account established under [AS 15.13.116\(a\)\(8\)](#) and all amounts expended from a municipal office account under [AS 15.13.116\(a\)\(9\)](#), or when expenditures were not made or contributions were not received during the previous year.

Sec. 15.13.112. Uses of campaign contributions held by candidate or group.

(a) Except as otherwise provided, campaign contributions held by a candidate or group may be used only to pay the expenses of the candidate or group, and the campaign expenses incurred by the candidate or group, that reasonably relate to election campaign activities, and in those cases only as authorized by this chapter.

(b) Campaign contributions held by a candidate or group may not be

(1) used to give a personal benefit to the candidate or to another person;

(2) converted to personal income of the candidate;

Sec. 15.13.116. Disbursement of campaign assets after election.

(a) A candidate who, after the date of the general, special, municipal, or municipal runoff election or after the date the candidate withdraws as a candidate, whichever comes first, holds unused campaign contributions shall distribute the amount held on February 1 for a general election or within 90 days after a special election. **The distribution may only be made to**

(1) pay bills incurred for expenditures reasonably related to the campaign and the winding up of the affairs of the campaign, including a victory or thank you party, thank you advertisements, and thank you gifts to campaign employees and volunteers, and to pay expenditures associated with post-election fund raising that may be needed to raise funds to pay off campaign debts;

(2) make donations, without condition, to

(A) a political party;

(B) the state's general fund;

(C) a municipality of the state; or

(D) the federal government;

(3) make donations, without condition, to organizations qualified as charitable organizations under 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3) if the organization is not controlled by the candidate or a member of the candidate's immediate family;

(4) repay loans from the candidate to the candidate's own campaign under [AS 15.13.078\(b\)](#);

(5) repay contributions to contributors, but only if repayment of the contribution is made pro rata in approximate proportion to the contributions made using one of the following, as the candidate determines:

(A) to all contributors;

(B) to contributors who have contributed most recently; or

(C) to contributors who have made larger contributions;

(7) transfer all or a portion of the unused campaign contributions to an account for a future election campaign; a transfer under this paragraph is limited to

(C) \$5,000, if transfer is made by a candidate for the state house of representatives;

(8) transfer all or a portion of the unused campaign contributions to a public office expense term account; a transfer under this paragraph is subject to the following:

(E) unused campaign contributions transferred under this paragraph must be disposed of as provided in (2), (3), or (5) of this subsection at the end of the term of office immediately following the campaign for which the contributions were received; and

(c) Property remaining after disbursements are made under (a) — (b) of this section is forfeited to the state. Within 30 days, the candidate shall deliver the property to the Department of Revenue. The Department of Revenue shall deposit any money received into the general fund and dispose of any other property in accordance with law.

2 AAC 50.320. Recordkeeping requirements. (a) A person required to report contributions or expenditures under [AS 15.13](#) shall maintain detailed records of all contributions received and expenditures made for the length of time required under [AS 15.13.111](#). The records must include (1) each contribution of any amount or value, including any loan, unless otherwise exempted by this chapter; and (2) a cumulative total of all contributions made by each contributor. (b) If an expenditure required to be reported under (a) of this section is made to an advertising agency or to an individual or business that provides campaign consultation or management services, the records must document all services rendered, including the name of each business from which campaign goods or services were purchased or subcontracted or media advertising placed, and the amount of the expenditure.

2 AAC 50.321. Reporting by a candidate, group, or nongroup entity. (a) A candidate shall file each report required under [AS 15.13.110](#) containing the information required under [AS 15.13.040](#)(a) and the following information: (1) for any monetary contribution, the check number or the identifying transaction number if paid by other means; (2) for any nonmonetary contribution with a value greater than \$100, a description of the contribution and the estimated fair market value; (3) for each loan or loan guarantee, (A) the date received; (B) the name and address of the lender and any loan guarantor or cosigner; (C) the principal occupation and employer of the lender, loan guarantor, or cosigner; (D) the interest rate; and (E) the principal amount of the loan; (4) for each contribution from the candidate to the campaign, and for income earned from contributions, including bank interest and income from unused contributions invested in compliance with [2 AAC 50.348](#), (A) the date received; (B) a description of the income; (C) the name and address of the source of the income; and (D) the amount or estimated value of the contribution or income; (5) for each paid expenditure, (A) the date of payment; (B) the check number or the identifying transaction number if paid by other means; (C) the name and address of the payee; (D) the purpose of the expenditure; and (E) the amount of the expenditure; and (6) under the debt section of the report, for each expenditure incurred but not paid, (A) the date the expenditure was incurred; (B) the name and address of the person with whom the debt was incurred; (C) the purpose of the incurred expenditure; and (D) the amount of the incurred expenditure. (b) A group shall file each report required by [AS 15.13.110](#) containing the information required in [AS 15.13.040](#)(b) and (c) and the following information: (1) for income earned from contributions, including bank interest and income from unused contributions invested in compliance with [2 AAC 50.348](#), the information required in (a)(4)(A) - (D) of this section; and (2) for each expenditure, the information required in (a)(5) and (6) of this section. (c) A nongroup entity shall file each report required by [AS 15.13.110](#) containing the information required in [AS 15.13.040](#)(j), the treasurer's certification required

under [AS 15.13.040](#)(c) and the information required under (b)(1) and (2) of this section. (d) If an expenditure required to be reported under (a) or (b) of this section is made to an advertising agency or to an individual or business that provides campaign consultation or management services, the report must disclose in detail all services rendered, including the name of each business from which campaign goods or services were purchased or subcontracted or media advertising placed, and the amount of the expenditure. (e) For any contribution, the date received is the day on which the contribution is first in the possession of a candidate, or in the possession of a treasurer or deputy treasurer of a candidate, group, or nongroup entity; (f) A candidate, group, or nongroup entity that does not receive any contribution and does not make any expenditure in a reporting period may file a zero report for that period by filing the campaign disclosure report with the "no activity" box checked. (g) A candidate, group, or nongroup entity shall amend a report filed as required under [AS 15.13.110](#) if the value of any transaction in the report is incorrect or subsequently becomes incorrect, even if the value was accurate at the time of initial filing, if the change in value of any transaction is greater than or equal to \$100. The treasurer shall amend the report not later than 10 days after the date the correct value is known, or if within nine days of an election, not later than 24 hours. (h) In the nine days preceding an election, contributions in excess of \$250 in the aggregate from a single source shall be reported to the commission not later than 24 hours after receipt, as required under [AS 15.13.110](#)(b), and must disclose the contributor, aggregate amount, and date received.

2 AAC 50.990. Definitions.

(7) "contribution"

(C) Does not include

(ix) the use of personal money or credit by a campaign treasurer or deputy treasurer for an expenditure allowable under [AS 15.13.112](#),
if the amount does not exceed \$500 and is repaid before the end of the report cycle in which the expenditure was made; or

(x) the use of personal money or credit by a candidate for an authorized campaign expenditure,

if the amount is repaid no later than three days after the date of the expenditure;
