Regulatory Reform Plan

Section 1: The Agency's Baseline Calculation

Baseline number for discretionary regulations: 108

Total guidance documents: 13; 44 pages

Regulations under Title 6: Governor's Office are divided into several parts: Elections, State Commission for Human Rights, Division of Budget and Management, Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, Lieutenant Governor, Governor, and Election Precincts. All other parts have been relocated or repealed.

In this baseline count, we included discretionary regulatory requirements that fall under the following sections:

Part 2. State Commission for Human Rights (6 AAC 30.010 – 6 AAC 30.990)

Part 2A. Division of Budget and Management (6 AAC 40.010 – 6 AAC 50.990)

Part 4. Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (6 AAC 65.010 – 6 AAC 65.990)

Part 7. Lieutenant Governor (6 AAC 88.010 – 6 AAC 91.900)

Part 8. Governor (6 AAC 93.010 – 6 AAC 93.900)

To ensure the efficient administration of elections during an election year, Part 1. Elections (6 AAC 25.010 – 6 AAC 28.900) and Part 10. Election Precincts (6 AAC 100.010 – 6 AAC 400.020) were excluded from this review.

This count also excludes Title 6, Chapter 94 (6 AAC 94.200 - 6 AAC 94.990) which governs Disaster Assistance Programs. These programs, while regulated by the Governor's Office in accordance with AS 26.23.300(e), are administered by the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA). To ensure these regulations are reviewed as effectively as possible, they have been included in DMVA's baseline and regulatory reduction plan, along with all guidance documents associated with these programs.

The Office of the Governor itself does not have any guidance documents. However the Alaska State Commission for Human Rights (ASCHR) has 13 guidance documents, totaling 44 pages: [Alaska State Human Rights Commission Guidance Documents - Alaska Online Public Notices](#)

Section 2: Stakeholder Engagement

Written stakeholder feedback was solicited from the public from 11/11/25 to 12/16/25 regarding 6 AAC 40.010 – 6 AAC 95.900. Additionally, ASCHR solicited written comment for regulations within 6 AAC 30.011 – 30.990 from 12/29/25 to 3/31/26.

No written comments were received.

Section 3: Proposed Regulatory Reform

Administrative Order (AO) 360 requires a 15% reduction in regulatory requirements by December 31, 2026, and a 25% reduction by December 31, 2027. For the Office of the Governor, meeting this target means reducing the baseline by 27 regulatory requirements.

After completing the baseline count and regulatory review, the Office of the Governor identified 42 regulatory requirements and two guidance documents for reform, resulting in a 39 percent reduction of regulatory requirements and 45 percent reduction of guidance document pages. The Office of the Governor will complete these reductions by November 30, 2026.

Regulations identified for reform have been categorized into the following projects, which will be submitted to the Department of Law for review in Quarter 3 of 2026:

- Federal Budget Impact Fund (6 AAC 40) *Repeal*
- Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (6 AAC 65.010 – 6 AAC 65.990) *with drafting assistance from the Department of Administration*
- Alaska State Commission for Human Rights (6 AAC 30.011 – 30.990) *with drafting assistance from ASCHR*

Additional Efforts:

Prior to the issuance of AO 360, the Lieutenant Governor’s Office conducted a comprehensive review and update of notary regulations and is actively involved in a modernization initiative for apostille and notary processes. These efforts are outlined in the attached document, “Lt. Governor AO 360 Regulatory Reform Efforts.”

AO 360’s Regulatory Reduction Guide credits changes that make regulatory compliance easier, even if they do not reduce the overall number of requirements. As such, the recent and ongoing efforts of the Lieutenant Governor’s Office to promote regulatory clarity and ease of compliance are credited toward the Office of the Governor’s reduction goals in the attached “OOG Baseline and Proposed Regulatory Reform” document.

Review process and rationale for sections not recommended for reform:

6 AAC 93.010 – 6 AAC 93.990 regulates the decennial review of the Western Alaska Community Development Quota (CDQ) groups. This review is led by the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development (DCCED) with input from the Department of Fish and Game (DFG) and the Department of Labor and Workforce Development (DLWD). The most recent CDQ review was conducted in 2022.

Employees from DCCED, DFG, and DLWD who worked on the 2022 review evaluated current regulations and reported that they are clear, precise, and align with actual review practices. They also reported that these regulations do not add any burdensome requirements beyond federal requirements and therefore recommended no changes to this portion of Title 6.

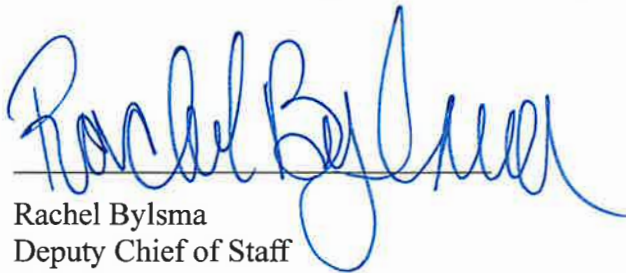
