- Detailed project planning, specifications, and risk assessment information.
- Supports a multi-use trail network.

- Confirmation of trail segments included within the application area.

- Clarification regarding de minimis calculations.

- Additional detail regarding prior award performance and history.

- Application demonstrates significant organizational capacity.
- Budget presentation would benefit from additional detail and supporting documentation.

Hatcher Pass**Strengths**

(STEP 1) Set a reasonable efficiency cap. In this example, we calculated the average program-wide \$/mile (excluding match at this step) which gives us \$1995.08 per mile (\$4,244,425 ÷ 2127.45 miles)
(STEP 2) Calculation of "capped required match" for each club as follows: capped required match =
(STEP 3) Sum all capped required match as new denominator to calculate final distribution (\$120k pro-OUTCOME: This method is fair, transparent, and automatically rewards efficiency.

Why this is the most equitable and defensible method:

- Final pro-rata factor = $120,000 / 302,992 \approx 39.6\%$ of each club's capped required match. So each club gets 67.48% of their capped match amount (clubs under \$1,995.08/mile get 39.60% of their actual required match — a big reward; clubs over \$1,995.08/mile get much less than they asked for). Why this is the most equitable and defensible method Every club gets something (no zeros)
- Easy to explain: "We cap the recognized cost-per-mile at the current program average of \$1,995.08. Match is calculated on the lower of your actual rate or the cap, then pro-rated so the total equals available funds."
- Efficient clubs (low \$/mile) are completely unaffected — they get ~39.60% of their full required match
- Inefficient clubs are not rewarded with outsized match utilization based on larger grant requests in a transparent, formula-driven way
- Strongly incentivizes clubs to lower their cost-per-mile in future years

Summary of Changes

Multi-Use Trails Reviewer Instructions, Staff Review, and Score Sheet Revised following the July 21, 2026 ARTAC meeting

DOT&PF revised the draft Multi-Use Trails scoring materials following ARTAC's July 21 discussion. The revisions separate administrative eligibility review from ARTAC's evaluation of project merit, clarify reviewer procedures, and adjust the scoring criteria to reflect the committee's comments regarding readiness, rural community context, public benefit, community support, and budget review.

1. Administrative requirements moved out of ARTAC scoring

A separate **DOT&PF Staff Review** was added for completion before applications are provided to ARTAC. Staff will review administrative and eligibility matters on a pass/fail basis, including:

- Application completeness;
- Applicant and project eligibility;
- SCORP or other qualifying trail-plan alignment;
- Public recreational purpose;
- Land ownership and public access;
- Environmental and permitting information;
- Budget completeness;
- Match compliance; and
- Required maps and location information.

Staff will determine whether an application should proceed to ARTAC scoring, be held for clarification, or not advance.

This change responds to ARTAC's discussion that application completeness and match compliance should be handled as administrative requirements rather than receive points in the competitive score.

2. Reviewer instructions expanded

The reviewer instructions were expanded to provide more consistent direction on:

- Independent scoring and use of the full point range;
- The information reviewers may consider;
- Written explanations for unusually high or low scores;
- Fair evaluation of rural and smaller communities;
- Submission of applicant questions through DOT&PF staff;
- Distribution of the same clarification information to all reviewers;
- Discussion and revision of preliminary scores during the public scoring meeting; and
- The finalization of scores at the conclusion of the meeting.

The revised instructions also clarify that reviewers should evaluate project substance rather than writing style, formatting, or professional presentation.

3. Applicant questions and clarification process formalized

The revised document establishes a consistent process for application questions. ARTAC members will submit questions to DOT&PF staff rather than contacting applicants directly. Staff will obtain written responses and distribute the same information to the entire committee before scoring.

This reflects ARTAC’s discussion about completing clarification before scoring and ensuring that every reviewer receives the same information.

4. Scoring categories reorganized

The score remains based on **100 total points**, but the categories and point values were revised as follows:

5. Applicant capacity separated from project readiness

The former **Applicant Capacity and Readiness** category was revised to focus on the applicant’s organizational ability, experience, partnerships, responsibilities, and long-term maintenance or stewardship plan.

Project readiness is now evaluated separately under **Project Readiness and Timeline**, with consideration of land access, environmental review, permitting, design, procurement, match commitments, milestones, and the ability to proceed after award.

This reflects the committee’s discussion about applicant responsibility when contractors are used and the importance of giving greater consideration to project readiness.

6. Project narrative criterion revised

“Completeness” was removed from the title of the narrative criterion to avoid overlap with the administrative completeness review. The revised **Project Narrative** criterion focuses on whether the application clearly connects the identified need, proposed work, and expected results.

The criterion increased from 8 to 10 points.

This change reflects ARTAC’s recommendation to remove “completeness” from the criterion title.

7. Project readiness and timeline strengthened

The former 10-point timeline category was replaced with a 15-point **Project Readiness and Timeline** category. The revised criterion places greater emphasis on whether required land access, environmental review, permitting, design, procurement, match, and partner commitments are complete or on a realistic path to completion.

The scoring guidance uses “shovel-ready” as a program scoring term and clarifies that it is not intended as a statutory definition.

8. Public benefit expanded and combined with plan alignment

The public-benefit category increased from 16 to 22 points and now expressly includes alignment with the Alaska SCORP or another qualifying recreational trail plan.

The revised criterion considers:

- Documented public need;
- Public access and availability;
- Connectivity and missing links;
- Safety, health, social, and recreational benefits;
- Multiple user groups;
- Accessibility and inclusion;
- Historic or traditional access, including historic trails and RS 2477 routes;
- Long-term public value; and
- SCORP or trail-plan goals.

The guidance clarifies that reviewers should not rely solely on population or estimated user totals and should consider the importance of the benefit in the context of the community.

This responds to ARTAC’s concerns that numerical user estimates could disadvantage rural communities and its request to expressly recognize historic access.

9. Community support and partnerships increased

The community-support category increased from 15 to 20 points and was renamed **Community Support, Engagement, and Partnerships**.

The revised criterion considers engagement with communities, tribes, landowners, agencies, user groups, partners, and the public. It also recognizes documented commitments of funds, labor, equipment, materials, and other local resources.

The scoring guidance clarifies that opposition does not automatically reduce a score; reviewers should consider whether concerns were acknowledged and meaningfully addressed. This reflects ARTAC’s discussion regarding the importance of community support while avoiding rigid numerical standards that could disadvantage smaller communities.

10. Budget categories combined

The two former budget categories—**Budget Quality and Accuracy** and **Budget Reasonableness and Alignment**—were combined into one 10-point category.

The revised criterion evaluates mathematical accuracy, documentation, reasonableness, relationship to the scope and schedule, cost effectiveness, and appropriate consideration of rural or remote delivery conditions.

This reflects ARTAC's recommendation to combine the two budget sections.

11. Historic access added throughout the materials

Historic access trails and RS 2477 routes were added as identified project types and are expressly included in the public-benefit scoring guidance where relevant.

This responds to the committee's request to recognize projects that preserve or reopen historic access.

Requested ARTAC action

DOT&PF requests that ARTAC review the revised Multi-Use Trails Reviewer Instructions, Staff Review, and Score Sheet and provide a recommendation regarding their use for the upcoming Multi-Use Trails application cycle.

REVIEWER INSTRUCTIONS

Purpose of Scoring

The purpose of this scoring process is to evaluate applications fairly, consistently, and based on demonstrated project value, readiness, community support, public benefit, and alignment with the Alaska Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP).

General Guidance

- Score each application independently before the Alaska Recreational Trails Advisory Committee (ARTAC) scoring meeting using the criteria provided.
- Apply scoring consistently across all applications.
- Base scores on information provided in the application and on written applicant responses distributed by DOT&PF program staff. Do not rely on outside information, assumptions, or personal knowledge that is not available to the full committee.
- Use the full scoring range. A strong response may receive all available points, while a weak or unaddressed response may receive few or no points. Do not default to a middle score merely because it feels safer.
- Match the application to the closest scoring description. When a response falls between two scoring levels, select the lower score unless the higher score is clearly supported.
- Provide written justification for unusually high or low scores and identify material concerns that should be discussed by the committee.
- Written justification and evaluation notes may be subject to public disclosure and should remain factual, objective, and professional.

Examples of Using the Full Point Range

Level	Typical percentage	General example
Highest	90–100%	The criterion is fully addressed, well supported, and presents little or no uncertainty. For a 10-point item, a score of 9 or 10 may be appropriate.
Strong	70–89%	The criterion is addressed well, with only minor gaps or concerns. For a 10-point item, a score of 7 or 8 may be appropriate.
Adequate	40–69%	The minimum information is present, but important detail, documentation, or clarity is limited. For a 10-point item, a score of 4 to 6 may be appropriate.
Weak	1–39%	The response is incomplete, poorly supported, or raises significant concerns. For a 10-point item, a score of 1 to 3 may be appropriate.
Not addressed	0%	The application does not address the criterion, or the information provided does not demonstrate any creditable response.

Community Context and Fairness

- Evaluate projects considering size of community, project’s location, available resources and workforce capacity of the applicant and community.

- Do not disregard proposals from smaller or rural communities solely because they have a lower population, fewer users, fewer staff, or a less polished application.
- Do not score writing style, grammar, formatting, or professional graphic design beyond what is needed to understand and evaluate the project.
- Focus on whether the project is feasible, addresses a demonstrated need, is appropriately scaled, and provides meaningful public benefit.
- Do not rely solely on the number of people served. A project serving a small community or resolving critical regional access need may score highly when its benefit is well demonstrated.

Applicant Questions and Communications

- ARTAC members must submit questions for applicants to DOT&PF program staff at least **two weeks** before the scheduled scoring meeting.
- Committee members may not contact applicants directly about an application during the review and scoring process.
- DOT&PF program staff will compile questions, obtain applicant responses, and distribute all questions and responses to the entire committee so that every reviewer has access to the same information.
- Only information in the application or in official written responses distributed by DOT&PF may be used to revise a score.

Public Scoring Meeting and Final Scores

- The ARTAC scoring meeting will include public discussion of the applications and preliminary scores.
- Committee members may revise their scores during the meeting based on the committee discussion and official information available to all reviewers.
- Reviewers should not change a score solely to match another reviewer; any revision should reflect the reviewer's own judgment after discussion.
- Scores submitted at the conclusion of the public scoring meeting will be considered final.

What Reviewers Should Not Consider

- Personal knowledge with or opinions regarding the applicant.
- External information not included in the application or distributed by DOT&PF.
- Assumptions about community support, opposition, land access, or readiness that are not supported by the record.
- A preference for one project type, geographic area, user group, or organization over another.
- Whether the application was professionally written, except where the lack of clarity prevents evaluation of the project.

DOT&PF STAFF REVIEW

DOT&PF program staff complete this review before ARTAC scoring. Pass/fail determinations should be supported by staff notes. Applications that do not pass a required eligibility item should not proceed to ARTAC scoring unless the deficiency is resolved in accordance with the solicitation and program procedures.
