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SECTION 1. INTRODUCTION & INSTRUCTIONS

SEC. 1.01 PURPOSE OF THE IRFP

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, Alaska Army National Guard Facilities Management Office, Environmental Section, is soliciting proposals from qualified Contractors to conduct a wetland delineation of the approximately 4.57-acre Project Area at the Alaska Army National Guard (AKARNG) Nome Army Aviation Operating Facility (AAOF).

SEC. 1.02 BUDGET

Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, Alaska Army National Guard Facilities Management Office, Environmental Section, estimates a budget of between \$45,000.00 and \$50,000.00 dollars for completion of this project. Proposals priced at more than \$50,000.00 will be considered non-responsive.

Approval or continuation of a contract resulting from this IRFP is contingent upon legislative appropriation.

SEC. 1.03 DEADLINE FOR RECEIPT OF PROPOSALS

Proposals must be received no later than 2:00 P.M. prevailing Alaska Time on September 21, 2026. Late proposals or amendments will be disqualified and not opened or accepted for evaluation.

SEC. 1.04 PRIOR EXPERIENCE

In order for offers to be considered responsive offerors must meet these minimum prior experience requirements:

- Lead wetland delineator: bachelor's degree in environmental science, biology, ecology, natural resources, soil science, or closely related discipline.
- Lead wetland delineator: at least five (5) years of professional experience conducting wetland delineations or comparable wetland assessment work.
- Lead wetland delineator shall demonstrate experience applying applicable USACE methodology and the Alaska Regional Supplement.
- GIS personnel shall have sufficient experience to produce accurate, usable, and documented GIS data.

An offeror's failure to meet these minimum prior experience requirements will cause their proposal to be considered non-responsive and rejected.

SEC. 1.05 REQUIRED REVIEW

Offerors should carefully review this solicitation for defects and questionable or objectionable material. Comments concerning defects and questionable or objectionable material should be made in writing and received by the procurement officer at least ten days before the deadline for receipt of proposals. This will allow time for the issuance of any necessary amendments. It will also help prevent the opening of a defective proposal and exposure of offeror's proposals upon which award could not be made.

SEC. 1.06 QUESTIONS PRIOR TO DEADLINE FOR RECEIPT OF PROPOSALS

All questions must be in writing and directed to the procurement officer. The interested party must confirm telephone conversations in writing.

Two types of questions generally arise. One may be answered by directing the questioner to a specific section of the IRFP. These questions may be answered over the telephone. Other questions may be more complex and may require a written amendment to the IRFP. The procurement officer will make that decision.

If submitting a proposal via email, the technical proposal and cost proposal must be saved as separate PDF documents and emailed to MvaDasProcurement@alaska.gov as separate, clearly labeled attachments, such as “Vendor A – Technical Proposal.pdf” and “Vendor A – Cost Proposal.pdf” (Vendor A is the name of the offeror). The email must contain the IRFP number in the subject line.

The **maximum** size of a single email (including all text and attachments) that can be received by the state is **20mb (megabytes)**. If the email containing the proposal exceeds this size, the proposal must be sent in multiple emails that are each less than 20 megabytes and each email must comply with the requirements described above.

SEC. 1.08 PROPOSAL CONTENTS

The following information must be included in all proposals.

(a) AUTHORIZED SIGNATURE

All proposals must be signed by an individual authorized to bind the offeror to the provisions of the IRFP. Proposals must remain open and valid for at least 90-days from the date set as the deadline for receipt of proposals.

(b) OFFEROR'S CERTIFICATION

By signature on the proposal, offerors certify that they comply with the following:

- A. the laws of the State of Alaska;
- B. the applicable portion of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964;
- C. the Equal Employment Opportunity Act and the regulations issued thereunder by the federal government;
- D. the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and the regulations issued thereunder by the federal government;
- E. all terms and conditions set out in this IRFP;

- F. a condition that the proposal submitted was independently arrived at, without collusion, under penalty of perjury; and
- G. that the offers will remain open and valid for at least 90 days.

If any offeror fails to comply with [a] through [g] of this paragraph, the state reserves the right to disregard the proposal, terminate the contract, or consider the contractor in default.

(c) VENDOR TAX ID

A valid Vendor Tax ID must be submitted to the issuing office with the proposal or within five days of the state's request.

(d) CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Each proposal shall include a statement indicating whether or not the firm or any individuals working on the contract has a possible conflict of interest (e.g., currently employed by the State of Alaska or formerly employed by the State of Alaska within the past two years) and, if so, the nature of that conflict. The procurement officer reserves the right to **consider a proposal non-responsive and reject it** or cancel the award if any interest disclosed from any source could either give the appearance of a conflict or cause speculation as to the objectivity of the contract to be performed by the offeror.

SEC. 1.09 ASSISTANCE TO OFFERORS WITH A DISABILITY

Offerors with a disability may receive accommodation regarding the means of communicating this IRFP or participating in the procurement process. For more information, contact the procurement officer no later than ten days prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals.

SEC. 1.10 AMENDMENTS TO PROPOSALS

Amendments to or withdrawals of proposals will only be allowed if acceptable requests are received prior to the deadline that is set for receipt of proposals. No amendments or withdrawals will be accepted after the deadline unless they are in response to the state's request in accordance with 2 AAC 12.290.

SEC. 1.11 AMENDMENTS TO THE IRFP

If an amendment is issued, it will be provided to all who were notified of the IRFP and to those who have registered with the procurement officer after receiving the IRFP from the State of Alaska Online Public Notice website.

SEC. 1.12 IRFP SCHEDULE

The IRFP schedule set out herein represents the State of Alaska's best estimate of the schedule that will be followed. If a component of this schedule, such as the deadline for receipt of proposals, is delayed, the rest of the schedule may be shifted accordingly. All times are Alaska Time.

This IRFP does not, by itself, obligate the state. The state's obligation will commence when the contract is approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, or the Commissioner's designee. Upon written notice to the contractor, the state may set a different starting date for the contract. The state will not be responsible for any work done by the contractor, even work done in good faith, if it occurs prior to the contract start date set by the state.

SEC. 1.13 ALTERNATE PROPOSALS

Offerors may only submit one proposal for evaluation.

In accordance with 2 AAC 12.830 alternate proposals (proposals that offer something different than what is asked for) will be rejected.

SECTION 2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

SEC. 2.01 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In accordance with Army Regulation 200-1 Chapter 4-2, the Sikes Act and Executive Orders 11988 and 11990, a wetland survey should be conducted at military installations as needed based on mission demands and impacts for proper resource management. Currently, there is no wetland survey or updated report for this property, and one is necessary to maintain compliance with environmental regulations, including the Sikes Act and Clean Water Act. Failure to obtain wetland data will result in ongoing data gaps that will hinder mission readiness and resource management. Data gaps are likely to result in inadequate guidance in the planning process. Without reliable data the opportunity for unpermitted Clean Water Act activities increases, which could result in significant fines and delays in military trainings or construction projects.

Information on wetland types, boundaries and jurisdictional status on or adjacent to the property are incomplete. Historical records documenting wetlands are limited to Department of Transportation airport planning documents. Maps from other government agencies show differing wetland classifications and boundary locations, thus justifying the need for an accurate wetland evaluation. An updated Delineation Survey will better support compliance with environmental regulations, project planning discussions and land management decisions as required by Sikes Act. In addition, it will identify areas subject to Clean Water Act permitting needs to guide larger installation and training planning efforts. A new jurisdictional determination may be warranted due to federal regulation changes in the definition of Waters of the United States (WOTUS) and the need to properly manage and protect the wetland resource in accordance with Executive Order 11990

SECTION 3. SCOPE OF WORK & CONTRACT INFORMATION

SEC. 3.01 SCOPE OF WORK

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, Alaska Army National Guard Facilities Management Office, Environmental Section, is soliciting proposals from qualified Contractors to conduct a wetland delineation of the approximately 4.57-acre Project Area at the Alaska Army National Guard (AKARNG) Nome Army Aviation Operating Facility (AAOF). The selected Contractor must perform desktop review, field investigation, wetland delineation, hydrologic feature identification, GIS mapping, preparation of a wetland delineation report, and preparation of supporting materials for a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Jurisdictional Determination.

The Contractor shall conduct the delineation in accordance with the applicable USACE wetland delineation manual and Alaska Regional Supplement as identified in this scope. The Contractor shall document wetland boundaries, sampling locations, soils, vegetation, hydrology, photographs, and other relevant field observations. The Contractor shall prepare draft and final reports and provide all associated GIS and electronic data. The Contractor shall make recommendations and provide technical support to the Project Manager, within the limits of the scope, if an official Jurisdictional Determination is warranted.

PROJECT AREA

The Wetland Delineation Survey will be performed at the AKARNG AAOF in Nome, Alaska. The area of survey includes the AKARNG 4.57-acre parcel of mixed undisturbed and developed land but could extend offsite beyond leased land boundaries if necessary to accurately depict the wetland landscape or classify a wetland feature, see attached map in Section 26. However, delineating offsite shall be within the project limits boundary, authorized in advance and mentioned in the field work plan. Limited offsite wetland delineation is part of the base scope. See facility diagram in Section 26 for project limits boundary.

APPLICABLE LAWS, REGULATIONS, STANDARDS AND GUIDANCE

The Contractor shall comply with applicable Federal, State, and local laws; Technical Standards and Guidance. The wetland delineation shall be conducted using the applicable U.S. Army Corps of Engineers wetland delineation methodology and Alaska Regional Supplement in effect at the time of field investigation, unless otherwise directed in writing by the Project Manager.

Applicable requirements may include but are not limited to:

- 16 USC 670 Sikes Act;
- Executive Order 11988, Floodplain Management;
- Executive Order 11990, Protection of Wetlands;
- Army Regulation 200-1;
- U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual (1987) and Regional Supplement to the Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual: Alaska Region (Version 2.0, 2007)
- U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resource Conservation Service Field Indicators of Hydric Soils in Alaska Guide (2005)
- U.S. Army Corps of Engineers National Wetland Plant List Alaska Region (2022)

- Plants of the Pacific Northwest Coast (Pojar 2004)
- Alaska Trees and Shrubs (Viereck 2007)
- National Wetland Inventory (NWI) mapping standards in accordance with Federal Geographic Data Committee (FGDC)
- U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Data Collection Requirements and Procedures for Mapping Wetland, Deepwater, and Related Habitats of the United States
- and other applicable federal, State of Alaska, and local requirements.

The Contractor shall identify in the final report the technical guidance and methodology used to conduct the delineation. If applicable regulatory or technical requirements change during contract performance and the change materially affects the Contractor's scope, schedule, or level of effort, the parties shall address the change in accordance with the contract's changing procedures.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

The Contractor shall provide all labor, supervision, equipment, materials, transportation, technical expertise, and other resources necessary to complete the base scope unless specifically identified as Government-furnished.

The base scope includes project management and coordination; desktop research and records review; field work planning; wetland delineation field investigation; identification and documentation of hydrologic features; GPS and photographic documentation; creating GIS maps and data layers; draft and final Wetland Delineation Reports; responses to Government review comments; providing support and required data if an official Jurisdictional Determination is warranted based on the delineation findings.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT

Contract Award

The Contractor shall commence contract administration and project planning upon receipt of the Contract Award. The Contractor shall provide a Project Work Plan and Preliminary Schedule to the Project Manager within ten (10) business days of scheduling the Kickoff Meeting. All field and technical work shall be scheduled in accordance with the approved project schedule.

Kickoff Meeting

The Contractor shall coordinate a project kickoff meeting with the Project Manager within forty-five (45) days after receipt of the Contract Award, unless an alternative date is mutually agreed upon.

The kickoff meeting shall address the work plan and methodology; schedule and milestones; field work timing; access and security; Government-furnished information; communications; deliverables; constraints; and outstanding issues. The Contractor shall provide a meeting agenda and brief meeting summary.

Monthly Project Updates

The Contractor shall provide monthly project status updates while active work is underway. Updates may be conducted by videoconference, telephone, electronic communication, or in person, as agreed by the Project Manager. Updates shall address work completed; upcoming work; schedule status; issues or constraints; proposed solutions; upcoming field activities; and invoice or billing issues, as applicable.

Requests for Information

The Contractor shall respond to routine requests for information from the Project Manager within five (5) business days. If the information cannot reasonably be provided within that period, the Contractor shall provide a status update and estimated response date.

DESKTOP REVIEW AND RESEARCH

The Contractor shall compile and review previous environmental reports, wetland maps, GIS data, aerial imagery, topographic and hydrologic information, historical photographs, available soil information, project/construction documents, Section 404 permit information, site-modification and drainage information, relevant public agency records, and other readily available information necessary to support the delineation.

The Contractor may conduct interviews as necessary to clarify historical land use, site modifications, drainage patterns, or other relevant information. The Government will provide available information in its possession or reasonably available to it. The Contractor shall identify significant information gaps that may affect the delineation.

FIELD WORK PLAN

At least ten (10) business days before the planned site visit, the Contractor shall submit a Field Work Plan identifying proposed field dates, areas/features to be investigated, sampling and soil approach, personnel, points of contact, access and mobilization, equipment/resources, schedule, safety considerations, and anticipated limitations or constraints. The Government shall review the Field Work Plan and provide comments or approval prior to field work.

WETLAND DELINEATION FIELD INVESTIGATION

The Contractor shall conduct an on-site wetland delineation investigation using applicable USACE methodology and the applicable Alaska Regional Supplement.

Field activities shall include, as appropriate, vegetation evaluation; hydrology evaluation; soil profile investigation; applicable data forms; wetland boundary identification; hydrologic feature identification; documentation of disturbed/modified areas; drainage and hydrologic modifications; GPS documentation; georeferenced JPEG photographs; recording any field information necessary to support the report and collecting GIS data.

The number and location of sampling points and soil pits shall be determined by the Contractor based on professional judgment and applicable methodology. Sufficient field data shall be collected to support delineated boundaries.

SITE ACCESS, SAFETY, AND SECURITY

The Contractor shall coordinate all access to AKARNG facilities with the Project Manager. The Government will identify known facility access, security, operational, and safety requirements.

The Contractor shall comply with applicable installation safety and security requirements and shall not interfere with military operations. Restricted areas shall not be entered without authorization.

The Contractor shall not disturb suspected hazardous materials, unexploded ordinance, or other potentially hazardous materials beyond activities necessary to perform the delineation. If hazardous or unusual conditions are encountered, the affected activity shall cease and the Project Manager shall be notified.

FIELD DOCUMENTATION

Within ten (10) business days following completion of field work, the Contractor shall provide a Field Report including legible field notes, completed delineation data forms, georeferenced photographs, a summary of field activities, significant limitations or unusual conditions, and a narrative summary not exceeding approximately one page unless additional detail is necessary. The Field Report shall be submitted electronically in PDF format.

GIS DATA AND MAPPING

The Contractor shall prepare GIS data supporting the wetland delineation.

- Project Area boundary.
- Wetland boundaries.
- Wetland sample points.
- Hydrologic and drainage features.
- Significant site modifications.
- Georeferenced photographs (WGS84 coordinate system).
- Other field observation locations and features necessary to represent the investigation.

Data should be in World Geodetic System 1984 (WGS84) using decimal degrees to six decimal places. GIS data shall be provided in an ESRI-compatible format (Geodatabase .gdb containing all data layers created) unless another format is approved by the Project Manager. The Contractor shall provide sufficient metadata and attribute information to allow the Government to understand and use the data. The coordinate system and datum shall be identified in the final report (standard is WGS84). GIS data shall be spatially consistent with report maps and figures. Contractor shall follow the NWI mapping standards for collecting specific wetland attribute fields such as system, subsystem, class, as well as capturing characterization indicators like vegetation, soils, and hydrology.

Using Global Navigation Satellite Systems (GNSS), the Contractor will create data layers from Field Investigation work, such as wetland boundaries based on wetland classification, sample locations, and collect data for any physical characteristics of potential Waters of the U.S. or other significant non-regulated hydrologic features. The Contractor shall produce sub-centimeter or better positional data accuracy. This level of detail is essential for drawing defensible boundaries. If this is unreasonable, then the Contractor shall use GNSS equipment capable of producing positional accuracy appropriate for wetland mapping at the scale and scope of the Project. Project location is within the Alaskan real-time kinematic (RTK) network on the publicly available ACORN GNSS website and collected positional data can be leveraged for sub-centimeter accuracy.

WETLAND DELINEATION REPORT

The Contractor shall prepare a Draft Wetland Delineation Report documenting methodology, field investigation, findings, wetland boundaries, and supporting information.

a) Executive Summary

Concise summary of the project, methodology, principal findings, and conclusions.

b) Project Description

Description of the Project Area, facilities, land use, and purpose.

c) Methodology

Desktop review, field methods, delineation methodology, sampling, soils, vegetation, hydrology, GPS/GIS methods, and applicable technical guidance.

d) Site Maps

Project boundaries and relevant physical/environmental features, including Government-provided easements, trails, mining claims or other known restrictions, wetlands, sample locations, soil pits, hydrologic features, and other relevant features.

e) Topography and Hydrology

Available topographic/aerial information, watershed characteristics, water features, drainage patterns, and direction of water movement.

f) Historical Conditions and Site Modifications

Significant historical land-use changes and modifications identified through available records, imagery, interviews, or other relevant information.

g) Vegetation and Land Use

Current vegetation communities and land use relevant to wetland identification.

h) Floodplain Information

Qualitative discussion of available floodplain and flood-risk information, including FEMA or other applicable mapping. A formal hydrologic/hydraulic study is not included unless authorized by written modification.

i) Hydrologic Modifications

Observed or identified ditches, culverts, subsurface drainage, dams, berms, channelization, irrigation, diversions, water additions, and modified topography.

j) Soils

Soil profile descriptions and mapped/GPS-identified soil investigation locations.

k) Wetland Delineation Data Forms

Applicable completed data forms in the report or appendices.

l) Erosion and Sedimentation Observations

Significant observed erosion/sedimentation conditions and general recommendations for typical land use. A formal erosion and sedimentation control plan is not included.

m) Conclusions and Recommendations

Including but not limited to wetland presence/boundaries, conveyances to Waters of the United States (WOTUS), hydrologic features, data limitations, potential regulatory considerations, and recommendations to mitigate wetland impacts resulting from property use. Technical findings shall be distinguished from regulatory determinations. Contractor shall discuss in this report section if a Jurisdictional Determination is warranted based on wetland delineation findings and provide technical support to the Project Manager regarding next steps. Technical support is considered complete once final deliveries and data have been submitted and accepted by the Project Manager.

STATE OF ALASKA FURNISHED INFORMATION AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Government will provide information in its possession or reasonably available to it, which may include Project Area boundaries, maps, GIS data, aerial imagery, historical photographs, environmental reports, wetland

information, project documentation, Section 404 permit information, facility information, and other relevant records.

The Government will provide reasonable access; identify known access/security requirements; coordinate installation access; review deliverables; provide consolidated comments, as practicable; coordinate Government-level regulatory communication; and review/accept or reject deliverables in accordance with the contract.

Government-furnished information is based on information available to the Government and is not warranted to be complete or error-free.

CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES

The Contractor shall:

- Provide qualified personnel.
- Provide necessary equipment and field resources.
- Perform work in accordance with applicable technical standards.
- Maintain quality control over all work.
- Ensure accuracy and completeness of Contractor-generated technical information.
- Coordinate subcontractor activities.
- Protect Government-furnished information.
- Comply with applicable safety and security requirements.
- Notify the Project Manager of conditions that may materially affect cost, schedule, or technical quality.
- Maintain documentation supporting conclusions in the final report.

The Contractor shall be responsible for the quality of work performed by its employees, consultants, and subcontractors.

COMMUNICATION AND REGULATORY COORDINATION

The Program Manager and Alternate points of contact listed in Points of Contact will determine the appropriate agency point of contact and shall participate in or authorize regulatory coordination as appropriately. The Contractor shall not initiate substantive regulatory coordination concerning the Project without prior authorization from the Project Manager.

QUALITY ASSURANCE/QUALITY CONTROL

The Contractor shall maintain an internal QA/QC process appropriate to the project. Before submitting each major deliverable, the Contractor shall review it for technical accuracy, completeness, internal consistency, GIS/map consistency, source documentation, field-data documentation, methodology compliance, and SOW compliance. Field Work and Deliverables will be considered acceptable by the Project Manager when they satisfy the requirements of this scope of work. The Contractor shall resolve any Project Manager or DMVA CFMO comments that are within the project scope of work.

ASSUMPTIONS AND CONSTRAINTS

- Government will provide available existing information in a timely manner.
- Government will provide reasonable access to the Project Area.

- Government will coordinate installation access and known security requirements.
- Field work will occur during conditions reasonably suitable for wetland delineation.
- Formal floodplain engineering is excluded.
- Formal erosion and sedimentation control planning is excluded.
- Hazardous materials investigation/remediation is excluded.
- Unexploded ordinance investigation is excluded.
- Contractor is not responsible for the timing or outcome of a regulatory JD.
- Regulatory requests requiring substantial additional field work or technical analysis may constitute additional work.

CHANGES TO SCOPE

The scope may be modified when project findings, regulatory requirements, or unforeseen site conditions demonstrate a need for additional work. No additional work shall be performed without written Government authorization. Changes materially affecting level of effort, cost, or schedule shall be addressed through the applicable contract modification process. The Contractor shall promptly notify the Project Manager of conditions that may require a change. Verbal discussions do not constitute authorization for additional work.

ADDITIONAL SERVICES

The following are excluded from the base scope unless specifically authorized:

- Additional wetland delineation field mobilizations beyond those reasonably necessary to complete the base delineation.
- Formal floodplain engineering analysis.
- Formal erosion and sedimentation control planning.
- Hazardous materials investigation or remediation.
- Unexploded ordinance investigation.
- Surveying requiring a licensed land surveyor.
- Construction design.
- Permitting.
- Additional regulatory meetings or negotiations beyond reasonable technical support.
- Additional field investigations requested after completion of the base delineation.
- Substantial revisions resulting from changes in regulatory requirements occurring after completion of the Contractor's work.

CONTRACT COMPLETION

The contract shall be considered complete when the Contractor has:

- Completed the required wetland delineation field investigation.
- Submitted required field documentation.
- Completed the Draft Wetland Delineation Report.
- Addressed applicable Government review comments.
- Submitted the Final Wetland Delineation Report.
- Submitted required GIS and supporting data.

- Completed all other base-scope requirements identified in this scope.

The Contractor's responsibility for regulatory agency processing shall be limited to the technical support expressly identified in this scope.

The issuance, timing, scope, or outcome of a regulatory agency Jurisdictional Determination shall not constitute a failure of Contractor performance when the Contractor has completed the required base-scope services and provided the required technical support.

SEC. 3.02 CONTRACT TERM AND WORK SCHEDULE

The length of the contract will be from the date of award, approximately September 24, 2026, for approximately eighteen (18) months until completion, approximately March 23, 2027.

Unless otherwise provided in this IRFP, the State and the successful offeror/contractor agree: (1) that any extension of the contract excluding any exercised renewal options, will be considered as a month-to-month extension, and all other terms and conditions shall remain in full force and effect and (2) the procurement officer will provide written notice to the contractor of the intent to cancel such month-to-month extension at least 30 days before the desired date of cancellation. A month-to-month extension may only be executed by the procurement officer via a written contract amendment.

SEC. 3.03 DELIVERABLES

The contractor will be required to provide the following deliverables:

- 1) **Project Work Plan & Preliminary Schedule** – The Contractor shall submit a Project Work Plan identifying methodology, a preliminary schedule to achieve deliverables, personnel, resources, equipment, QA/QC, safety/access, data collection, producing report and other deliverables, assumptions, and risks.
- 2) **Field Work Plan** – Field work will be coordinated with the Project Manager and outlined in its own Field Work Plan to allow for review and approval. Field Work Plan shall include investigation methodology for the location, features of interest, points of contact for staff conducting work, schedule, equipment, logistics for mobilizing to location, and budget.
- 3) **Field Report** – The Contractor shall submit a field report within ten (10) business days following completion of field work. Field reports shall include copies of legible field notes in electronic PDF format, georeferenced photo-documentation, and a brief narrative of field work activities in electronic PDF format.
- 4) **Draft Wetland Delineation Report**
 - a) The report shall include an executive summary of the project.
 - b) Prepared and written in accordance with U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual (1987) and Regional Supplement to the Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual: Alaska Region (Version 2.0, 2007)
 - c) Include a site map showing property boundaries, manmade features, and hydrologic features.
 - d) Include a Wetland Delineation on both a relevant Topographic Map and Aerial Imagery, that shows wetland classifications and boundaries, sample locations, relevant hydrological features, and direction of water movement of the property.
 - e) Discussion of property land modifications over the years and their environmental impacts based on historical and aerial imagery review (ditches, drains, berms, building pads, etc.).

- f) Detailed analysis and discussion of field investigation findings, including soils, vegetation, hydrology, and if a Jurisdictional Determination is warranted.
 - g) Qualitative discussion of available floodplain and flood-risk information, including FEMA or other applicable mapping.
 - h) Draft Report shall include completed data forms.
 - i) Draft Report shall include a summary and conclusion with an explanation of any potential compliance issues and recommendations.
 - j) A reference to an appendix with the trip reports, photos, recorded information from interviews, and relevant record information.
- 5) **Draft Report Review** – Per the Project Schedule, the Contractor shall submit the Draft Report electronically in Microsoft Word (.docx) and PDF formats. The Government will provide consolidated comments, as practicable, in tabular format. The Government review period shall be fifteen (15) business days following receipt of a complete draft. The Contractor shall review and incorporate applicable comments. Technical disagreements shall be documented in writing and coordinated with the Project Manager. Draft Report shall be submitted electronically through email or a file drop service.
- 6) **Final Report** – The Contractor shall submit a Final Wetland Delineation Report incorporating applicable Government comments in Microsoft Word (.docx) and PDF formats.
The final report shall include field reports, data forms, photographs, maps, GIS information including Geodatabase (.gdb) containing all data layers created, imagery, soil information, interview records, reference materials, and other supporting documentation, as applicable. Final Report shall be submitted electronically through email or a file drop service.

DELIVERABLE ACCEPTANCE

Deliverables will be considered acceptable when they satisfy this scope; are complete and internally consistent; follow applicable methodology; contain sufficient supporting information; include required maps, data, photographs, and appendices; are in required electronic formats; and address applicable Government comments within the contract scope. Government review and acceptance does not relieve the Contractor of responsibility for technical accuracy and professional quality.

SEC. 3.04 CONTRACT TYPE

This contract is a firm fixed price contract.

SEC. 3.05 PROPOSED PAYMENT PROCEDURES

The state will make payments based on a negotiated payment schedule. Each billing must consist of an invoice and progress report. No payment will be made until the progress report and invoice has been approved by the project director.

SEC. 3.06 PROMPT PAYMENT FOR STATE PURCHASES

Not applicable to this IRFP.

SEC. 3.07 CONTRACT PAYMENT

No payment will be made until the contract is approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs or the Commissioner's designee. Under no conditions will the state be liable for the payment of any interest charges associated with the cost of the contract. The state is not responsible for and will not pay local, state, or federal taxes. All costs associated with the contract must be stated in U.S. currency.

SEC. 3.08 LOCATION OF WORK

The location(s) the work is to be performed, completed and managed at Alaska Army National Guard (AKARNG) Nome Army Aviation Operating Facility (AAOF) in Nome, Alaska. Certain desktop research, GIS processing, report preparation, and administrative activities may be performed remotely, subject to applicable Government requirements.

The state will not provide workspace for the contractor. The contractor must provide its own workspace.

The Contractor should include in their price proposal: transportation, lodging, and per diem costs sufficient to pay for necessary number of person(s) to make the necessary number of trip(s) to Nome, AK. Travel to other locations will not be required.

By signature on their proposal, the offeror certifies that all services provided under this contract by the contractor and all subcontractors shall be performed in the United States.

If the offeror cannot certify that all work will be performed in the United States, the offeror must contact the procurement officer in writing to request a waiver at least 10 days prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals.

The request must include a detailed description of the portion of work that will be performed outside the United States, where, by whom, and the reason the waiver is necessary.

Failure to comply with these requirements may cause the state to reject the proposal as non-responsive, or cancel the contract.

SEC. 3.09 THIRD-PARTY SERVICE PROVIDERS

Not applicable to this IRFP.

SEC. 3.10 SUBCONTRACTORS

Subcontractors will not be allowed.

SEC. 3.11 JOINT VENTURES

Joint ventures will not be allowed.

SEC. 3.12 RIGHT TO INSPECT PLACE OF BUSINESS

At reasonable times, the state may inspect those areas of the contractor's place of business that are related to the performance of a contract. If the state makes such an inspection, the contractor must provide reasonable assistance.

SEC. 3.13 F.O.B. POINT

All goods purchased through this contract will be F.O.B. final destination. Unless specifically stated otherwise, all prices offered must include the delivery costs to any location within the State of Alaska.

SEC. 3.14 CONTRACT PERSONNEL

Any change of the project team members or subcontractors named in the proposal must be approved, in advance and in writing, by the project director or procurement officer. Changes that are not approved by the state may be grounds for the state to terminate the contract.

SEC. 3.15 CONTRACT CHANGES - UNANTICIPATED AMENDMENTS

During the course of this contract, the contractor may be required to perform additional work. That work will be within the general scope of the initial contract. When additional work is required, the project director will provide the contractor a written description of the additional work and request the contractor to submit a firm time schedule for accomplishing the additional work and a firm price for the additional work. Cost and pricing data must be provided to justify the cost of such amendments per AS 36.30.400.

The contractor will not commence additional work until the procurement officer has secured any required state approvals necessary for the amendment and issued a written contract amendment, approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs or the Commissioner's designee.

SEC. 3.16 NONDISCLOSURE AND CONFIDENTIALITY

Contractor agrees that all confidential information shall be used only for purposes of providing the deliverables and performing the services specified herein and shall not disseminate or allow dissemination of confidential information except as provided for in this section. The contractor shall hold as confidential and will use reasonable care (including both facility physical security and electronic security) to prevent unauthorized access by, storage, disclosure, publication, dissemination to and/or use by third parties of, the confidential information. "Reasonable care" means compliance by the contractor with all applicable federal and state law, including the Social Security Act and HIPAA. The contractor must promptly notify the state in writing if it becomes aware of any storage, disclosure, loss, unauthorized access to or use of the confidential information.

Confidential information, as used herein, means any data, files, software, information or materials (whether prepared by the state or its agents or advisors) in oral, electronic, tangible or intangible form and however

stored, compiled or memorialized that is classified confidential as defined by State of Alaska classification and categorization guidelines provided by the state to the contractor or a contractor agent or otherwise made available to the contractor or a contractor agent in connection with this contract, or acquired, obtained or learned by the contractor or a contractor agent in the performance of this contract. Examples of confidential information include, but are not limited to: technology infrastructure, architecture, financial data, trade secrets, equipment specifications, user lists, passwords, research data, and technology data (infrastructure, architecture, operating systems, security tools, IP addresses, etc).

If confidential information is requested to be disclosed by the contractor pursuant to a request received by a third party and such disclosure of the confidential information is required under applicable state or federal law, regulation, governmental or regulatory authority, the contractor may disclose the confidential information after providing the state with written notice of the requested disclosure (to the extent such notice to the state is permitted by applicable law) and giving the state opportunity to review the request. If the contractor receives no objection from the state, it may release the confidential information within 30 days. Notice of the requested disclosure of confidential information by the contractor must be provided to the state within a reasonable time after the contractor's receipt of notice of the requested disclosure and, upon request of the state, shall seek to obtain legal protection from the release of the confidential information.

The following information shall not be considered confidential information: information previously known to be public information when received from the other party; information freely available to the general public; information which now is or hereafter becomes publicly known by other than a breach of confidentiality hereof; or information which is disclosed by a party pursuant to subpoena or other legal process and which as a result becomes lawfully obtainable by the general public.

SEC. 3.17 INDEMNIFICATION

The contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the state from and against any claim of, or liability for error, omission or negligent act of the contractor under this agreement. The contractor shall not be required to indemnify the contracting agency for a claim of, or liability for, the independent negligence of the state. If there is a claim of, or liability for, the joint negligent error or omission of the contractor and the independent negligence of the state, the indemnification and hold harmless obligation shall be apportioned on a comparative fault basis. "Contractor" and "state", as used within this and the following article, include the employees, agents and other contractors who are directly responsible, respectively, to each. The term "independent negligence" is negligence other than in the contracting agency's selection, administration, monitoring, or controlling of the contractor and in approving or accepting the contractor's work.

SEC. 3.18 INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

Without limiting the contractor's indemnification, it is agreed that the contractor shall purchase at its own expense and maintain in force at all times during the performance of services under this agreement the following policies of insurance. Where specific limits are shown, it is understood that they shall be the minimum acceptable limits. If the contractor's policy contains higher limits, the State of Alaska shall be entitled to coverage to the extent of such higher limits.

Certificates of Insurance must be furnished to the contracting officer prior to beginning work and must provide for a notice of cancellation, non-renewal, or material change of conditions in accordance with policy provisions.

If the insurer does not notify the State of Alaska on policy cancellation it shall be the contractor's responsibility to notify the State of Alaska of such cancellation.

Failure to furnish satisfactory evidence of insurance or lapse of the policy is a material breach of this contract and may be grounds for termination of the contract. All insurance policies shall comply with and be issued by insurers licensed to transact the business of insurance under AS 21. All policies for general liability shall be primary and non-contributing with any insurance that may be carried by the State of Alaska.

The contractor shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all requirements stated herein, and contractor shall ensure that the State is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.

Policies written on a "claims-made" basis must have a two-year tail of coverage, or an unbroken continuation of coverage for two years from the completion of the contract requirements

2.1 Workers' Compensation Insurance: The contractor shall provide and maintain, for all employees engaged in work under this contract, coverage as required by AS 23.30.045, and Employers Liability with limits of at least \$1,000,000. Also, where applicable, the contractor shall provide and maintain any other statutory obligations including but not limited to Federal U.S.L. & H. and Jones Act requirements. The policy must waive subrogation against the State of Alaska.

2.2 Commercial General Liability Insurance including:

- \$2,000,000 General Aggregate
- \$2,000,000 Products/Completed Operations
- \$1,000,000 Personal & Advertising Injury
- \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence
- \$5,000 Medical Payments

The policy must name the State of Alaska as an "additional insured" and the actual policy endorsement shall accompany each Certificate of Insurance. The policy shall be endorsed to waive all rights of subrogation against the State of Alaska by reason of any payment made for claims under this coverage. This policy endorsement shall accompany each Certificate of Insurance

2.3 Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance: covering all vehicles used by the contractor in the performance of services under this agreement with minimum coverage limits of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per claim, to include: owned, hired, and non-owned. The policy must name the State of Alaska as an "additional insured" and the actual policy endorsement shall accompany each Certificate of Insurance. The policy shall be endorsed to waive all rights of subrogation against the State of Alaska by reason of any payment made for claims under this coverage. This policy endorsement shall accompany each Certificate of Insurance.

2.4 Professional Liability Insurance: covering all errors, omissions or negligent acts in the performance of professional services under this agreement. Limits required per the following schedule:

SEC. 3.19 TERMINATION FOR DEFAULT

If the project director or procurement officer determines that the contractor has refused to perform the work or has failed to perform the work with such diligence as to ensure its timely and accurate completion, the state may, by providing written notice to the contractor, terminate the contractor's right to proceed with part or all of the remaining work.

This clause does not restrict the state's termination rights under the contract provisions of Appendix A, attached in **SECTION 8. ATTACHMENTS**.

SECTION 4. PROPOSAL FORMAT AND CONTENT

SEC. 4.01 PROPOSAL FORMAT AND CONTENT

The state discourages overly lengthy and costly proposals, however, in order for the state to evaluate proposals fairly and completely, offerors must follow the format set out in this IRFP and provide all information requested.

SEC. 4.02 INTRODUCTION

Proposals must include the complete name and address of offeror's firm and the name, mailing address, and telephone number of the person the state should contact regarding the proposal.

Proposals must confirm that the offeror will comply with all provisions in this IRFP; and, if applicable, provide notice that the firm qualifies as an Alaskan bidder. Proposals must be signed by a company officer empowered to bind the company. An offeror's failure to include these items in the proposals may cause the proposal to be determined to be non-responsive and the proposal may be rejected.

SEC. 4.03 UNDERSTANDING OF THE PROJECT

Offerors must provide comprehensive narrative statements that illustrate their understanding of the requirements of the project and the project schedule.

SEC. 4.04 METHODOLOGY USED FOR THE PROJECT

Offerors must provide comprehensive narrative statements that set out the methodology they intend to employ and illustrate how the methodology will serve to accomplish the work and meet the state's project schedule.

SEC. 4.05 MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE PROJECT

Offerors must provide comprehensive narrative statements that set out the management plan they intend to follow and illustrate how the plan will serve to accomplish the work and meet the state's project schedule.

SEC. 4.06 EXPERIENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS

Offerors must provide an organizational chart specific to the personnel assigned to accomplish the work called for in this IRFP; illustrate the lines of authority; designate the individual responsible and accountable for the completion of each component and deliverable of the IRFP.

Offerors must provide a narrative description of the organization of the project team and a personnel roster that identifies each person who will actually work on the contract and provide the following information about each person listed:

- title,
- resume,
- location(s) where work will be performed,
- itemize the total cost and the number of estimated hours for each individual named above.

Offerors must provide reference names and phone numbers for similar projects the offeror's firm has completed.

SEC. 4.07 COST PROPOSAL

Cost proposals must include an itemized list of all direct and indirect costs associated with the performance of the contract, including, but not limited to, total number of hours at various hourly rates, direct expenses, payroll, supplies, overhead assigned to each person working on the project, percentage of each person's time devoted to the project, and profit.

SEC. 4.08 EVALUATION CRITERIA

All proposals will be reviewed to determine if they are responsive and responsible. Proposals determined to be responsive and responsible will be evaluated using the criterion that is set out in **SECTION 5. EVALUATION CRITERIA AND CONTRACTOR SELECTION**.

An evaluation may not be based on discrimination due to the race, religion, color, national origin, sex, age, marital status, pregnancy, parenthood, disability, or political affiliation of the offeror.

SECTION 5. EVALUATION CRITERIA AND CONTRACTOR SELECTION

THE TOTAL NUMBER OF POINTS USED TO SCORE THIS PROPOSAL IS 100

SEC. 5.01 UNDERSTANDING OF THE PROJECT (15%)

Proposals will be evaluated against the questions set out below:

- 1) How well has the offeror demonstrated a thorough understanding of the purpose and scope of the project?
- 2) How well has the offeror identified pertinent issues and potential problems related to the project?
- 3) To what degree has the offeror demonstrated an understanding of the deliverables the state expects it to provide?
- 4) Has the offeror demonstrated an understanding of the state's time schedule and can meet it?

SEC. 5.02 METHODOLOGY USED FOR THE PROJECT (10%)

Proposals will be evaluated against the questions set out below:

- 1) How comprehensive is the methodology and does it depict a logical approach to fulfilling the requirements of the IRFP?
- 2) How well does the methodology match and achieve the objectives set out in the IRFP?
- 3) Does the methodology interface with the time schedule in the IRFP?

SEC. 5.03 MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE PROJECT (10%)

Proposals will be evaluated against the questions set out below:

- 1) How well does the management plan support all of the project requirements and logically lead to the deliverables required in the IRFP?
- 2) How well is accountability completely and clearly defined?
- 3) Is the organization of the project team clear?
- 4) How well does the management plan illustrate the lines of authority and communication?
- 5) To what extent does the offeror already have the hardware, software, equipment, and licenses necessary to perform the contract?
- 6) Does it appear that the offeror can meet the schedule set out in the IRFP?
- 7) Has the offeror gone beyond the minimum tasks necessary to meet the objectives of the IRFP?
- 8) To what degree is the proposal practical and feasible?
- 9) To what extent has the offeror identified potential problems?

SEC. 5.04 EXPERIENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS (15%)

Proposals will be evaluated against the questions set out below:

1) Questions regarding the personnel:

- a) Do the individuals assigned to the project have experience on similar projects?
- b) Are resumes complete and do they demonstrate backgrounds that would be desirable for individuals engaged in the work the project requires?
- c) How extensive is the applicable education and experience of the personnel designated to work on the project?

2) Questions regarding the firm and subcontractor (if used):

- a) How well has the firm demonstrated experience in completing similar projects on time and within budget?
- b) How successful is the general history of the firm regarding timely and successful completion of projects?
- c) Has the firm provided letters of reference from previous clients?
- d) If a subcontractor will perform work on the contract, how well do they measure up to the evaluation used for the offeror?

SEC. 5.05 CONTRACT COST (40%)

Overall, a minimum of **40%** of the total evaluation points will be assigned to cost. The cost amount used for evaluation may be affected by one or more of the preferences referenced under Section 6.11.

Converting Cost to Points

The lowest cost proposal will receive the maximum number of points allocated to cost. The point allocations for cost on the other proposals will be determined through the method set out in Section 6.15.

SEC. 5.06 ALASKA OFFEROR PREFERENCE (10%)

If an offeror qualifies for the Alaska Bidder Preference, the offeror will receive an Alaska Offeror Preference. The preference will be 10% of the total available points. This amount will be added to the overall evaluation score of each Alaskan offeror.

SECTION 6. GENERAL PROCESS INFORMATION

SEC. 6.01 ALASKA BUSINESS LICENSE AND OTHER REQUIRED LICENSES

Prior to the award of a contract, an offeror must hold a valid Alaska business license. However, in order to receive the Alaska Bidder Preference and other related preferences, such as the Alaska Veteran Preference and Alaska Offeror Preference, an offeror must hold a valid Alaska business license prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals. Offerors should contact the **Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development, Division of Corporations, Business, and Professional Licensing, PO Box 110806, Juneau, Alaska 99811-0806**, for information on these licenses. Acceptable evidence that the offeror possesses a valid Alaska business license may consist of any one of the following:

- copy of an Alaska business license;
- certification on the proposal that the offeror has a valid Alaska business license and has included the license number in the proposal;
- a canceled check for the Alaska business license fee;
- a copy of the Alaska business license application with a receipt stamp from the state's occupational licensing office; or
- a sworn and notarized statement that the offeror has applied and paid for the Alaska business license.

You are not required to hold a valid Alaska business license at the time proposals are opened if you possess one of the following licenses and are offering services or supplies under that specific line of business:

- fisheries business licenses issued by Alaska Department of Revenue or Alaska Department of Fish and Game,
- liquor licenses issued by Alaska Department of Revenue for alcohol sales only,
- insurance licenses issued by Alaska Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development, Division of Insurance, or
- Mining licenses issued by Alaska Department of Revenue.

Prior the deadline for receipt of proposals, all offerors must hold any other necessary applicable professional licenses required by Alaska Statute.

SEC. 6.02 SITE INSPECTION

The state may conduct on-site visits to evaluate the offeror's capacity to perform the contract. An offeror must agree, at risk of being found non-responsive and having its proposal rejected, to provide the state reasonable access to relevant portions of its work sites. Individuals designated by the procurement officer at the state's expense will make site inspection.

SEC. 6.03 CLARIFICATION OF OFFERS

In order to determine if a proposal is reasonably susceptible for award, communications by the procurement officer or the proposal evaluation committee (PEC) are permitted with an offeror to clarify uncertainties or eliminate confusion concerning the contents of a proposal. Clarifications may not result in a material or substantive change to the proposal. The evaluation by the procurement officer or the PEC may be adjusted as a result of a clarification under this section.

SEC. 6.04 DISCUSSIONS WITH OFFERORS

The state may conduct discussions with offerors in accordance with AS 36.30.240 and 2 AAC 12.290. The purpose of these discussions will be to ensure full understanding of the requirements of the IRFP and proposal. Discussions will be limited to specific sections of the IRFP or proposal identified by the procurement officer. Discussions will only be held with offerors who have submitted a proposal deemed reasonably susceptible for award by the procurement officer. Discussions, if held, will be after initial evaluation of proposals by the procurement officer or the PEC. If modifications are made as a result of these discussions they will be put in writing. Following discussions, the procurement officer may set a time for best and final proposal submissions from those offerors with whom discussions were held. Proposals may be reevaluated after receipt of best and final proposal submissions.

If an offeror does not submit a best and final proposal or a notice of withdrawal, the offeror's immediate previous proposal is considered the offeror's best and final proposal.

Offerors with a disability needing accommodation should contact the procurement officer prior to the date set for discussions so that reasonable accommodation can be made. Any oral modification of a proposal must be reduced to writing by the offeror.

SEC. 6.05 EVALUATION OF PROPOSALS

The procurement officer, or an evaluation committee made up of at least three state employees or public officials, will evaluate proposals. The evaluation will be based solely on the evaluation factors set out in **SECTION 5. EVALUATION CRITERIA AND CONTRACTOR SELECTION.**

After receipt of proposals, if there is a need for any substantial clarification or material change in the IRFP, an amendment will be issued. The amendment will incorporate the clarification or change, and a new date and time established for new or amended proposals. Evaluations may be adjusted as a result of receiving new or amended proposals.

SEC. 6.06 CONTRACT NEGOTIATION

After final evaluation, the procurement officer may negotiate with the offeror of the highest-ranked proposal. Negotiations, if held, shall be within the scope of the request for proposals and limited to those items which would not have an effect on the ranking of proposals. If the highest-ranked offeror fails to provide necessary information for negotiations in a timely manner, or fails to negotiate in good faith, the state may terminate negotiations and negotiate with the offeror of the next highest-ranked proposal. If contract negotiations are commenced, they may be held virtually via Teams meeting.

SEC. 6.07 FAILURE TO NEGOTIATE

If the selected offeror

- fails to provide the information required to begin negotiations in a timely manner; or
- fails to negotiate in good faith; or
- indicates they cannot perform the contract within the budgeted funds available for the project; or
- if the offeror and the state, after a good faith effort, simply cannot come to terms,

the state may terminate negotiations with the offeror initially selected and commence negotiations with the next highest ranked offeror.

SEC. 6.08 OFFEROR NOTIFICATION OF SELECTION

After the completion of contract negotiation the procurement officer will issue a written Notice of Intent to Award (NIA) and send copies to all offerors. The NIA will set out the names of all offerors and identify the proposal selected for award.

SEC. 6.09 PROTEST

2 AAC 12.695 provides that an interested party may protest the content of the IRFP or the award of a contract.

An interested party is defined in 2 AAC 12.990(a)(7) as “an actual or prospective bidder or offeror whose economic interest might be affected substantially and directly the issuance of a contract solicitation, the award of a contract, or the failure to award a contract.”

Per 2 AAC 12.695, an interested party must first attempt to informally resolve the dispute with the procurement officer. If that attempt is unsuccessful, the interested party may file a written protest to the solicitation or the award of the contract. The protest must be filed with the Commissioner of the purchasing agency or the Commissioner’s designee. The protester must also file a copy of the protest with the procurement officer. The protest must include the following information:

- the name, address, and telephone number of the protester;
- the signature of the protester or the protester's representative;
- identification of the contracting agency and the solicitation or contract at issue;
- a detailed statement of the legal and factual grounds of the protest including copies of relevant documents; and
- the form of relief requested.

If an interested party wishes to protest the content of a solicitation, the protest must be filed before the date and time that proposals are due.

If an offeror wishes to protest the award of a contract not greater than \$50,000, the protest must be filed within 10 days from the date of the solicitation or award, whichever is later.

If an offeror wishes to protest the award of a contract greater than \$50,000, the protest must be filed within 10 days from the date that notice of award is made.

A protester must have submitted a proposal in order to have sufficient standing to protest the award of a contract.

The procurement officer shall immediately give notice of the protest to the contractor or, if no award has been made, to all offerors who submitted proposals.

If the protestor agrees, the Commissioner of the purchasing department or the Commissioner's designee may assign the protest to the procurement officer or other state official for alternate dispute resolution. In other cases, the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee may issue a decision denying the protest and stating the reasons for denial, issue a decision sustaining the protest, in whole or in part, and instruct the procurement officer to implement an appropriate remedy, or conduct a hearing using procedures set out in AS 36.30.670(b).

SEC. 6.10 APPLICATION OF PREFERENCES

Certain preferences apply to all contracts for professional services, regardless of their dollar value. The Alaska Bidder, Alaska Veteran, and Alaska Offeror preferences are the most common preferences involved in the IRFP process. Additional preferences that may apply to this procurement are listed below. Guides that contain excerpts from the relevant statutes and codes, explain when the preferences apply and provide examples of how to calculate the preferences are available at the **Department of Administration, Division of Shared Service's** web site:

- Alaska Products Preference - AS 36.30.332
- Recycled Products Preference - AS 36.30.337
- Local Agriculture and Fisheries Products Preference - AS 36.15.050
- Employment Program Preference - AS 36.30.321(b)
- Alaskans with Disabilities Preference - AS 36.30.321(d)
- Alaska Military Skills Program Preference – AS 36.30.321(l)

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation in the Department of Labor and Workforce Development keeps a list of qualified employment programs and individuals who qualify as persons with a disability. As evidence of a business' or an individual's right to the Employment Program or Alaskans with Disabilities preferences, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation will issue a certification letter. To take advantage of these preferences, a business or individual must be on the appropriate Division of Vocational Rehabilitation list prior to the time designated for receipt of proposals. Offerors must attach a copy of their certification letter to the proposal. **An offeror's failure to provide this certification letter with their proposal will cause the state to disallow the preference.**

Sec. 6.11 ALASKA BIDDER PREFERENCE

An Alaska Bidder Preference of 5% will be applied to the price in the proposal. The preference will be given to an offeror who:

- 1) holds a current Alaska business license prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals;
- 2) submits a proposal for goods or services under the name appearing on the offeror's current Alaska business license;
- 3) has maintained a place of business within the state staffed by the offeror, or an employee of the offeror, for a period of six months immediately preceding the date of the proposal;
- 4) is incorporated or qualified to do business under the laws of the state, is a sole proprietorship and the proprietor is a resident of the state, is a limited liability company (LLC) organized under AS 10.50 and all members are residents of the state, or is a partnership under AS 32.06 or AS 32.11 and all partners are residents of the state; and
- 5) if a joint venture, is composed entirely of ventures that qualify under (1)-(4) of this subsection.

Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form

In order to receive the Alaska Bidder Preference, the proposal must include the Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form attached to this IRFP. An offeror does not need to complete the Alaska Veteran Preference questions on the form if not claiming the Alaska Veteran Preference. An offeror's failure to provide this completed form with their proposal will cause the state to disallow the preference.

SEC. 6.12 ALASKA VETERAN PREFERENCE

An Alaska Veteran Preference of 5%, not to exceed \$5,000, will be applied to the price in the proposal. The preference will be given to an offeror who qualifies under AS 36.30.990(2) as an Alaska bidder and is a:

- A. sole proprietorship owned by an Alaska veteran;
- B. partnership under AS 32.06 or AS 32.11 if a majority of the partners are Alaska veterans;
- C. limited liability company organized under AS 10.50 if a majority of the members are Alaska veterans; or
- D. corporation that is wholly owned by individuals, and a majority of the individuals are Alaska veterans.

In accordance with AS 36.30.321(i), the bidder must also add value by actually performing, controlling, managing, and supervising the services provided, or for supplies, the bidder must have sold supplies of the general nature solicited to other state agencies, other government, or the general public.

Alaska Veteran Preference Certification

In order to receive the Alaska Veteran Preference, the proposal must include the Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form attached to this IRFP. An offeror's failure to provide this completed form with their proposal will cause the state to disallow the preference.

SEC. 6.13 ALASKA MILITARY SKILLS PROGRAM PREFERENCE

An Alaska Military Skills Program Preference of 2%, not to exceed \$5,000, will be applied to the price in the proposal. The preference will be given to an offeror who qualifies under AS 36.30.990(2) as an Alaska bidder and:

- A. Employs at least one person who is currently enrolled in, or within the previous two years graduated from, a United States Department of Defense SkillBridge or United States Army career skills program for service members or spouses of service members that offers civilian work experience through specific industry training, pre-apprenticeships, registered apprenticeships, or internships during the last 180 days before a service member separates or retires from the service; or
- B. has an active partnership with an entity that employs an apprentice through a program described above.

In accordance with AS 36.30.321(i), the bidder must also add value by actually performing, controlling, managing, and supervising the services provided, or for supplies, the bidder must have sold supplies of the general nature solicited to other state agencies, other government, or the general public.

Alaska Military Skills Program Preference Certification

In order to receive the Alaska Military Skills Program Preference, the proposal must include the Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form attached to this RFP. An offeror's failure to provide this completed form with their proposal will cause the state to disallow the preference.

SEC. 6.14 ALASKA OFFEROR PREFERENCE

2 AAC 12.260(e) provides Alaska offerors a 10% overall evaluation point preference. Alaska bidders, as defined in AS 36.30.990(2), are eligible for the preference. An Alaska offeror will receive 10 percent of the total available points added to their overall evaluation score as a preference.

SEC. 6.15 FORMULA USED TO CONVERT COST TO POINTS

The distribution of points based on cost will be determined as set out in 2 AAC 12.260(c). The lowest cost proposal will receive the maximum number of points allocated to cost. The point allocations for cost on the other proposals will be determined using the formula:

$$[(\text{Price of Lowest Cost Proposal}) \times (\text{Maximum Points for Cost})] \div (\text{Cost of Each Higher Priced Proposal})$$

SEC. 6.16 EXAMPLES: CONVERTING COST TO POINTS & APPLYING PREFERENCES

(a) FORMULA USED TO CONVERT COST TO POINTS

STEP 1

List all proposal prices, adjusted where appropriate by the application of applicable preferences claimed by the offeror.

Offeror #1	\$40,000
Offeror #2	\$42,750
Offeror #3	\$47,500

STEP 2

In this example, the IRFP allotted 40% of the available 100 points to cost. This means that the lowest cost will receive the maximum number of points.

Offeror #1 receives 40 points.

The reason they receive that amount is because the lowest cost proposal, in this case \$40,000, receives the maximum number of points allocated to cost, 40 points.

Offeror #2 receives 37.4 points.

$\$40,000 \text{ lowest cost} \times 40 \text{ maximum points for cost} = 1,600,000 \div \$42,750 \text{ cost of Offeror \#2's proposal} = 37.4$

Offeror #3 receives 33.7 points.

$\$40,000 \text{ lowest cost} \times 40 \text{ maximum points for cost} = 1,600,000 \div \$47,500 \text{ cost of Offeror \#3's proposal} = 33.7$

(b) ALASKA OFFEROR PREFERENCE

STEP 1

Determine the number of points available to qualifying offerors under this preference.

100 Total Points Available in IRFP x 10% Alaska offerors preference = 10 Points for the Preference

STEP 2

Determine which offerors qualify as Alaska bidders and thus, are eligible for the Alaska offerors preference. For the purpose of this example, presume that all of the proposals have been completely evaluated based on the evaluation criteria in the IRFP. The scores at this point are:

Offeror #1	83 points	No Preference	0 points
Offeror #2	74 points	Alaska Offerors Preference	10 points
Offeror #3	80 points	Alaska Offerors Preference	10 points

STEP 3

Add the applicable Alaska offerors preference amounts to the offeror's scores:

Offeror #1	83 points	
Offeror #2	84 points	(74 points + 10 points)
Offeror #3	90 points	(80 points + 10 points)

STEP 4

Offeror #3 is the highest scoring offeror and would get the award, provided their proposal is responsible and responsive.

SECTION 7. GENERAL LEGAL INFORMATION

SEC. 7.01 STANDARD CONTRACT PROVISIONS

The contractor will be required to sign and submit the State's Standard Agreement Form for Professional Services Contracts (form SAF.DOC/Appendix A) OR Standard Contract Form for Goods and Non-Professional Services (form SCF.DOC/Appendix A). This form is attached in **SECTION 8. EXHIBITS** for your review. The contractor must comply with the contract provisions set out in this attachment. No alteration of these provisions will be permitted without prior written approval from the Department of Law. Objections to any of the provisions in Appendix A must be set out in the offeror's proposal in a separate document. Please include the following information with any change that you are proposing:

1. Identify the provision the offeror takes exception with.
2. Identify why the provision is unjust, unreasonable, etc.
3. Identify exactly what suggested changes should be made.

SEC. 7.02 QUALIFIED OFFERORS

Per 2 AAC 12.875, unless provided for otherwise in the IRFP, to qualify as an offeror for award of a contract issued under AS 36.30, the offeror must:

- 1) Add value in the contract by actually performing, controlling, managing, or supervising the services to be provided; or
- 2) Be in the business of selling and have actually sold on a regular basis the supplies that are the subject of the IRFP.

If the offeror leases services or supplies or acts as a broker or agency in providing the services or supplies in order to meet these requirements, the procurement officer may not accept the offeror as a qualified offeror under AS 36.30.

SEC. 7.03 PROPOSAL AS PART OF THE CONTRACT

Part of all of this IRFP and the successful proposal may be incorporated into the contract.

SEC. 7.04 ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The state reserves the right to add terms and conditions during contract negotiations. These terms and conditions will be within the scope of the IRFP and will not affect the proposal evaluations.

SEC. 7.05 HUMAN TRAFFICKING

By signature on their proposal, the offeror certifies that the offeror is not established and headquartered or incorporated and headquartered in a country recognized as Tier 3 in the most recent United States Department of State's Trafficking in Persons Report.

The most recent United States Department of State's Trafficking in Persons Report can be found at the following website: <https://www.state.gov/trafficking-in-persons-report/>

Failure to comply with this requirement will cause the state to reject the proposal as non-responsive, or cancel the contract.

SEC. 7.06 RIGHT OF REJECTION

Offerors must comply with all of the terms of the IRFP, the State Procurement Code (AS 36.30), and all applicable local, state, and federal laws, codes, and regulations. The procurement officer may reject any proposal that does not comply with all of the material and substantial terms, conditions, and performance requirements of the IRFP.

Offerors may not qualify the proposal nor restrict the rights of the state. If an offeror does so, the procurement officer may determine the proposal to be a non-responsive counter-offer and the proposal may be rejected.

Minor informalities that:

- do not affect responsiveness;
- are merely a matter of form or format;
- do not change the relative standing or otherwise prejudice other offers;
- do not change the meaning or scope of the IRFP;
- are trivial, negligible, or immaterial in nature;
- do not reflect a material change in the work; or
- do not constitute a substantial reservation against a requirement or provision;

may be waived by the procurement officer.

The state reserves the right to refrain from making an award if it determines that to be in its best interest.

A proposal from a debarred or suspended offeror shall be rejected.

SEC. 7.07 STATE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR PREPARATION COSTS

The state will not pay any cost associated with the preparation, submittal, presentation, or evaluation of any proposal.

SEC. 7.08 DISCLOSURE OF PROPOSAL CONTENTS

1. All Records belong to the State.
2. The State has sole discretion regarding whether to return any Record. In exercising this discretion, the State will comply with all Laws.
3. Unless a notice of intent to award is issued, the State will, to the extent permitted by Law, consider all Records confidential and not subject to the Alaska Public Records Act (APRA).
4. If and when a notice of intent to award is issued, the State will consider nonconfidential any Record unless, at the time of submission, the offeror undertook the following protective measures:
 - a. marked information confidential;

- b. for any information marked confidential, identified the authority that makes that specific information confidential; and
 - c. committed, in writing, to explain in detail, including with affidavits and briefs, why each authority applies in any court or administrative proceeding in which any nondisclosure is challenged.
- 5. If the offeror did not undertake each protective measure, the State will not consider any information in a Record confidential: the State will disclose the entire Record without any redaction in response to an APRA or other request or, if it chooses, in the absence of a request and the State will disclose the entire Record without notifying the offeror.
- 6. If the offeror undertook each protective measure, the State will withhold the information marked confidential to the following extent:
 - a. the State agrees that the Law protects the information; and
 - b. if the nondisclosure is challenged, the offeror fulfills its commitment to explain, including with affidavits and briefs, how each authority applies to the information marked confidential.
- 7. The State will only notify an offeror of a request for the Record and of a planned release if the offeror undertook each protective measure, but the State disagrees that the marked information is protected. If there is such a disagreement, then before releasing the Record, the State will, to the extent permitted by Law and practicable, notify the offeror that it will disclose the information unless the offeror convinces the State not to or obtains an order prohibiting disclosure.

SEC. 7.09 ASSIGNMENTS

Per 2 AAC 12.480, the contractor may not transfer or assign any portion of the contract without prior written approval from the procurement officer. Proposals that are conditioned upon the state's approval of an assignment will be rejected as non-responsive.

SEC. 7.10 DISPUTES

A contract resulting from this IRFP is governed by the laws of the State of Alaska. If the contractor has a claim arising in connection with the agreement that it cannot resolve with the state by mutual agreement, it shall pursue the claim, if at all, in accordance with the provisions of AS 36.30.620 – AS 36.30.632. To the extent not otherwise governed by the preceding, the claim shall be brought only in the Superior Court of the State of Alaska and not elsewhere.

SEC. 7.11 SEVERABILITY

If any provision of the contract is found to be invalid or declared by a court to be illegal or in conflict with any law, the validity of the remaining terms and provisions will not be affected; and, the rights and obligations of the parties will be construed and enforced as if the contract did not contain the particular provision held to be invalid.

SEC. 7.12 SUPPLEMENTAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Proposals must comply with **SEC. 7.06 RIGHT OF REJECTION**. However, if the state fails to identify or detect supplemental terms or conditions that conflict with those contained in this IRFP or that diminish the state's

rights under any contract resulting from the IRFP, the term(s) or condition(s) will be considered null and void.
After award of contract:

if conflict arises between a supplemental term or condition included in the proposal and a term or condition of the IRFP, the term or condition of the IRFP will prevail; and

if the state's rights would be diminished as a result of application of a supplemental term or condition included in the proposal, the supplemental term or condition will be considered null and void.

SEC. 7.13 FEDERALLY IMPOSED TARRIFFS

Changes in price (increase or decrease) resulting directly from a new or updated Federal Tariff, excise tax, or duty, imposed after contract award may be adjusted during the contract period or before delivery into the United States via contract amendment.

- **Notification of Changes:** The Contractor must promptly notify the Procurement Officer in writing of any new, increased, or decreased Federal excise tax or duty that may result in either an increase or decrease in the contract price and shall take appropriate action as directed by the Procurement Officer.
- **After-imposed or Increased Taxes and Duties:** Any Federal excise tax or duty for goods or services covered by this contract that was exempted or excluded on the contract award date but later imposed on the contractor during the contract period, as the result of legislative, judicial, or administrative action may result in a price increase provided:
 - a) The tax or duty takes effect after the contract award date and isn't otherwise addressed by the contract;
 - b) The contractor warrants, in writing, that no amount of the newly imposed Federal excise tax or duty or rate increase was included in the contract price, as a contingency or otherwise.
- **After-relieved or Decreased Taxes and Duties:** The contract price shall be decreased by the amount of any decrease in Federal excise tax or duty for goods or services under the contract, except social security or other employment [taxes](#), that the Contractor is required to pay or bear, or does not obtain a refund of, through the Contractor's fault, negligence, or failure to follow instructions of the Procurement Officer.
- **State's Ability to Make Changes:** The State reserves the right to request verification of Federal excise tax or duty amounts on goods or services covered by this contract and increase or decrease the contract price accordingly.
- **Price Change Threshold:** No adjustment shall be made in the contract price under this clause unless the amount of the adjustment exceeds \$250.

APPENDIX A

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Article 1 Definitions

- 1.1 In this contract and appendices, "Project Director" or "Agency Head" or "Procurement Officer" means the person who signs this contract on behalf of the Requesting Agency and includes a successor or authorized representative.
- 1.2 "State Contracting Agency" means the department for which this contract is to be performed and for which the Commissioner or Authorized Designee acted in signing this contract.

Article 2 Inspections and Reports

- 2.1 The department may inspect, in the manner and at reasonable times it considers appropriate, all the contractor's facilities and activities under this contract.
- 2.2 The contractor shall make progress and other reports in the manner and at the times the department reasonably requires.

Article 3 Disputes

- 3.1 If the contractor has a claim arising in connection with the contract that it cannot resolve with the State by mutual agreement, it shall pursue the claim, if at all, in accordance with the provisions of AS 36.30.620 – 632.

Article 4 Equal Employment Opportunity

- 4.1 The contractor may not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, or because of age, disability, sex, marital status, changes in marital status, pregnancy or parenthood when the reasonable demands of the position(s) do not require distinction on the basis of age, disability, sex, marital status, changes in marital status, pregnancy, or parenthood. The contractor shall take affirmative action to insure that the applicants are considered for employment and that employees are treated during employment without unlawful regard to their race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, disability, age, sex, marital status, changes in marital status, pregnancy or parenthood. This action must include, but need not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training including apprenticeship. The contractor shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting out the provisions of this paragraph.
- 4.2 The contractor shall state, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees to work on State of Alaska contract jobs, that it is an equal opportunity employer and that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, age, disability, sex, marital status, changes in marital status, pregnancy or parenthood.
- 4.3 The contractor shall send to each labor union or representative of workers with which the contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding a notice advising the labor union or workers' compensation representative of the contractor's commitments under this article and post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to all employees and applicants for employment.
- 4.4 The contractor shall include the provisions of this article in every contract, and shall require the inclusion of these provisions in every contract entered into by any of its subcontractors, so that those provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor. For the purpose of including those provisions in any contract or subcontract, as required by this contract, "contractor" and "subcontractor" may be changed to reflect appropriately the name or designation of the parties of the contract or subcontract.
- 4.5 The contractor shall cooperate fully with State efforts which seek to deal with the problem of unlawful discrimination, and with all other State efforts to guarantee fair employment practices under this contract, and promptly comply with all requests and directions from the State Commission for Human Rights or any of its officers or agents relating to prevention of discriminatory employment practices.
- 4.6 Full cooperation in paragraph 4.5 includes, but is not limited to, being a witness in any proceeding involving questions of unlawful discrimination if that is requested by any official or agency of the State of Alaska; permitting employees of the

contractor to be witnesses or complainants in any proceeding involving questions of unlawful discrimination, if that is requested by any official or agency of the State of Alaska; participating in meetings; submitting periodic reports on the equal employment aspects of present and future employment; assisting inspection of the contractor's facilities; and promptly complying with all State directives considered essential by any office or agency of the State of Alaska to insure compliance with all federal and State laws, regulations, and policies pertaining to the prevention of discriminatory employment practices.

4.7 Failure to perform under this article constitutes a material breach of contract.

Article 5 Termination

5.1 The Procurement Officer, by written notice, may terminate this contract, in whole or in part, when it is in the best interest of the State. In the absence of breach of contract by the contractor, the State is liable only for payment in accordance with the payment provisions of this contract for services rendered before the effective date of termination.

5.2 The Procurement Officer may also, by written notice, terminate this contract under Administrative Order 352 if the contractor supports or participates in a boycott of the State of Israel.

Article 6 No Assignment or Delegation

6.1 The contractor may not assign or delegate this contract, or any part of it, or any right to any of the money to be paid under it, except with the written consent of the Project Director and the Agency Head.

Article 7 No Additional Work or Material

7.1 No claim for additional services, not specifically provided in this contract, performed or furnished by the contractor, will be allowed, nor may the contractor do any work or furnish any material not covered by the contract unless the work or material is ordered in writing by the Project Director and approved by the Agency Head.

Article 8 Independent Contractor

8.1 The contractor and any agents and employees of the contractor act in an independent capacity and are not officers or employees or agents of the State in the performance of this contract.

Article 9 Payment of Taxes

9.1 As a condition of performance of this contract, the contractor shall pay all federal, State, and local taxes incurred by the contractor and shall require their payment by any Subcontractor or any other persons in the performance of this contract. Satisfactory performance of this paragraph is a condition precedent to payment by the State under this contract.

Article 10 Ownership of Documents

10.1 All designs, drawings, specifications, notes, artwork, and other work developed in the performance of this agreement are produced for hire and remain the sole property of the State of Alaska and may be used by the State for any other purpose without additional compensation to the contractor. The contractor agrees not to assert any rights and not to establish any claim under the design patent or copyright laws.

10.2 Nevertheless, if the contractor does mark such documents with a statement suggesting they are trademarked, copyrighted, or otherwise protected against the State's unencumbered use or distribution, the contractor agrees that this paragraph supersedes any such statement and renders it void.

10.3 The contractor, for a period of three years after final payment under this contract, agrees to furnish and provide access to all retained materials at the request of the Project Director. Unless otherwise directed by the Project Director, the contractor may retain copies of all the materials.

Article 11 Governing Law; Forum Selection

11.1 This contract is governed by the laws of the State of Alaska. To the extent not otherwise governed by Article 3 of this Appendix, any claim concerning this contract shall be brought only in the Superior Court of the State of Alaska and not elsewhere.

Article 12 Conflicting Provisions

12.1 Unless specifically amended and approved by the Department of Law, the terms of this contract supersede any provisions the contractor may seek to add. The contractor may not add additional or different terms to this contract; AS 45.02.207(b)(1).

12.2 The contractor specifically acknowledges and agrees that, among other things, provisions in any documents it seeks to append hereto that purport to (1) waive the State of Alaska's sovereign immunity, (2) impose indemnification obligations on the State of Alaska, or (3) limit liability of the contractor for acts of contractor negligence, are expressly superseded by this contract and are void.

Article 13 Officials Not to Benefit

13.1 Contractor must comply with all applicable federal or State laws regulating ethical conduct of public officers and employees.

Article 14 Covenant Against Contingent Fees

14.1 The contractor warrants that no person or agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this contract upon an agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage or contingent fee except employees or agencies maintained by the contractor for the purpose of securing business.

14.2 For the breach or violation of this warranty, the State may terminate this contract without liability or in its discretion deduct from the contract price or consideration the full amount of the commission, percentage, brokerage or contingent fee.

Article 15 Compliance

15.1 In the performance of this contract, the contractor must comply with all applicable federal, state, and borough regulations, codes, and laws, and be liable for all required insurance, licenses, permits and bonds.

Article 16 Force Majeure

16.1 The parties to this contract are not liable for the consequences of any failure to perform, or default in performing, any of their obligations under this Agreement, if that failure or default is caused by any unforeseeable Force Majeure, beyond the control of, and without the fault or negligence of, the respective party.

16.2 For the purposes of this Agreement, Force Majeure will mean war (whether declared or not); revolution; invasion; insurrection; riot; civil commotion; sabotage; military or usurped power; lightning; explosion; fire; storm; drought; flood; earthquake; epidemic; quarantine; strikes; acts or restraints of governmental authorities affecting the project or directly or indirectly prohibiting or restricting the furnishing or use of materials or labor required; inability to secure materials, machinery, equipment or labor because of priority, allocation or other regulations of any governmental authorities.

Article 17 Disclosure of Contract Contents

17.1 Except as otherwise protected by law, this contract and any amendment is a public record subject to disclosure under, for example, the Alaska Public Records Act. The contractor does not assert that any information in the contract is protected under federal or State of Alaska law.

The contractor and the parties involved, under this contract, agree that travel supported by U.S. Government funds under this agreement shall use U.S.-flag air carriers (air carriers holding certificates under 49 U.S.C. 41102) for international air transportation of people and property to the extent that such service is available, in accordance with the International Air Transportation Fair Competitive Practices Act of 1974 (49 U.S.C. 40118) and the inter-operative guidelines issued by the Comptroller General of the United States in the March 31, 1981, amendment to Comptroller General Decision B138942.
- B. The contractor and the parties involved, under this contract, agree that it will comply with the Cargo Preference Act of 1954 (46 U.S.C. Chapter 553), as implemented by Department of Transportation regulation at 46 CFR 381.7, and 46 CFR 381.7(b).

Section 808. Debarment and Suspension.

This contract and the parties involved will comply with the requirements regarding debarment and suspension in Subpart C of the OMB guidance in 2 CFR Part 180, as implemented by the DoD in 2 CFR Part 1125. The State agrees to communicate the requirement to comply with Subpart C to persons at the next lower tier with whom the State enters into transactions that are “covered transactions” under Subpart B of 2 CFR part 180 and the DoD implementation in 2 CFR Part 1125.

Section 809. Buy American Act.

The State covenants and agrees that it will not expend any funds appropriated by Congress without complying with The Buy American Act (41 U.S.C.10a, et seq.). The Buy American Act gives preference to domestic end products and domestic construction material. In addition, the Memorandum of Understanding between the United States of America and the European Economic Community (EEC) on Government Procurement, and the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), provide that EEC and NAFTA end products and construction materials are exempted from application of the Buy American Act.

Section 810. Uniform Relocation Assistance and real Property Acquisition Policies

The State covenants and agrees that it will comply with CFR 49 part 24, which implements the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (42 U.S.C. Section 4601 et seq.) and provides for fair and equitable treatment of persons displaced by federally assisted programs or persons whose property is acquired as a result of such programs.

Section 811. Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act.

The State and the contractor and all parties involved with this contract covenants and agrees that it will comply with the Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act (18 U.S.C. Section 874) as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3). As applied to this agreement, the Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act makes it unlawful to induce, by force, intimidation, threat of procuring dismissal from employment, or otherwise, any person employed in the construction or repair of public buildings or public works, financed in whole or in part by the United States, to give up any part of the compensation to which that person is entitled under a contract of employment.

Section 812. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

The State and the contractor and all parties involved with this contract covenants and agrees that it will comply with Sections 103 and 107 of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. Sections 3701-3708) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). As applied to this agreement, the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act specifies that no laborer or mechanic doing any part of the work contemplated by this agreement shall be required or permitted to work more than 40 hours in any workweek unless paid for all additional hours at not less than 1.5 times the basic rate of pay.

Section 813. Central Contractor Registration and Universal Identifier Requirements.

The contractor and all parties involved with this contract agree to comply with the Central Contractor Registration and Universal Identifier Requirements as indicated below:

Requirement for Central Contractor Registration (CCR)

Unless you are exempted from this requirement under 2 CFR 25.110, you as the recipient must maintain the currency of your information in the CCR until you submit the final financial report required under this award or receive the final payment, whichever is later.  - a. Receives a sub-award from you (the recipient) under this award; and
 - b. Is accountable to you for the use of the Federal funds provided by the sub-award.

- d.** Change in pension value. This is the change 'In present value of defined benefit and actuarial pension plans.
- e.** Above-market earnings on deferred compensation which is not tax-qualified.
- f.** Other compensation, if the aggregate value of all such other compensation (e.g. severance, termination payments, value of life insurance paid on behalf of the employee, perquisites, or property) for the executive exceeds \$10,000.
