The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA), Facilities Management Office (FMO) for the Alaska Army National Guard (ARNG) is seeking bids from qualified contractors to provide janitorial services at the Nome Readiness Center and Hangar, located in Nome Alaska.

 - a canceled check for the business license fee;
 - a copy of the business license application with a receipt date stamp from the State's business license office;
 - a receipt from the State's business license office for the license fee;
 - a copy of the bidder's valid business license;
 - a sworn notarized affidavit that the bidder has applied and paid for a business license;
- (2) the price(s) submitted was arrived at independently and without collusion, under penalty of perjury, and that the bidder is complying with:
 - the laws of the State of Alaska;
 - the applicable portion of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964;
 - the Equal Employment Opportunity Act and the regulations issued thereunder by the state and federal government;
 - the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and the regulations issued thereunder by the state and federal government;
 - the bid will remain open and valid for at least 90 days;
 - all terms and conditions set out in this Invitation to Bid (ITB).

If a bidder does not hold an Alaska Business License (1) at the time designated in the ITB for opening the state will disallow the Alaska Bidder Preference. Bids must also be submitted under the name as appearing on the bidder's current Alaska business license in order to receive the Alaska Bidder Preference. If a bidder fails to comply with (2) of this paragraph, the state may reject the bid, terminate the contract, or consider the contractor in default.

SECTION 1. INTRODUCTION & INSTRUCTIONS

SEC. 1.01 PURPOSE OF THE ITB

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA), Facilities Management Office (FMO) for the Alaska Army National Guard (ARNG) is seeking bids from qualified contractors to provide janitorial services at the Nome Readiness Center and Hangar, located in Nome Alaska.

SEC. 1.02 BUDGET

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, Division of Administrative Services, estimates a budget of between **\$275,000.00** and **\$325,000.00** dollars for the full contract term. Bids priced at more than **\$325,000.00** will be considered non-responsive.

Payment for the contract is subject to funds already appropriated and identified.

SEC. 1.03 DEADLINE FOR RECEIPT OF BIDS

Bids must be received no later than 2:00pm Alaska Time on May 10, 2024, at which time they will be publicly opened. Late bids or amendments will be considered non-responsive and will not be opened or accepted for evaluation.

SEC. 1.04 PRIOR EXPERIENCE

No specific minimums have been set for this ITB.

SEC. 1.05 REQUIRED REVIEW

Bidders shall carefully review this ITB for defects and questionable or objectionable material. Comments concerning defects and questionable or objectionable material in the ITB should be made in writing and received by the procurement officer at least ten days before the deadline for receipt of bids. This will allow time for an amendment to be issued if one is required. It will also help prevent the opening of a defective bid, upon which award cannot be made, and the resultant exposure of bidders' prices.

SEC. 1.06 QUESTIONS PRIOR TO DEADLINE FOR RECEIPT OF BIDS

All questions must be in writing and directed to the procurement officer. The interested party must confirm telephone conversations in writing. Two types of questions generally arise. One may be answered by directing the questioner to a specific section of the ITB. These questions may be answered over the telephone. Other questions may be more complex and may require a written amendment to the ITB. The procurement officer will make that decision.

SEC. 1.07 SITE INSPECTION – NON-MANDATORY

Potential bidders are encouraged to visit the work site so that they can see the conditions under which the work described in this ITB will be performed. The bidder's failure to visit the work site will in no way relieve the bidder of the responsibility of performing the work in strict compliance with the true intent and meaning of the terms, conditions, and specifications of this ITB. The site may be inspected by contacting Gavin Fairbanks at mvafrmocontracts@alaska.gov or via telephone at 907.885.9879.

This contact person is only empowered to allow potential bidders to view the work site. The contact person cannot and will not answer potential bidder questions regarding the work to be performed under this ITB

or the terms, conditions, and specifications of this ITB. Any questions potential bidders have must be directed to the procurement officer as required in Section 1.05.

Potential Offerors are required to have a valid driver's license, vehicle insurance and vehicle registration. The site inspection will be conducted on **Wednesday, April 24th, 2024, at 10:30AM AKST**. Potential Offerors will meet at the Nome Armory located at 206 East Front Street, Nome Alaska 99762. Upon arrival, the Building Maintenance Manager and interested parties will proceed to the Nome Manager (1230 Center Creek Road, Nome Alaska, 99762).

SEC. 1.08 RETURN INSTRUCTIONS

Bidders must submit one hard copy of their entire bid, in writing, to the procurement officer in a sealed package. The sealed bid package must be addressed as follows:

If submitting your bid via email, the entire bid may be emailed to MvaDasProcurement@alaska.gov and must contain the ITB number in the subject line of the email. The **maximum** size of a single email (including all text and attachments) that can be received by the state is **20mb (megabytes)**. If the email containing the bid exceeds this size, the bid must be sent in multiple emails that are each less than 20 megabytes and each email must comply with the requirements described above.

Please note that email transmission is not instantaneous. Like sending a hard copy bid, if you are emailing your bid, the state recommends sending it enough ahead of time to ensure the email is delivered by the deadline for receipt of bids.

It is the bidder's responsibility to contact the issuing agency at 907.428.7221 to confirm that the entire bid has been received. The state is not responsible for unreadable, corrupt, or missing attachments.

SEC. 1.09 ASSISTANCE TO BIDDERS WITH A DISABILITY

Bidders with a disability may receive accommodation regarding the means of communicating this ITB or participating in the procurement process. For more information, contact the procurement officer no later than ten days prior to the deadline for receipt of bids.

SEC. 1.10 AMENDMENTS TO BIDS

Amendments to or withdrawals of bids will only be allowed if acceptable requests are received prior to the deadline that is set for receipt of bids, in accordance with 2 AAC 12.140. No amendments or withdrawals will be accepted after the deadline unless the delay is due to an error of the contracting agency, in accordance with 2 AAC 12.160.

SEC. 1.11 AMENDMENTS TO THE ITB

If an amendment is issued before the deadline for receipt of bids, the amendment will be posted on the State of Alaska Online Public Notice (OPN) website. The link to the posting of the amendment will be provided to all who were notified of the ITB and to those who have registered with the procurement officer after receiving the ITB from the OPN.

SEC. 1.12 ITB SCHEDULE

This ITB does not, by itself, obligate the state. The state's obligation will commence when the contract is approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, or the Commissioner's designee. Upon written notice to the contractor, the state may set a different starting date for the contract. The state will not be responsible for any work done by the contractor, even work done in good faith, if it occurs prior to the contract start date set by the state.

SEC. 1.13 ALTERNATE BIDS

Bidders may only submit one bid for evaluation. In accordance with 2 AAC 12.830 alternate bids (bids that offer something different than what is asked for) will be rejected.

SEC. 1.14 SUPPORTING INFORMATION

Provided a bid meets the requirements for a definite, firm, unqualified, and unconditional offer, the state reserves the right to request supplemental information from the bidder, after the bids have been opened, to ensure that the products or services offered completely meet the ITB requirements.

SEC. 1.15 FIRM, UNQUALIFIED, AND UNCONDITIONAL OFFER

To be responsive a bid must constitute a definite, firm, unqualified and unconditional offer to meet all the material terms of the ITB. Material terms are those that could affect the price, quantity, quality, or delivery. Also included as material terms are those which are clearly identified in the ITB, and which must be complied with at risk of bid rejection for non-responsiveness.

SEC. 1.16 SCOPE OF WORK

1. FACILITIES: The selected contractor shall furnish all necessary labor, supervision, equipment, and supplies required to perform custodial services within the first 30 days of the contract, contractor is required to perform an initial service for all tasks covered by this contract (exterior work may be excluded), contractor and DMVA will set a schedule to complete all the required tasks.

2. TRASH AND REFUSE REMOVAL: All interior and exterior trash receptacles shall be emptied each service and returned to their initial locations. Boxes and papers placed near a trash receptacle and marked "TRASH" shall be removed. All can liners are to be replaced. Trash shall be disposed of in secured plastic bags. Trash shall be kept in a secondary container while inside the building to prevent spills and stains. The contractor shall pick up any trash that may fall onto the facilities grounds during removal from the building. The Department of Military & Veterans Affairs shall be responsible for emptying or collection service of the dumpsters.

The contractor is responsible for removing trash and debris from buildings. Trash shall not be left in custodial closets or other areas overnight. In the event a spill occurs, the contractor is responsible for removing stains and spots on surfaces where trash is placed before transportation to refuse dumpsters. These surfaces include carpet, tile, and concrete surfaces.

3. VACUUMING: Must be performed during each service with an electric stand-up vacuum with a beater brush. All carpeted areas are to be thoroughly cleaned. This includes under desks, behind doors and in corners. Upon completion all carpeted areas shall be neat, clean, free of debris, and have a professional appearance.

4. CARPET AND CERAMIC TILE CLEANING: Spots and stains shall be removed as they occur; deep clean steaming or shampooing will be performed on all carpets once every six months or as needed in high traffic areas. This includes areas under desks, along baseboards, in corners and behind doors.

All spots shall be treated and removed as they occur if stains wick through the carpet return visits would be required until the spots are removed. **CERAMIC TILE FLOORS:** Tile Floors shall be machine scrubbed once every six months or when needed to maintain a clean and uniform appearance of the tiles and grout.

5. SWEEPING AND MOPPING: All non-carpeted floors shall be swept and mopped each service with a proper mixed solution that will not be harmful to a wax finish. After the floor has been swept, the entire floor surface, including corners, shall be clean, free of litter, dust, foreign objects, or debris. All accessible areas shall be mopped. Trash receptacles, other items, etc. shall be moved to mop underneath, floor mats shall not be placed on floor until it is dry. After mopping, the floor shall have a uniform appearance, with no streaks, swirl marks, detergent residue, or any evidence of soil.

6. BUFFING: All waxed tile floors will be polished with a high-speed buffer (minimum 1500 rpm) to remove traffic marks, scuffs, and scratches and to restore luster of wax at least once a week or more often if needed (contractor may need to add more wax to floor in order to maintain luster).

7. STRIP/SCRUB AND WAX: All waxed tile floors (non-ceramic) will be maintained according to the frequency schedule in Section 19 Frequency Schedule. Contractor shall use a high-quality non-skid wax and maintain a minimum of 5 coats of wax.

8. RESTROOMS/SHOWER/LOCKEROOMS: Must be cleaned each service performing the following tasks:

- A. Clean and disinfect all toilets, urinals, sinks, shelves, showers, counter tops, and stall walls/partitions shall be cleaned using a germicidal/disinfectant and if needed polish applied.
- B. Wet mop all floors with appropriate and properly diluted cleaner each service.
- C. All dispensers including paper towels, toilet paper, toilet seat protectors, soap dispensers will be cleaned and restocked if needed each time service is performed.
- D. Trash cans and sanitary napkin disposal units will be emptied and liners replaced each time service is performed. Sanitary Napkin Disposal bags are not to be reused.
- E. Mirrors, chrome/stainless steel fixtures and underneath portions of sinks shall be cleaned, and polish applied each time service is performed.
- F. Urinals shall have a deodorizer and must be replaced when it no longer produces a fragrance.
- G. After cleaning, surfaces shall be free from streaks, stains, scale, deposits, and rust stains.

9. DUSTING: Dust all horizontal surfaces up to six (6) feet in height: chairs, file cabinets, bookshelves, and other types of office equipment as well as window ledges, handrails, and ledges once a week. All work-related items such as paperwork etc. shall be left undisturbed.

10. DRINKING FOUNTAINS: Antibacterial detergent will be used to clean, and polish applied to all drinking fountains each service, hard water/calcium and other deposits are not acceptable.

11. GENERAL AREA CLEANING: Remove smudges, soils, fingerprints, marks, coffee spots, streaks, etc., each service from all washable horizontal and vertical surfaces including breakroom sinks, doors, hardware, and handrails all surfaces shall have a clean uniform appearance, be free of streaks, spots and other evidence of spots or soil removal. Germicidal detergent shall be used in restrooms and break areas. All work-related items such as paperwork etc. shall be left undisturbed. If the facility has exercise equipment all equipment shall be cleaned and disinfected each service. All stainless steel (except door handles) shall be cleaned using an appropriate product and polish applied.

12. LOBBIES AND ENTRYWAYS: Wash all lobby/entry windows inside and out each service. No streaks or unwashed places will be visible. The exterior of entryways and mats shall be cleaned and kept free of debris, including stain removal from concrete or other hard surfaces.

13. WINDOWS: The interior and exterior sides of the windows shall be cleaned in accordance with the frequency schedule (Section 19 Frequency Schedule), exterior windows to be cleaned in spring (lobby/entry windows cleaned daily), date to be scheduled with contract administrator weather and conditions permitting. Wash windows and glass deflectors leaving no streaks or unwashed places. Wipe water spots from sills and frames. Use drop cloth as required protecting adjacent surfaces, fixtures, and furniture. This

service will be prearranged with the agency contact so employees can clear items from window ledges.

14. WASTEBASKET WASHING: Wastebaskets must have a clean appearance free of stains and soils and are to be cleaned with disinfectant as needed.

15. FLOOR MATS: Floor mats must be free of debris and stains and will be vacuumed each service and shampooed as needed to remove debris, spots, and stains.

16. CHANGES IN USE OF WORK AREA: In the event it is necessary to change the use of work area, which results in increased costs, the contractor may request a contract price adjustment for impacted services. Such requests shall be in writing, with before and after cost comparisons, and explain entirely why the price adjustment is requested.

17. SPECIAL SPECIFICATIONS: The contractor will meet with a representative or unit commander of the Department of Military & Veterans Affairs, upon request. The purpose of this meeting will be to review the contractor's performance and monitor the frequency of services performed. If for any reason the facilities are being used on a 24-hour basis, the contractor shall only be responsible for the requirements under this contract. The contractor shall report all facility maintenance problems to the Department of Military & Veterans Affairs representative (i.e. leaks, electrical). Contractor will report any conditions, which will not allow him to meet a cleaning standard.

18. HOLIDAYS: If a holiday falls on a service day, services shall be performed the next DMVA working day. The holiday schedule is provided in the list of attachments. A copy of existing and future calendars are located on website at <https://doa.alaska.gov/calendar/>.

Workmanship and Materials: All work must be performed in a thorough and workmanlike manner and in accordance with current industry practices. The contractor will be held responsible for the quality of the service, maintenance, and inspections. Service, maintenance and inspections that are improperly done must be done over, by the contractor, at the contractor's risk and expense (see 10. Deficient Work)

1. WORK SCHEDULE: Services are to be performed two (2) days a week on Mondays and Thursdays between the hours of 8:30am and 4:00pm Alaska Standard Time. If a service day falls on a holiday, services shall be performed the next DMVA working day. The contractor will coordinate a schedule of frequency and time of service with the agency contact for other services such as stripping, waxing and carpet cleaning. In the event it is necessary for the State to change the schedule, after notification the contractor will have seven days to have the new schedule in effect. At the start of the contract, the contractor will provide the number of man hours and employees that are needed to perform the daily and weekly services for each building, this will determine the schedule that will be used and approved by the agency contact.

2. MANAGER, EMPLOYEES & SUPERVISION: The contractor shall assign a full-time manager who must be available daily for communication and coordination of custodial functions and quality control with the DMVA. The manager shall have full authority to act for the contractor in all matters relative to the performance of this contract.

The contractor shall be responsible for the conduct and performance of all contract employees while on the premises. Any employee whose conduct is objectionable or who does not meet qualifications set forth in the contract may be immediately removed or barred from the premises. The contract manager is responsible for enforcing the following guidelines:

- Contract employees appearing to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs shall not be permitted on premises.
- Contract employees shall not use or tamper with office machines, computers, equipment, or personal property at any time.
- Contract employees must not open desks, cabinets, or other furniture at any time.
- Contract employees must not use the DMVA telephones, copiers, or fax machines for personal use at any time.
- Contract employees on work programs will require supervision on a 2-1 ratio (2 employees to 1 supervisor).
- No business solicitations from contractor or contract employees to solicit additional private business from building occupants shall be allowed during the performance of this contract. This also prohibits notes or advertisements posted on bulletin boards.
- The contractor must be directly responsible for instructing employees in utilities conservation practices and will be responsible for operating under conditions that preclude waste of utilities, which shall include but shall not necessarily be limited to the following:
 - Lights must be used only in areas where and at the time work is being performed. Lights shall be turned off after room is cleaned.
 - The workers will not adjust mechanical equipment, controls for heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems.
 - Failure to enforce the above guidelines will be grounds for contract cancellation
 - Water faucets or valves must be turned off after the required usage has been accomplished.
 - Exterior doors and windows will not be propped open.

3. PRESENCE OF MINORS: Minors, including family members of the contractor and employees, must not be on the Project site during contract work hours and are prohibited from performing any work under this contract.

4. COMMUNICATION: At least one person who can speak, read, and write English fluently must be always present during scheduled services.

5. BACKGROUND CHECKS: For security reasons, the DMVA may require identification, fingerprints, or conduct investigations of the successful bidder's employees performing work on any contract resulting from this solicitation. At a minimum, Social Security Numbers will be required for all contract employees. By their signature on the bid submitted in response to this ITB the bidder agrees to provide any requested information, to include Social Security Numbers, on any contractor employee, and to cooperate fully with DMVA in any background check investigation.

6. SAFETY & SAFETY DATA SHEETS (SOS): In accordance with A.S. 18.60 Article 1, Sec 18.60.030 (7), (8), (9), (12), (13), the contractor shall acquire, file, and maintain up-to-date records pertaining to Safety Data Sheets (SDS) for substances and products used by the contractor in performance of any contract awarded from this solicitation. The contractor shall assume full responsibility for conformance with the law

regarding the contractor's employees. The contract administrator may request or inspect the contractor's files on products being used in performance of work awarded from this solicitation. A current, up-to-date binder will be kept on site in each storage area throughout the duration of the contract.

The contractor will be familiar with and operate within guidelines set forth by the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) and all City and/or State of Alaska regulations that affect custodial and housekeeping operations.

The contractor will ensure that all employees assigned to the contract are knowledgeable of the requirements of this contract and current industry standards, guidelines and regulations affecting custodial and housekeeping operations.

7. DAMAGE: Contractor is liable for any damage to the property including but not limited to building structures, contents, or personal property caused by the contractor, contractor's employees, or cleaning methods. Any damage shall be reported as soon as possible to the facilities representative and the contract administrator.

8. LOSS OF KEYS: Special emphasis is placed on key control. The contractor is required to sign for all keys. All keys are to be obtained from the Facility Commander or his representative, and to be returned upon completion of this contract. No duplications are to be made; in event of lost keys, contact the Facility Commander for replacements. Lost keys may be grounds for immediate termination of contract. At minimum replacement and re-keying charges will be paid by the contractor. The contractor's failure to pay for these services may interfere with payment for services that were rendered.

9. INSPECTION OF WORK: The contractor or the contractor's designee shall upon notification by the contracting agency be present at the contract site to conduct an inspection with the agency's representative. Inspections with the State's representative may take place anytime and at the sole discretion of the contracting agency.

Required corrections resulting from deficient work shall be accomplished within four (4) hours after the inspection or, at the sole discretion of the Contracting Agency, an acceptable, alternate time. If the contractor fails to appear for an inspection or a deficiency is not corrected within the stated period, the Contracting Agency may hire another janitorial firm to correct the deficiency and invoice the contractor for the cost. The contractor's failure to pay the State may interfere with the full payment for services rendered during the next invoicing cycle. Any carryover of non-corrected deficiencies will be considered a breach of contract.

10. DEFICIENT WORK: The Project Manager (PM) will work with the contractor to resolve matters of deficiency by issuing a Deficient Work Notification Form to the contractor. The contractor will correct any deficiency by the required time as noted in the Deficient Work Notification Form. If the contractor fails to appear for an inspection or a deficiency is not corrected within the stated period, the PM contact may hire another janitorial firm to correct the deficiency and deduct that cost from the next payment due under the contract.

If the contractor fails to correct the deficiency within the required time, this will be considered a valid service deficiency claim and the PM will submit the Deficient Work Notification to the procurement office. The procurement office will issue a Cure Letter. This letter must identify the problem(s), citing relevant contract language, and any corrective action required. This letter must also list the consequences for failing to correct the problem(s) and set a deadline after which the contractor may be found in default if corrective action is not taken.

If the contractor is issued more than three (3) Cure Letters in a 30-day period or a total of seven (7) Cure Letters in a 60-day period, it may be grounds for the procurement officer to find the contractor in default and cancel the contract.

11. BUILDING SECURITY: As instructed by the agency contact or the facilities representative, the contractor shall turn off all designated lighting and lock outside doors and windows each workday. Contractor shall be briefed by the contracting agency or a representative on the security protocols for the facility(s) that are services under this contract.

12. RESTRICTED AREAS AND EXCEPTIONS: The contractor may not have access to some areas requiring special attention. For example, access to some data processing/ telecommunication/computer areas may be limited to authorize personnel only. Some areas may be restricted from janitorial personnel during specific time frames and daily services in these spaces must be performed between specific hours as scheduled by the user agency occupants. Other spaces may require that the doors be immediately locked after completion of the janitorial services for that area.

13. SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT: The contractor will supply all equipment, labor, supplies, and paper products required to complete the work as specified in the contract. At all times, the contractor shall store enough supplies at the site to last a minimum of two (2) weeks.

For bidding purposes, the contractor should plan on providing items such as but not limited to: Dispenser towels, toilet paper, can liners, soaps, detergents, cleaning chemicals, floor maintenance products, towels, cloths, sponges, brushes, germicidal and fungicidal chemicals, vacuum cleaners, floor scrubbers, high speed buffers, carpet extraction machines, ladder, and squeegees. The contractor shall furnish sanitary napkins in each ladies' restroom and ensure that they are kept supplied as necessary, all cost to be borne by the contractor. Contractor shall provide a closed container for waste sanitary napkins, with garbage bags for contamination control. Contractor must also furnish, repair, and/or replace toilet-seat covers dispensers, tissues dispensers, paper towel dispensers, and soap dispensers in all areas serviced. This is not all inclusive of supplies and equipment required and by no means should be considered as the minimum items required.

All ladders or other devices used to reach the surface of objects not otherwise accessible for the required cleaning operations shall be provided by the contractor, at no additional expense to the state; all such equipment shall be of sound construction, be firm and stable, and shall be maintained in good condition.

The contractor will not use any equipment owned by the state or employees of the state.

14. PRODUCT QUALITY: Products quality must meet or exceed the following samples. Toilet paper: Bay West Double Soft Premium 2 Ply or better. Can Liners: 24" X 23" .7 mil. low density or better 33" X 40" 1.5 mil. low density or better.

15. SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT STORAGE: The contractor will supply all equipment needed to complete the duties and requirements outlined herein. The equipment must be maintained in good operating condition and in sufficient quantities to adequately perform all services.

SEC. 1.17 CONTRACT TERM

The length of the contract will be from the date of award, approximately May 23, 2024, through May 22, 2027, with the option to renew for 3 (three) additional 1-year terms under the same terms and conditions as the original contract. Renewals will be exercised at the sole discretion of the state.

Unless otherwise provided in this ITB, the State and the successful bidder/contractor agree: (1) that any extension of the contract excluding any exercised renewal options, will be considered as a month-to-month extension, and all other terms and conditions shall remain in full force and effect and (2) the procurement officer will provide notice to the contractor of the intent to cancel such month-to-month extension at least 30 days before the desired date of cancellation. A month-to-month extension may only be executed by the procurement officer via a written contract amendment.

SEC. 1.18 CONTRACT TYPE

This contract is a firm fixed price contract.

SEC. 1.19 PAYMENT FOR STATE PURCHASES

No payment will be made until the contract is approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs or the Commissioner's designee. Under no conditions will the state be liable for the payment of any interest charges associated with the cost of the contract. The state is not responsible for and will not pay local, state, or federal taxes. All costs associated with the contract must be stated in U.S. currency.

Payment for agreements under \$500,000 for the undisputed purchase of goods or services provided to a state agency, will be made within 30 days of the receipt of a proper billing or the delivery of the goods or services to the location(s) specified in the agreement, whichever is later. A late payment is subject to 1.5% interest per month on the unpaid balance. Interest will not be paid if there is a dispute or if there is an agreement that establishes a lower interest rate or precludes the charging of interest.

Any single contract payments of \$1 million or higher must be accepted by the contractor via Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT).

SEC. 1.20 CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION

The administration of this contract is the responsibility of the procurement officer or person appointed by the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, Division of Administration.

SEC. 1.21 CONTRACT PRICE ADJUSTMENTS

A contract resulting from this ITB will include the following price adjustment clause:

Consumer Price Index (CPI): Contract prices will remain firm through 12 months after the date of award.

The Contractor or State may request price adjustments, no sooner than 12 months from the Contract execution date, and no more than once per contract year. Contractors must submit a request to the State at least thirty (30) days prior to the end of the current term. All Requests must be in writing and must be received 30 days prior to the Contract renewal date.

- a. If the Contractor or State fail to request a CPI price adjustment 30 days prior to the Contract renewal date, the adjustment will be effective 30 days after the State or Contractor receives their written request.

- b. Price adjustments will be made in accordance with the percentage change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor and Statistics, Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) for All Urban Consumers, All Items, Urban Alaska.
- c. The price adjustment rate will be determined by comparing the percentage difference between the CPI in effect for the base year reported HALF1 (January through June 2023) (depends on the timing, may be HALF2 for July-December); and each HALF1 (or HALF2) thereafter. The percentage difference between those two CPI issues will be the price adjustment rate. No retroactive contract price adjustments will be allowed. All price adjustments must be approved by the Procurement Officer prior to the implementation of the adjusted pricing. Approval shall be in the form of a Contract Amendment issued by the Procurement Officer.
- d. Approval for all price increases is dependent upon full compliance with the terms of the Contract including reporting requirements.

SEC. 1.22 CONTRACT PERFORMANCE LOCATION

The location(s) the work is to be performed, completed, and managed is 1230 Center Creek Road, Nome, Alaska 99762.

The Department of Military & Veterans Affairs will provide a storage area for the contractor's supplies and equipment but will not assume any liability for materials and equipment stored on the premises.

The contractor should include in their bid price: transportation, lodging, and per diem costs. Travel to other locations will not be required.

By signature on their bid, the bidder certifies that all services provided under this contract by the contractor and all subcontractors shall be performed in the United States.

If the bidder cannot certify that all work will be performed in the United States, the bidder must contact the procurement officer in writing to request a waiver at least 10 days prior to the deadline for receipt of bids. The request must include a detailed description of the portion of work that will be performed outside the United States, where, by whom, and the reason the waiver is necessary.

Failure to comply with these requirements may cause the state to reject the bid as non-responsive or cancel the contract.

SEC. 1.23 THIRD-PARTY FINANCING AGREEMENTS NOT ALLOWED

Because of the additional administrative and accounting time required of the state when third party financing agreements are permitted, they will not be allowed under this contract.

SEC. 1.24 SUBCONTRACTORS

Subcontractors will not be allowed.

SEC. 1.25 JOINT VENTURES

Joint ventures will not be allowed.

SEC. 1.26 RIGHT TO INSPECT PLACE OF BUSINESS

At reasonable times, the state may inspect those areas of the contractor's place of business that are related to the performance of a contract. If the state makes such an inspection, the contractor must provide reasonable assistance.

SEC. 1.27 F.O.B. POINT

The F.O.B. point for all items purchased under this contract is the final destination anywhere within the State of Alaska. Ownership of and title to the ordered items remains with the contractor until the items have been delivered to their final destination and are accepted by the state.

The cost of shipping and delivery within 1230 Center Creek Road, Nome, Alaska 99762 is to be included in the bid price.

SEC. 1.28 INSPECTION & MODIFICATION - REIMBURSEMENT FOR UNACCEPTABLE DELIVERABLES

The contractor is responsible for providing all products or the completion of all work set out in the contract. All products or work is subject to inspection, evaluation, and approval by the state. The state may employ all reasonable means to ensure that the work is progressing and being performed in compliance with the contract. The state may instruct the contractor to make corrections or modifications if needed in order to accomplish the contract's intent. The contractor will not unreasonably withhold such changes.

Substantial failure of the contractor to perform the contract may cause the state to terminate the contract. In this event, the state may require the contractor to reimburse monies paid (based on the identified portion of unacceptable products or work received) and may seek associated damages.

SEC. 1.29 EQUIPMENT INSPECTION

Equipment offered (including for lease) may be subject to inspection and approval by the state prior to the award of the ITB. The equipment and attachments must be in good repair and capable of performing the work for which they were designed.

SEC. 1.30 NEW EQUIPMENT

Equipment offered in response to this ITB must be new equipment. New equipment means equipment that is currently in production by the manufacturer and is still the latest model, edition or version generally offered. The equipment must be warranted as new by the manufacturer and may not have been used for any purpose, other than display (not demonstration), prior to its sale to the state. The state will not accept remanufactured, used, or reconditioned equipment. It is the contractor's responsibility to ensure that each piece of equipment delivered to the state complies with this requirement. A contractor's failure to comply with this requirement will cause the state to seek remedies under breach of contract.

SEC. 1.31 DISCONTINUED ITEMS

In the event an item is discontinued by the manufacturer during the life of the contract, another item may be substituted, provided that the procurement officer makes a written determination that it is equal to or better than the discontinued item and provided that it is sold at the same price or less than the discontinued item.

SEC. 1.32 CONTRACT CHANGES – UNANTICIPATED AMENDMENTS

During the course of this contract, the contractor may be required to perform additional work. That work will be within the general scope of the initial contract. When additional work is required, the state will provide the contractor a written description of the additional work and request the contractor to submit a firm time schedule for accomplishing the additional work and a firm price for the additional work. Cost and pricing data must be provided to justify the cost of such amendments per AS 36.30.400.

The contractor will not commence additional work until the procurement officer has secured required state approvals necessary and issued a written contract amendment.

SEC. 1.33 CONTINUING OBLIGATION OF CONTRACTOR

Notwithstanding the expiration date of a contract resulting from this ITB, the contractor is obligated to fulfill its responsibilities until warranty, guarantee, maintenance, and parts availability requirements have completely expired.

SEC. 1.34 BILLING INSTRUCTIONS

All invoices produced by the contractor must contain the following information at a minimum:

- Contract number.
- Must be in sequential number and efforts made to avoid duplication of previous invoice numbers.
- Date of renders services.

The state will make payment after it receives the goods or services and the invoice. Questions concerning payment must be addressed to the ordering agency.

SEC. 1.35 ESTIMATED QUANTITIES

The quantities referenced in this ITB are estimated requirements and may vary more or less from the quantities actually purchased. The State does not guarantee any minimum or maximum purchase. Orders will be issued throughout the contract period on an as-needed basis.

SEC. 1.36 NONDISCLOSURE AND CONFIDENTIALITY

Contractor agrees that all confidential information shall be used only for purposes of providing the deliverables and performing the services specified herein and shall not disseminate or allow dissemination of confidential information except as provided for in this section. The contractor shall hold as confidential and will use reasonable care (including both facility physical security and electronic security) to prevent unauthorized access by, storage, disclosure, publication, dissemination to and/or use by third parties of, the confidential information. “Reasonable care” means compliance by the contractor with all applicable federal and state law, including the Social Security Act and HIPAA. The contractor must promptly notify the state in writing if it becomes aware of any storage, disclosure, loss, unauthorized access to or use of the confidential information.

Confidential information, as used herein, means any data, files, software, information or materials (whether prepared by the state or its agents or advisors) in oral, electronic, tangible or intangible form and however

stored, compiled or memorialized that is classified confidential as defined by State of Alaska classification and categorization guidelines provided by the state to the contractor or a contractor agent or otherwise made available to the contractor or a contractor agent in connection with this contract, or acquired, obtained or learned by the contractor or a contractor agent in the performance of this contract. Examples of confidential information include, but are not limited to technology infrastructure, architecture, financial data, trade secrets, equipment specifications, user lists, passwords, research data, and technology data (infrastructure, architecture, operating systems, security tools, IP addresses, etc.).

If confidential information is requested to be disclosed by the contractor pursuant to a request received by a third party and such disclosure of the confidential information is required under applicable state or federal law, regulation, governmental or regulatory authority, the contractor may disclose the confidential information after providing the state with written notice of the requested disclosure (to the extent such notice to the state is permitted by applicable law) and giving the state opportunity to review the request. If the contractor receives no objection from the state, it may release the confidential information within 30 days. Notice of the requested disclosure of confidential information by the contractor must be provided to the state within a reasonable time after the contractor's receipt of notice of the requested disclosure and, upon request of the state, shall seek to obtain legal protection from the release of the confidential information.

The following information shall not be considered confidential information: information previously known to be public information when received from the other party; information freely available to the general public; information which now is or hereafter becomes publicly known by other than a breach of confidentiality hereof; or information which is disclosed by a party pursuant to subpoena or other legal process and which as a result becomes lawfully obtainable by the general public.

SEC. 1.37 INDEMNIFICATION

The contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the contracting agency from and against any claim of, or liability for error, omission or negligent act of the contractor under this agreement. The contractor shall not be required to indemnify the contracting agency for a claim of, or liability for, the independent negligence of the contracting agency. If there is a claim of, or liability for, the joint negligent error or omission of the contractor and the independent negligence of the contracting agency, the indemnification and hold harmless obligation shall be apportioned on a comparative fault basis.

“Contractor” and “contracting agency”, as used within this and the following article, include the employees, agents and other contractors who are directly responsible, respectively, to each. The term “independent negligence” is negligence other than in the contracting agency's selection, administration, monitoring, or controlling of the contractor and in approving or accepting the contractor's work.

SEC. 1.38 INSURANCE

Without limiting the contractor's indemnification, it is agreed that the contractor shall purchase at its own expense and maintain in force at all times during the performance of services under this agreement the following policies of insurance. Where specific limits are shown, it is understood that they shall be the minimum acceptable limits. If the contractor's policy contains higher limits, the state shall be entitled to coverage to the extent of such higher limits.

Certificates of Insurance must be furnished to the procurement officer prior to contract approval and must provide for a notice of cancellation, non-renewal, or material change of conditions in accordance with policy provisions. Failure to furnish satisfactory evidence of insurance or lapse of the policy is a material breach of this contract and shall be grounds for termination of the contractor's services. All insurance policies shall comply with and be issued by insurers licensed to transact the business of insurance under AS 21.

Proof of insurance is required for the following:

- Workers' Compensation Insurance: The contractor shall provide and maintain, for all employees engaged in work under this contract, coverage as required by AS 23.30.045, and where applicable, any other statutory obligations including but not limited to Federal U.S.L. & H. and Jones Act requirements. **The policy must waive subrogation against the state.**
- Commercial General Liability Insurance: covering all business premises and operations used by the contractor in the performance of services under this agreement with minimum coverage limits of \$300,000 combined single limit per occurrence.
- Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance: covering all vehicles used by the contractor in the performance of services under this agreement with minimum coverage limits of \$300,000 combined single limit per occurrence.

SECTION 2. BID FORMAT AND CONTENT

SEC. 2.01 BID FORMS

Bidders shall use the front page of this ITB, the Bid Submission Cover Sheet, and any other forms identified in this ITB for submitting bids. All bids must be signed by an individual authorized to bind the bidder to the provisions of the ITB.

BIDDER'S CERTIFICATION

By signature on the bid, the bidder certifies that they comply with the following:

- A. the laws of the State of Alaska;
- B. the applicable portion of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964;
- C. the Equal Employment Opportunity Act and the regulations issued thereunder by the state and federal government;
- D. the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and the regulations issued thereunder by the state and federal government;
- E. all terms and conditions set out in this ITB;
- F. the price(s) submitted was arrived at independently arrived and without collusion, under penalty of perjury; and
- G. that the bid will remain open and valid for at least 90 days.

If any bidder fails to comply with [a] through [g] of this paragraph, the state reserves the right to disregard the bid, terminate the contract, or consider the contractor in default.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Each bid shall include a statement indicating whether the company or any individuals working on the contract has a possible conflict of interest (e.g., currently employed by the State of Alaska or formerly employed by the State of Alaska within the past two years) and, if so, the nature of that conflict. The procurement officer reserves the right to **consider a bid non-responsive and reject it** or cancel the award if any interest disclosed from any source could either give the appearance of a conflict or cause speculation as to the objectivity of the contract to be performed by the bidder.

SEC. 2.02 PRICES

The bidder shall state prices in the units of issue on this ITB. Prices quoted in bids must be exclusive of federal, state, and local taxes. If the bidder believes that certain taxes are payable by the state, the bidder may list such taxes separately, directly below the bid price for the affected item.

SECTION 3. EVALUATION AND CONTRACTOR SELECTION

SEC. 3.01 EVALUATION OF BIDS

After bid opening, the procurement officer will evaluate the bids for responsiveness. Bids deemed non-responsive will be eliminated from further consideration. An evaluation may not be based on discrimination due the race, religion, color, national origin, sex, age, marital status, pregnancy, parenthood, disability, or political affiliation of the bidder.

SEC. 3.02 APPLICATION OF PREFERENCES

Certain preferences apply to all state contracts, regardless of their dollar value. The Alaska Bidder and Alaska Veteran preferences are the most common preferences involved in the ITB process. Additional preferences that may apply to this procurement are listed below. Guides that contain excerpts from the relevant statutes and codes, explain when the preferences apply and provide examples of how to calculate the preferences are available at the following website:

- Employment Program Preference - AS 36.30.321(b)
- Alaskans with Disabilities Preference - AS 36.30.321(d)

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation in the Department of Labor and Workforce Development keeps a list of qualified employment programs and individuals who qualify as persons with a disability. As evidence of a business' or an individual's right to the Employment Program or Alaskans with Disabilities preferences, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation will issue a certification letter. To take advantage of these preferences, a business or individual must be on the appropriate Division of Vocational Rehabilitation list prior to the time designated for receipt of proposals. Bidders must attach a copy of their certification letter to the proposal. **A bidder's failure to provide this certification letter with their proposal will cause the state to disallow the preference.**

SEC. 3.03 ALASKA BIDDER PREFERENCE

An Alaska Bidder Preference of 5% will be applied to the total bid price. The preference will be given to a bidder who:

- 1) holds a current Alaska business license prior to the deadline for receipt of bids;
- 2) submits a bid for goods or services under the name appearing on the bidder's current Alaska business license;
- 3) has maintained a place of business within the state staffed by the bidder, or an employee of the bidder, for a period of six months immediately preceding the date of the bid;
- 4) is incorporated or qualified to do business under the laws of the state, is a sole proprietorship and the proprietor is a resident of the state, is a limited liability company (LLC) organized under AS

10.50 and all members are residents of the state, or is a partnership under AS 32.06 or AS 32.11 and all partners are residents of the state; and

- 5) if a joint venture, is composed entirely of ventures that qualify under (1)-(4) of this subsection.

Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form

To receive the Alaska Bidder Preference, the bid must include the Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form attached to this ITB. A bidder does not need to complete the Alaska Veteran Preference questions on the form if not claiming the Alaska Veteran Preference. A bidder's failure to provide this completed form with their bid will cause the state to disallow the preference.

SEC. 3.04 ALASKA VETERAN PREFERENCE

An Alaska Veteran Preference of 5%, not to exceed \$5,000, will be applied to the total bid price. The preference will be given to a bidder who qualifies under AS 36.30.990(2) as an Alaska Bidder and is a:

- a) sole proprietorship owned by an Alaska veteran;
- b) partnership under AS 32.06 or AS 32.11 if a majority of the partners are Alaska veterans;
- c) limited liability company organized under AS 10.50 if a majority of the members are Alaska veterans; or
- d) corporation that is wholly owned by individuals, and a majority of the individuals are Alaska veterans.

In accordance with AS 36.30.321(i), the bidder must also add value by actually performing, controlling, managing, and supervising the services provided, or for supplies, the bidder must have sold supplies of the general nature solicited to other state agencies, other government, or the general public.

Alaska Veteran Preference Certification

To receive the Alaska Veteran Preference, the bid must include the Alaska Bidder Preference Certification Form attached to this ITB. A bidder's failure to provide this completed form with their bid will cause the state to disallow the preference.

SEC. 3.05 EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM PREFERENCE

If a bidder qualifies for the Alaska Bidder Preference and is offering goods or services through an employment program as defined under AS 36.30.990(12), an Employment Program Preference of 15% will be applied to the total bid price.

In accordance with AS 36.30.321(i), the bidder must also add value by actually performing, controlling, managing, and supervising the services provided, or for supplies, the bidder must have sold supplies of the general nature solicited to other state agencies, other government, or the general public.

SEC. 3.06 ALASKANS WITH DISABILITIES PREFERENCE

If a bidder qualifies for the Alaska Bidder Preference and is a qualifying entity as defined in AS 36.30.321(d), an Alaskans with Disabilities Preference of 10% will be applied to the total bid price.

In accordance with AS 36.30.321(i), the bidder must also add value by actually performing, controlling, managing, and supervising the services provided, or for supplies, the bidder must have sold supplies of the general nature solicited to other state agencies, other government, or the general public.

SEC. 3.07 PREFERENCE QUALIFICATION LETTER

Regarding the Employment Program Preference and the Alaskans with Disabilities Preference, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation in the Department of Labor and Workforce Development maintains lists of companies who qualify for those preferences. As evidence of a company's right to the preferences, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation will issue a certification letter. To take advantage of the preferences, a bidder must be on the appropriate Division of Vocational Rehabilitation list at the time the bid is opened and must attach a copy of their certification letter to their bid. The bidder's failure to provide this certification letter with their bid will cause the state to disallow the preference.

SEC. 3.08 EXTENSION OF PRICES

In case of error in the extension of prices in the bid, the unit prices will govern; in a lot bid, the lot prices will govern.

SEC. 3.09 METHOD OF AWARD

Award will be made to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. To be considered responsive, bidders must bid on all items.

SEC. 3.10 CONTRACTOR SELECTION PROCESS

Once the contracts are established this selection process will be used. When the state needs to order the product or service, the lowest priced contractor for that location will be contacted first. If, for any reason, the lowest contractor is not available to perform the needed service, the state will contact the next lowest priced contractor for that location. This process will continue until a contractor who can perform the service is located. The location of the contractor initially contacted will be determined by the starting location of the call-out. For example, if there was a need to transport a person from Anchorage to Fairbanks and then guard the person for two days in Fairbanks, the agency would contact Anchorage contractors, even though a substantial portion of the actual service would be performed in Fairbanks.

SEC. 3.11 NOTICE OF INTENT TO AWARD

After the responses to this ITB have been opened and evaluated, a tabulation of the bids will be prepared. This tabulation, called a Notice of Intent to Award, serves two purposes. It lists the name of each company or person that offered a bid and the price they bid. It also provides notice of the state's intent to award a contract(s) to the bidder(s) indicated. A copy of the Notice of Intent will be sent to each company or person who responded to the ITB. Bidders identified as the apparent low responsive bidders are instructed not to proceed until a Purchase Order, Contract Award, Lease, or some other form of written notice is given by the procurement officer. A company or person who proceeds prior to receiving a Purchase Order, Contract Award, Lease, or some other form of written notice from the procurement officer does so without a contract and at their own risk.

SECTION 4. GENERAL PROCESS AND LEGAL INFORMATION

SEC. 4.01 INFORMAL DEBRIEFING

When the contract is completed, an informal debriefing may be performed at the discretion of the procurement officer. If performed, the scope of the debriefing will be limited to the products provided or work performed by the contractor.

SEC. 4.02 ALASKA BUSINESS LICENSE AND OTHER REQUIRED LICENSES

Prior to the award of a contract, a bidder must hold a valid Alaska business license. However, to receive the Alaska Bidder Preference and other related preferences, such as the Alaska Veteran Preference and Alaskans with Disabilities Preference, a bidder must hold a valid Alaska business license prior to the deadline for receipt of bids. Bidders should contact the **Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development, Division of Corporations, Business, and Professional Licensing, PO Box 110806, Juneau, Alaska 99811-0806**, for information on these licenses. Acceptable evidence that the bidder possesses a valid Alaska business license may consist of any one of the following:

- copy of an Alaska business license,
- certification on the bid that the bidder has a valid Alaska business license and has included the license number in the bid,
- a canceled check for the Alaska business license fee,
- a copy of the Alaska business license application with a receipt stamp from the state's occupational licensing office, or
- a sworn and notarized statement that the bidder has applied and paid for the Alaska business license.

You are not required to hold a valid Alaska business license at the time bids are opened if you possess one of the following licenses and are offering services or supplies under that specific line of business:

- fisheries business licenses issued by Alaska Department of Revenue or Alaska Department of Fish and Game,
- liquor licenses issued by Alaska Department of Revenue for alcohol sales only,
- insurance licenses issued by Alaska Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development, Division of Insurance, or
- Mining licenses issued by Alaska Department of Revenue.

Prior the deadline for receipt of bids, all bidders must hold any other necessary applicable professional licenses required by Alaska Statute.

SEC. 4.03 AUTHORITY

This ITB is written in accordance with AS 36.30 and 2 AAC 12.

SEC. 4.04 COMPLIANCE

In the performance of a contract that results from this ITB, the contractor must comply with all applicable federal, state, and borough regulations, codes, and laws; be liable for all required insurance, licenses, permits and bonds; and pay all applicable federal, state, and borough taxes.

SEC. 4.05 SUITABLE MATERIALS, ETC.

Unless otherwise specified in this ITB, all materials, supplies or equipment offered by a bidder shall be new, unused, and of the latest edition, version, model, or crop and of recent manufacture.

SEC. 4.06 SPECIFICATIONS

Unless otherwise specified in this ITB, product brand names or model numbers specified in this ITB are examples of the type and quality of product required and are not statements of preference. If the specifications describing an item conflict with a brand name or model number describing the item, the specifications govern. Reference to brand name or number does not preclude an offer of a comparable or better product, if full specifications and descriptive literature are provided for the product. Failure to provide such specifications and descriptive literature may be cause for rejection of the offer.

SEC. 4.07 BRAND SPECIFIC

Certain items may be designated brand specific. When an item is designated no substitutions for the brand and model specified will be allowed.

SEC. 4.08 ITEM UPGRADES

The state reserves the right to accept upgrades to models on the basic contract when the upgrades improve the way the equipment operates or improve the accuracy of the equipment. Such upgraded items must be at the same price as the items in the basic contract.

SEC. 4.09 WORKMANSHIP AND MATERIALS

All work must be performed in a thorough and workmanlike manner. Unless otherwise specified, press work and composition will be of a medium quality as indicated in the Franklin Catalog, producing a clean, clear, sharp impression. The contractor will be held responsible for the quality of the finished work. If any job is rejected because of error attributable to the contractor or authorized subcontractor, the state may, at its option, receive a no cost reprint, negotiate a lower price, or hold the contractor in default.

SEC. 4.10 CONTRACTOR SITE INSPECTION

The state may conduct on-site visits to evaluate the bidder's capacity to perform the contract. A bidder must agree, at risk of being found non-responsive and having its bid rejected, to provide the state reasonable access to relevant portions of its work sites. Individuals designated by the procurement officer at the state's expense will make site inspection.

SEC. 4.11 ORDER DOCUMENTS

Except as specifically allowed under this ITB, an ordering agency will not sign any vendor contract. The state is not bound by a vendor contract signed by a person who is not specifically authorized to sign for the state under this ITB. Unless otherwise specified in this ITB, the State of Alaska Purchase Order, Contract Award and Delivery Order are the only order documents that may be used to place orders against the contract(s) resulting from this ITB.

SEC. 4.12 HUMAN TRAFFICKING

By signature on their bid, the bidder certifies that the bidder is not established and headquartered or incorporated and headquartered in a country recognized as Tier 3 in the most recent United States Department of State's Trafficking in Persons Report.

The most recent United States Department of State's Trafficking in Persons Report can be found at the following website: <http://www.state.gov/j/tip/>

Failure to comply with this requirement will cause the state to reject the bid as non-responsive or cancel the contract.

SEC. 4.13 RIGHT OF REJECTION

Bidders must comply with all the terms of the ITB, the State Procurement Code (AS 36.30), and all applicable local, state, and federal laws, codes, and regulations. The procurement officer may reject any bid that does not comply with all the material and substantial terms, conditions, and performance requirements of the ITB.

Bidders may not qualify the bid nor restrict the rights of the state. If a bidder does so, the procurement officer may determine the bid to be a non-responsive counteroffer and the bid may be rejected.

Minor informalities that:

- do not affect responsiveness,
- are merely a matter of form or format,
- do not change the relative standing or otherwise prejudice other bidders,
- do not change the meaning or scope of the ITB,
- are trivial, negligible, or immaterial in nature,
- do not reflect a material change in the work, or
- do not constitute a substantial reservation against a requirement or provision,

may be waived by the procurement officer.

The state reserves the right to refrain from making an award if it is determined to be in the state's best interest.

A bid from a debarred or suspended bidder shall be rejected.

SEC. 4.14 STATE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR PREPARATION COSTS

The state will not pay any cost associated with the preparation, submittal, presentation, or evaluation of any bid.

SEC. 4.15 DISCLOSURE OF BID CONTENTS

All bid prices become public information at the bid opening. After the deadline for receipt of bids, all other bid material submitted become the property of the State of Alaska and may be returned only at the state's option. AS 40.25.110 requires public records to be open to reasonable inspection. All other bid information will be held in confidence during the evaluation process and prior to the time a Notice of Intent to Award is issued. Thereafter, bids will become public information.

The Office of Procurement and Property Management (OPPM), or their designee recognizes that some information a bidder submits might be confidential under the United States or the State of Alaska Constitution, a federal statute or regulation, or a State of Alaska statute: i.e., might be confidential business information (CBI). *See, e.g.*, article 1, section 1 of the Alaska Constitution; AS 45.50.910 – 45.50.945 (the Alaska Uniform Trade Secrets Act); *DNR v. Arctic Slope Regional Corp.*, 834 P.2d 134, 137-39 (Alaska 1991). For OPPM or their designee to treat information a bidder submits with its bid as CBI, the bidder must do the following when submitting their bid: (1) mark the specific information it asserts is CBI; and (2) for each discrete set of such information, identify, in writing, each authority the bidder asserts make the information CBI. If the bidder does not do these things, the information will become public after the Notice of Intent to Award is issued. If the bidder does these things, OPPM or their designee will evaluate the bidder's assertion upon receiving a request for the information. If OPPM or their designee reject the assertion, they will, to the extent permitted by federal and State of Alaska law, undertake reasonable measures to give the bidder an opportunity to object to the disclosure of the information.

SEC. 4.16 ASSIGNMENTS

Per 2 AAC 12.480, the contractor may not transfer or assign any portion of the contract without prior written approval from the procurement officer. Bids that are conditioned upon the state's approval of an assignment will be rejected as non-responsive.

SEC. 4.17 FORCE MAJEURE (IMPOSSIBILITY TO PERFORM)

The parties to a contract resulting from this ITB are not liable for the consequences of any failure to perform, or default in performing, any of its obligations under the contract, if that failure or default is caused by any unforeseeable Force Majeure, beyond the control of, and without the fault or negligence of, the respective party.

For the purposes of this ITB, Force Majeure will mean war (whether declared or not); revolution; invasion; insurrection; riot; civil commotion; sabotage; military or usurped power; lightning; explosion; fire; storm; drought; flood; earthquake; epidemic; quarantine; strikes; acts or restraints of governmental authorities affecting the project or directly or indirectly prohibiting or restricting the furnishing or use of materials or labor required; inability to secure materials, machinery, equipment or labor because of priority, allocation or other regulations of any governmental authorities.

SEC. 4.18 DEFAULT

In case of default by the contractor, for any reason whatsoever, the state may procure the goods or services from another source and hold the contractor responsible for any resulting excess cost and may seek other remedies under law or equity.

SEC. 4.19 DISPUTES

If the contractor has a claim arising in connection with the contract that it cannot resolve with the state by mutual agreement, it shall pursue the claim, if at all, in accordance with the provisions of AS 36.30.620 – AS 36.30.632.

SEC. 4.20 SEVERABILITY

If any provision of the contract or agreement is found to be invalid or declared by a court to be illegal or in conflict with any law, the validity of the remaining terms and provisions will not be affected; and the rights and obligations of the parties will be construed and enforced as if the contract did not contain the particular provision held to be invalid.

SEC. 4.21 CONTRACT CANCELLATION

- 1) The state reserves the right to cancel the contract at its convenience upon 30 calendar days written notice to the contractor. The state is only liable for payment in accordance with the payment provisions of this contract for supplies or services provide before the effective date termination.
- 2) By signature on their bid, the bidder certifies that they will not support or participate in a boycott of the State of Israel. Failure to comply with this requirement may cause the state to reject the bid as non-responsive or cancel the contract.

SEC. 4.22 GOVERNING LAW; FORUM SELECTION

A contract resulting from this ITB is governed by the laws of the State of Alaska. To the extent not otherwise governed by Section 5.15 of this ITB, any claim concerning the contract shall be brought only in the Superior Court of the State of Alaska and not elsewhere.

SEC. 4.23 QUALIFIED BIDDERS

Per 2 AAC 12.875, unless provided for otherwise in the ITB, to qualify as a bidder for award of a contract issued under AS 36.30, the bidder must:

- 1) Add value in the contract by actually performing, controlling, managing, or supervising the services to be provided; or
- 2) Be in the business of selling and have actually sold on a regular basis the supplies that are the subject of the ITB.

If the bidder leases services or supplies or acts as a broker or agency in providing the services or supplies to meet these requirements, the procurement officer may not accept the bidder as a qualified bidder under AS 36.30.

SEC. 4.24 FEDERALLY IMPOSED TARIFFS

Changes in price (increase or decrease) resulting directly from a new or updated federal tariff, excise tax, or duty, imposed after contract award may be adjusted during the contract period or before delivery into the United States via contract amendment.

- **Notification of Changes:** The contractor must promptly notify the procurement officer in writing of any new, increased, or decreased federal excise tax or duty that may result in either an increase or decrease in the contract price and shall take appropriate action as directed by the procurement officer.
- **After-imposed or Increased Taxes and Duties:** Any federal excise tax or duty for goods or services covered by this contract that was exempted or excluded on the contract award date but later imposed on the contractor during the contract period, as the result of legislative, judicial, or administrative action may result in a price increase provided:
 - a) The tax or duty takes effect after the contract award date and isn't otherwise addressed by the contract.
 - b) The contractor warrants, in writing, that no amount of the newly imposed federal excise tax or duty or rate increase was included in the contract price, as a contingency or otherwise.
- **After-relieved or Decreased Taxes and Duties:** The contract price shall be decreased by the amount of any decrease in federal excise tax or duty for goods or services under the contract, except social security or other employment [taxes](#), that the contractor is required to pay or bear, or does not obtain a refund of, through the contractor's fault, negligence, or failure to follow instructions of the procurement officer.
- **State's Ability to Make Changes:** The state reserves the right to request verification of federal excise tax or duty amounts on goods or services covered by this contract and increase or decrease the contract price accordingly.
- **Price Change Threshold:** No adjustment shall be made in the contract price under this clause unless the amount of the adjustment exceeds \$250.

SEC. 4.25 PROTEST

AS 36.30.560 provides that an interested party may protest the content of the ITB.

An interested party is defined in 2 AAC 12.990(a) (7) as "an actual or prospective bidder or bidder whose economic interest might be affected substantially and directly by the issuance of a contract solicitation, the award of a contract, or the failure to award a contract."

If an interested party wishes to protest the content of a solicitation, the protest must be received, in writing, by the procurement officer at least ten days prior to the deadline for receipt of bids.

AS 36.30.560 also provides that an interested party may protest the award of a contract or the proposed award of a contract.

If a bidder wishes to protest the award of a contract or the proposed award of a contract, the protest must be received, in writing, by the procurement officer within ten days after the date the Notice of Intent to Award the contract is issued.

A protester must have submitted a bid to have sufficient standing to protest the proposed award of a contract. Protests must include the following information:

- the name, address, and telephone number of the protester,

- the signature of the protester or the protester's representative,
- identification of the contracting agency and the solicitation or contract at issue,
- a detailed statement of the legal and factual grounds of the protest including copies of relevant documents, and
- the form of relief requested.

Protests filed by telex or telegram are not acceptable because they do not contain a signature. Fax copies containing a signature are acceptable.

The procurement officer will issue a written response to the protest. The response will set out the procurement officer's decision and contain the basis of the decision within the statutory time limit in AS 36.30.580. A copy of the decision will be furnished to the protester by certified mail, fax or another method that provides evidence of receipt.

All bidders will be notified of any protest. The review of protests, decisions of the procurement officer, appeals, and hearings, will be conducted in accordance with the State Procurement Code (AS 36.30), Article 8 "Legal and Contractual Remedies."

Section 801. Applicable Law.

The Successful Contractor will comply with the following Applicable Laws. To view any referenced Laws or Statutes in their entirety please contact the Project Management.

Section 802. Governing Regulations.

This contract and the parties involved with this contract will comply with, the provisions of 32 CFR Part 33, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements, DoD Grant and Agreement Regulations (DoDGARS) (DoD 3210.6-R) as amended, Title 2 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 225, and NGR 5-1.

Section 803. Nondiscrimination.

This contract and the parties involved with this contract will comply with the following national policies prohibiting discrimination:

- A.** Based on race, color or national origin, in Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. Section 2000d et seq.), as implemented by DoD regulations at 32 CFR Part 195.
- B.** Based on race, color or national origin, in Executive Order 11246 as implemented by Department of Labor regulations at 41 CFR Chapter 60.
- C.** Based on sex or blindness, in Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. Section 1681, et seq.), as implemented by DoD regulations at 32 CFR Part 196.
- D.** Based on age, in The Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 U.S.C. Section 6101, et seq.), as implemented by Department of Health and Human Services regulations at 45 CFR Part 90.

Section 804. Lobbying.

Section 805. Drug-Free workplace.

Section 806. Environmental Protection.

A. The contractor and all parties, under this contract, agree that its performance under this Agreement shall comply with:

- i. The requirements of Section 114 of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. Section 7414).
- ii. Section 308 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. Section 1318), that relates generally to inspection, monitoring, entry reports, and information, and with all regulations and guidelines issued thereunder.
- iii. The Resources Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA).
- iv. The Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liabilities Act (CERCLA).
- v. The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).
- vi. The Solid Waste Disposal Act (SWDA)).
- vii. The applicable provisions of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401, et seq.) and Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1251, et seq.), as implemented by Executive Order 11738 and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) rules at 40 CFR Part 31.
- viii. To identify any impact this award may have on the quality of the human environment and provide help as needed to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA, at 42 U.S.C. 4321, et seq.) and any applicable federal, state or local environmental regulation.

B. In accordance with the EPA rules, the party further agrees to also identify to the awarding agency (*State of Alaska \ Department of Military and Veterans Affairs \ Facilities Management Office*) any impact this award may have on:

- i. The quality of the human environment and provide help the agency may need to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA, at 42 U.S.C 4321, et seq.) and to prepare Environment Impact Statements or other required environmental documentation. Section 808. Debarment and Suspension.

This contract and the parties involved will comply with the requirements regarding debarment and suspension in Subpart C of the OMB guidance in 2 CFR Part 180, as implemented by the DoD in 2 CFR Part 1125. The State agrees to communicate the requirement to comply with Subpart C to persons at the next lower tier with whom the State enters into transactions that are “covered transactions” under Subpart B of 2 CFR part 180 and the DoD implementation in 2 CFR Part 1125.

Section 809. Buy American Act.

The State covenants and agrees that it will not expend any funds appropriated by Congress without complying with The Buy American Act (41 U.S.C.10a, et seq.). The Buy American Act gives preference to domestic end products and domestic construction material. In addition, the Memorandum of Understanding between the United States of America and the European Economic Community (EEC) on Government Procurement, and the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), provide that EEC and NAFTA end products and construction materials are exempted from application of the Buy American Act.

Section 810. Uniform Relocation Assistance and real Property Acquisition Policies

The State covenants and agrees that it will comply with CFR 49 part 24, which implements the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (42 U.S.C. Section 4601 et seq.) and provides for fair and equitable treatment of persons displaced by federally assisted programs or persons whose property is acquired as a result of such programs.

Section 811. Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act.

The State and the contractor and all parties involved with this contract covenants and agrees that it will comply with the Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act (18 U.S.C. Section 874) as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3). 2. Suitable Materials, Etc.:

Unless otherwise specified, all materials, supplies, or equipment offered by the Contractor shall be new, unused, and of the latest edition, version, model, or crop and of recent manufacture.

3. Disputes:

If the Contractor has a claim arising in connection with the contract that it cannot resolve with the State by mutual agreement, it shall pursue the claim, if at all, in accordance with the provisions of AS 36.30.620-AS 36.30.632.

4. Default:

In case of default by the Contractor, for any reason whatsoever, the State of Alaska may procure the goods or services from another source and hold the Contractor responsible for any resulting excess cost and may seek other remedies under law or equity.

5. No Assignment or Delegation:

The Contractor may not assign or delegate this contract, or any part of it, or any right to any of the money to be paid under it, except with the written consent of the Procurement Officer.

6. No Additional Work or Material:

8. Payment of Taxes:

Satisfactory performance of this paragraph is a condition precedent to payment by the State under this contract.

9. Compliance:

In the performance of this contract, the Contractor must comply with all applicable federal, state, and borough regulations, codes, and laws, and be liable for all required insurance, licenses, permits, and bonds.

10. Conflicting Provisions:

Unless specifically amended and approved by the Department of Law, the terms of this contract supersede any provisions the Contractor may seek to add. The Contractor may not add additional or different terms to this contract; AS 45.02.207(b)(1). The Contractor specifically acknowledges and agrees that, among other things, provisions in any documents it sees to append hereto that purport to (1) waive the State of Alaska's sovereign immunity, (2) impose indemnification obligations on the State of Alaska, or (3) seek to limit liability of the Contractor for acts of Contractor negligence, are expressly superseded by this contract and are void.

11. Officials Not to Benefit:

Contractor must comply with all applicable federal or state laws regulating ethical conduct of public officers and employees.

12. Contract Prices:

Contract prices for commodities must be in U.S. funds and include applicable federal duty, brokerage fees, packaging, and transportation cost to the FOB point so that upon transfer of title the commodity can be utilized without further cost. Prices for services must be in U.S. funds and include applicable federal duty, brokerage fee, packaging, and transportation cost so that the services can be provided without further cost.

13. Contract Funding:

Contractors are advised that funds are available for the initial purchase and/or the first term of the contract. Payment and performance obligations for succeeding purchases and/or additional terms of the contract are subject to the availability and appropriation of funds.

14. Force Majeure:

The parties to this contract are not liable for the consequences of any failure to perform, or default in performing, any of their obligations under this Agreement, if that failure or default is caused by any unforeseeable Force Majeure, beyond the control of, and without the fault or negligence of, the respective party. 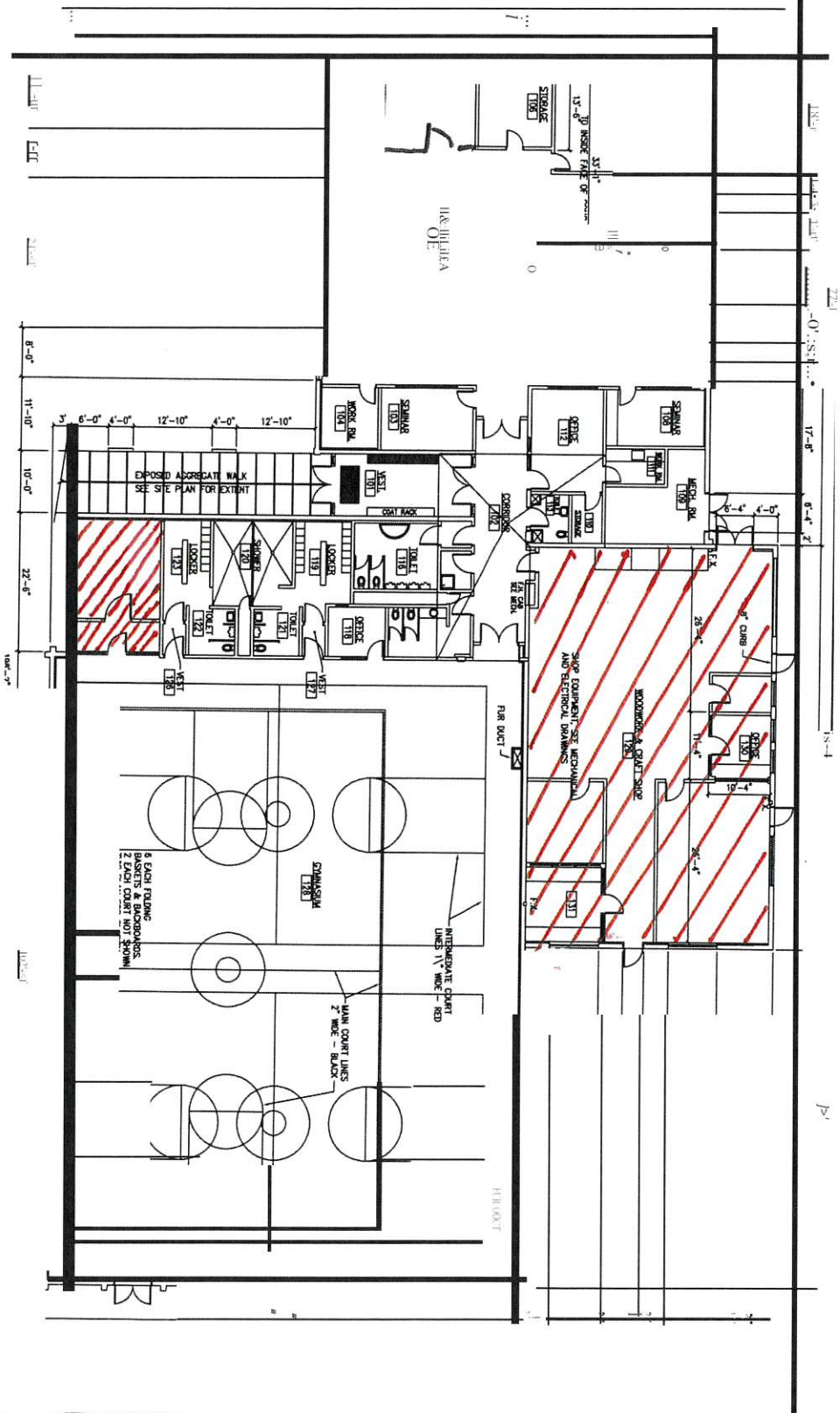

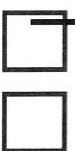
